It is with deep sorrow that I write about my friend John Murphy. I had known him for many years reaching back into the thirties when we were both considerably younger. Johnny came to this country in company with a Scottish soccer team during the early thirties. He liked it so much that he stayed on and was followed shortly by his brothers, Jimmy and Harry. Before coming to America, Johnny had worked for the Chapmans at the famous Heather Kennels in Glenboig Scotland. Here he gained experience with Scottish Terriers for which the Heather establishment was world famous. In addition, however, Chapman raised Gordon Setters, Pointers, Spaniels of various breeds, Alsations (German Shepherds) and Clydesdale horses. Of course, John Murphy had contact with all and thus gained a broad appreciation of the several breeds and of animals in general.

In his long stay in America, Johnny had associations with most of the great men in the Scottish Terrier Breed. As early as 1934 he handled dogs for Elizabeth Hull's Glenafton Kennels which were taken over subsequently by his brother Jimmy. He handled at one time or another for Alvin McAleenan (Vigal) and Edward Maloney (Goldfinder), together with dogs from Ted Bennett's, Deephaven Kennels and John Kemps, Action Hill establishment. In the forties he took over the Marlu Farms string (Maurice Pollak) when Bob Braithewaite left. In addition he handled for the R. J. McLoughlins, Ernie Joresco and Charles Werber through this general period. During the war Johnny was in the Merchant Marine but returned to handling when hostilities were over.

During his long tenure as a handler, John Murphy met head-on with the best this country had to offer. Such men as Charley Trayford, William and Phil Prentice, Bob Gorman, Deonard and Frank Brumby, Percy Roberts, Bob Braithewaite, Dick Davis, K. MacBain, Harry Hardcastle, Bob and Owen Craighead, Emmett Warburton, Russell Openshaw, John Goudie, Jack McOwan are just a few that were active in the breed during his early days in the ring. Of course many more came along that are still handling actively.

Johnny had great success with the Scottish Terrier. In 1940 he handled his own bitch, Action Hill's Gold Fairy to best of breed at the Garden. She was not a Champion at the time but was entered in "specials only" as was the custom. Gold Fairy was sold subsequently to Stan Speer's Dor-El Kennels near Toledo where brother Jimmy was the manager. She was made up quickly. In 1943, he handled the Henry Israels bitch, Fashion Favorite to best of breed from the open class and finished her easily. Another Israel owned dog, Marlu Clincher won the breed from the open class at the Specialty and became the big winner during 1953 with Johnny on the string. During the same general period he handled dogs for the Sheldon Winans, including the famous bitch, Ch. Fullivit Wee Mousie and later took over the Stewart Carters Louisville based string including the likes of Chs. Rebel Invader and the great Edgerstoune Troubadour, top sire and winner of his day. He subsequently handled the Todhill Scots of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Graham with outstanding success. Before leaving this general period, two dogs must be mentioned that made history, the first was Ch. Deephaven Red Seal a consistent winner and the second was Maloney's Ch. Goldfinder's Admiral. This last was a constant threat and waged a long-time battle with the Stalter's Ch. Barberry Knowe Barbican handled by Phil Prentice. The two were great competitors for several years. The foregoing listing offers but a few of the persons and dogs with whom Johnny had contact but a complete catalogue would be endless, so popular was this man. In any event, in the early sixties (c.1962) he took over the handling chores for the Stalters' Barberry Knowe establishment. Here he had his usual success with a steady string of Scots which was climaxed when he handled the great Ch. Carmichael's Fanfare to best in show at Westminster in 1965 --- the ultimate accomplishment for any handler. He continued handling until 1968 when he retired to embark upon a judging career.

Johnny Murphy worked on judging as he did on handling and it was not long before he gained his all-bred license and was one of the busiest and best liked judges in America. His popularity was surely sparked by his friendly smile and helpful attitude. Throughout his life he was always pleasant to all and was one of the most popular handlers in the trade.

Our own friendship with him dates back into the thirties. At the time, we were living in Ohio and the winter circuit that carried through Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton and Cincinnati was a popular one with Eastern handlers, who made it each year. The Murphys, the Brumbys, Tom Gately, Phil Prentice, Russell Openshaw, the Craigheads and many more seldom missed these events. It was a concentrated week of shows, each benched from 10 to 10 for two days. Fortunately,


Mrs. Helen Stalter Telephoned me last evening to tell me of the tragically sudden death of Mr. John Murphy.

On January 26, 1973 the California fanciers were saddened by the sudden passing of Dorissa Barnes, president of the Scottish Terrier Club of California.

However, Dorissa took in the dog and sold him to a good home in less than a week -- although she was willing to keep him forever if necessary. I felt the proceeds of the sale should be hers inasmuch as she had given him care and sold him, but not Dorissa! Even though of meager means herself, she had the S.T.C.C. set up a "Rescue Fund" with this money, for just such future emergencies.

These last few months, Dorissa worked feverishly to get the S.T.C.C. ready for its 40th Specialty to be held this June. The show will now be dedicated to her memory.

We'll miss you, Dorissa.

I would also like to personally thank all the kind people (in and out of the breed) who contributed so generously to the fund to keep the Crescent Hill Scots cared for during these past difficult days. At this writing, most of the dogs have been placed in good homes.

there was never more than 150 miles between shows and this was covered by train or truck as was the custom of the times. Terrier people in Ohio endeavored to make the circuit and we were fortunate in this respect and became friendly with many of the handlers including the Murphy brothers. We became especially close to them in view of the activity in Scottish Terriers in Ohio. Dr. Zimmerman (Briarcroft) and Clint Schenck and John Hillman (Hillcote) were all frequent Dayton visitors as the Israels of Dayton were strong exhibitors at the time and used Johnny as both a handler and advisor. Many an evening was spent talking dogs in general and Scots in particular with this group, it was a very rewarding period.

Through the years to follow we had always maintained a close friendship with Johnny, he was our house guest when judging in the area and came to Doylestown at other times with mutual friends for pleasant visits. Our last contact with him was at the Gaines breakfast, the last day of this year's Garden. He was in good spirits and apparently good health. Shows will not seem the same without his friendly chatter and smiling face, we will miss him greatly, as will his myriad of other friends the country over.

Regardless of what we think or plan, most every litter has some "pet quality" pups. You can use the best champion stud available to a champion bitch but the chances of having a litter of 100 percent "show quality" dogs is remote.

Puppy sales to good homes are usually necessary sources of income to help offset some dog showing expenses. Your reputation and the reputation of the breed will suffer if you place a puppy in an incorrect home. Pet homes differ markedly. Some people should never have a dog and others should only consider some of the more docile breeds. Anyone who has ever owned a Scottie will know that Scotties cannot be "whipped into shape". Scotties respond best to praise.

Your first instructions to the new pet owner should contain information on keeping the pup in good health. We recommend they take the new Scottie to their Vet promptly. This protects both the buyer and the seller as well as the dog. If the puppy is found ill by the Vet, you may offer a refund or another pup and the buyer will respect you. (Of course you should have ascertained the health of all pups prior to sale by taking them to your own Vet.) Early visits to the Vet accustom the owner to taking their dog, and the Vet can give further instructions on keeping their Scottie healthy. When a Vet sees a good quality, healthy Scottie, he will be more apt to recommend you to other prospective buyers. We have had several referrals from local Vets even tho we do not use these Vets ourselves.

Besides informing new owners on the feeding of their Scottie, introduce them to good books on house training of dogs. Any method that uses praise and reward and avoids punishment will work. The "rub their nose in it" method is still around.

Some explanation should be made to the pet buyer about teasing. You should emphasize over and over again that teasing a puppy is one sure method of making a mean, illtempered dog. Children often will tease a puppy and not know they are doing him irreparable harm.

Puppies need periods of rest especially when they are small, buyers should be told not to let the new Scottie get exhausted. He should be allowed to have frequent intervals of rest.

A dog should never be allowed to growl or snap at children or adults when they approach him while he is eating. A puppy can be taught from the beginning to relinquish his bone or food pan immediately. This is accomplished by gently, but firmly taking his bone or food away from him, then giving it back. Remember, if he

is teased about his bones or food, he is more apt to become overly possessive of them.

It would be impossible in this article to discuss all of the things advisable to tell a pet buyer. We give each one a booklet which goes into detail on many topics they will need to know. It is better to give the pet buyer a written set of instructions since many things are forgotten as soon as they leave your home or kennel. The small expense of making xerox copies is well worth it. A couple of sheets of paper may save you several hours on the phone reexplaining some points on dog care. REMEMBER HOWEVER TO INCLUDE YOUR PHONE NUMBER.

BREEDING AND BREEDING FORMULAS

The phraseology used by writers often boggles the mind. When one endeavors to discover the meaning of a "well-worn" phrase, they are thwarted because no one offers to define it while using it frequently and glibly. One such phrase, or should I say two, both used many times are, "Tail Male" and "Tail Female" breeding. What do they mean, where did they come from and of what value are they?

Well, the Bruce-Lowe system is a breeding formula that used both terms and one that emphasizes the importance of the female line (family). In highly simplified form, it refers to the dam's, dam's dam's, dam etc., termed the "tail female" line of descent. To a lesser degree and of considerably less importance is the male line of descent (line), to wit, the sire's, sire's, sire's, sire etc., or "tail male" line. According to the system, the other roads of possible influence, those through the middle of the pedigree are relatively unimportant and cancel one another out.

From this explanation, it is apparent that the system considers only the bottom and the top of any pedigree in that order of importance. A survey of the pedigrees of a number of Champion dogs in almost any breed indicates to me, at least, that the greatest number of titleholders accrue when a bitch is bred to her paternal grandsire which suggests "tail-male" breeding.

Of course, at the time that the Rev. Bruce was touting this system, no less an authority than Francis Redmond expressed small use for it and he did extremely well. All of which indicates that breeding a good 'un is never easy and no formula in the world can assure success--- it always requires a bit of good fortune, two better than average breed specimens, a great deal of hard work AND a blessing from above.

My husband is away for a while and I spend my evenings with a small black beast named Abbie. With her sitting at my feet I often find myself watching her tenderly and thinking back on this past year.

Abbie moved into our home at the age of 6 1/2 weeks, but she was already lodged in our hearts. We had awaited her birth for a month with ever increasing hopes for her future. We saw her on that first day of life, although we did not yet know which one of the six was to become our Sweetheart.

Abbie had been the runt of the litter, but the undisputed boss and leader. She took over our household right away. We watched her more than the T.V. Her box, which housed a stuffed dog three times as big as her for a bed mate, occupied a quiet corner of the living room near my husbands chair. At night I carried the box to our room and set it by the bed. But with her Scottie determination it wasn't long before she could climb the bedside mountain and enjoy fun and games before sleepy time.

In these early months Abbie developed the annoying habit of walking across my body to awaken me in the morning. (Who told her I was a heavy sleeper?). She would start at my toes and make her way to my head with the surefootedness of a mountain goat. But, when she reached my face and gave me a kiss, I couldn't be angry.

When Abbie was a bit older she must have known that I would wake up eventually, as she would watch and wait for that first sign of arousal, before diving upon my face to give me my kisses.

Obedience minded folk would probably say that Abbie is totally undisciplined, but when I say, "Drop it!" she drops it. On good advise we were told to teach her that command first, but she seemed to respond automatically and there was never any training to that lesson. The other lessons? - well I just don't want to talk about them! She does fetch rather well, anything you throw, she brings back with glee.

Abbie's mother stalked out of the litter box when the pups were 3 weeks old, but a friendly cat named Sugar came by often to check on things. I've often wondered about Sugars influence. (That first day at home I swear Abbie purred!) Somehow the words reserved and dignified just do not fit Abbie. I'll never forget the day the children let the T.V. repairman in the door and Abbie attacked him with wild joy at having another human playmate. Abbie has the feeling that if you are human you must be terrific and she lets you know it.

Practicing in the back yard for Abbies show career I would worry about her tail carriage, but needn't have. At the first sight of another dog her tail shoots straight up and freezes into

position. Now that she has matured I have never seen her give ground to any dog. She stands solid, watching from the corner of her eye, to see if it will be play or fight. So far these passers-by have decided to just go on their way.

I did mention Abbie's show career. It was rather quick. In three matches she took two 1st place ribbons and one 2nd place. I can't brag on how many Scots she defeated, but she wasn't out there alone. My hopes for the big time will have to wait for another dog. Besides her love of all mankind, her faults seem to get worse rather than better.

Abbie has great bursts of energy at times and she takes off down the hall on a wild run and circles the living room in a flash. She practices her quick stops too while she's playing this game. Someday I am going to put a dime down for her to practice on.

The 1st year with our 1st Scottie has been filled with love. Scotties do listen and they do talk. Abbie even thinks she can read. Why else would she grab my husbands letters from my lap and try to make off with it? Scotties are individuals too. Abbie thinks she is a small, odd looking child, so when the human puppies were cracking walnuts she picked up one and tried it. Abbie loves walnuts now, even if she does have to crack them herself.

This story is getting too long, but I do like to talk and dogs are my favorite topic. I know that the years ahead with Abbie are going to be delightful. Even if she is 'just' a pet, our Abbie is still a Scottish Terrier.

PRESENT-DAY MISCONCEPTIONS

"We have been authorized by the West of England Scottish Terrier Club to reproduce the following articles by the late Mrs. Dorothy Caspersz. These articles written by her expressly for the WESTC Bulletin in 1955".

The Scottish Terrier Club of America extends appreciation to the WESTC for letting us reprint the following articles.

I.

Having been asked by your Hon. Secretary to write something for this Bulletin, I hope to try and clear up a few of the misconceptions existing regarding several of the important points of a Scottish Terrier.

HEAD: The feature noticed first, and the one over which probably more misunderstanding prevails than over any other portion of the dog.

Too much stress is often laid on sheer length at the expense of correct shape. Though as the standard lays down, the head should be long without being out of proportion to the size of the dog, such increase as has been attained has been mainly in the foreface, and by almost total elimination of that essential break in the profile of the face, the stop. That any definite increase in the distance from the occiput to stop has been made is extremely doubtful. The skull part of the head is made to appear longer than it really is by skillful trimming, a universally accepted practice which, for show purposes, has obviously come to stay. A good head, however, is not dependent upon trimming, nor only upon the bone formation of the head itself, but includes the placement, shape, size and position of the eyes, and ears also. It may be simpler to divide this subject into separate headings: A. RELATION OF SKULL TO FOREFACE. As has been said, trimming can accentuate the apparent all-over length of head, but trimming, how ever skillful, cannot disguise the comparative lengths of skull and foreface. It is often assumed, and wrongly, that because a foreface is of exceptional length this constitutes a virtue. If the foreface exceeds the skull in length, the head is unbalanced and incorrect. The reverse condition - that of greater length in the skull than in the foreface - is infinitely less objectionable.

B. TOP LINE OF HEAD VIEWED IN PROFILE. Taking a side view of the head, comparative lengths of skull and muzzle are again apparent, but an equally important requirement, seemingly not fully understood, is that the nearly level top line of the skull, if carried on in imagination to beyond the nose, should be practically parallel to the level top line of the foreface. Between the top lines of skull and muzzel there should exist the slight but very distinct "stop". The sharp definition of a stop is essential to the right expression, since it affects the placement of the eyes. Any deviation from this correct profile is faulty in some degree. Often the skull line is spoiled by prominent bumps behind and above the eyes. In this type of head there is usually absolutely no stop, merely a slope down from the offending bumps to the foreface, which is then too downfaced. It should be more generally realized that bumps, lack of stop, and a downface, are all faults.
