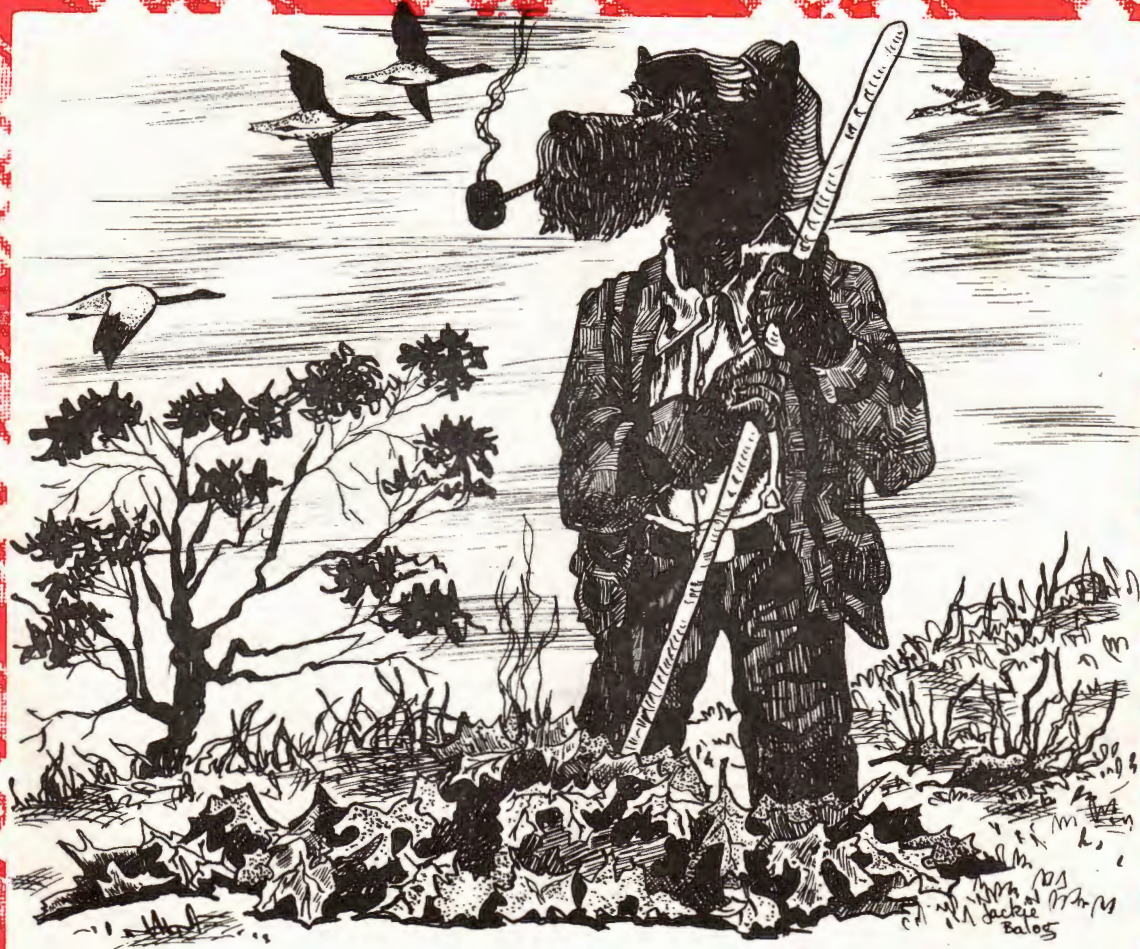

ENGLAND AND THE SCOTTIES WE VISITED . . . .

After 16 days of glorious Swedish sunshine our departure day dawned gloomy with rain showers (the only rain we had in 23 days.) We had a short 2 hour flight to London but spent one hour in the well known "Air Stack". It was all for the better as the visibility changed from  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile to 10 miles. We had landed in the pea soup London fog once before, and no thanks - to say the least it is quite scary. Betty Penn Bull of the famed Kennelgarth Scotties met us and drove us to our motel, which was located on the outskirts of Maidenhead and next to the beautiful rambling Shoppenhangers Manor. We had a short nap (a necessity due to the farewell party the night before and being up at 5:00 AM.) and then to Betty's home for English Tea. Miss Muriel Law of the Eckersley Kennel was a house guest and two wonderful Dutch girls. Mrs. Tineke Van Uffortl and Mrs. Maryle Roos were also there. After tea we saw all the dogs. Betty has such a wonderful place for scotties - they can romp and roam all day. Had a wonderful dinner in an English pub and then a short trip thru the country side. We passed a spooky old house and Betty told us that is where all the Dracula movies were made. It really looked it and you expected any minute to see a spook come flying out the window.

The next day was the Scottish Terrier Club of England Specialty Show - and what marvelous weather - 75 degrees and a cool breeze. It was held at Kempton Park Race course. You can't imagine how welcomed we felt to enter the show 3000 miles from home and within a few minutes to see friends - Walter and Beth Palethorp, Muriel and Chink Owens (Gaywyn Kennels) Mrs. Dorothy Standen (St. C.C. of Chicago Specialty Judge) and as we were watching the judging - a tap on the shoulder and there stood David Davies - one of our Scottish Terrier Club of Michigan members. Mrs. M. Micklethwaite had an entry of approximately 120 dogs comprising 180 entries plus 4 braces and 4 other special stake classes. To be a judge here you must really be on your toes as one dog can be entered in as many as 5 classes and only the unbeaten dogs can compete for the C.C. (i.e. you can place 1st. in 4 classes but be defeated in the 5th, therefore you could not compete for the C.C.) It could happen that you would end up in your winners class with no unbeaten dogs. Wouldn't that be something??? The dog C.C. went to Jane Millers lovely brindle Champion Brio Fair N'Square. The reserve C.C. to Mrs. Myers puppy dog Reanda Rock Silver. The bitch C.C. to the Owens Ch. Gaywyn Leila, the Reserve C.C. to Ch. Viewpark Anna (BOB at Crufts.) The Best of Breed went to the Bitch. You must remember that she had been in the ring for sometime and the C.C. dog had had several hours rest (they break for lunch between the dog and bitch judging.) Best puppy the Palethorps Bardene Brigadier General. Best 9 - 12 puppy the Reserve C.C. winner.

Our wonderful Dutch friends drove us back to the motel we did do a wrong way round-about road and were headed for Southampton but soon found our way back.

The specialty dinner was held at the Windsor Castle Hotel and was fantastic with quite an international gathering, with the following countries being represented, Australia, America, Canada, Holland, France, Belgium, Germany, and Sweden.

The next day was the Windsor Ch. Show and it dawned warm and sunny (Thank Heavens). A few years ago they had a deluge not unlike our famous Montgomery County show of 1971. This is a 3 day show with 2 groups each day. There were 24 rings and approximately 100 booth displays. Mrs. J. Knight Hepburns found her winners as follows: The dog C.C. went to Jetscot Viceroy (finished) and the bitch C.C. to Ch. Viewpark Anna who also went Best of Breed and Groupe 1. We were very impressed with the dogs we saw - with the few exceptions the Bitches outshined the dogs. I must say here that we had one GREAT DISAPPOINTMENT, any of you who know, I am sure can guess what that was. With the exception of a few, almost every dog was lifted up onto the table by the lead and the tail. Nuf said!!!!

We would like to say here - many 'thank yous' to our English friends for your wonderful hospitality - DO ALL COME AND SEE US.

The 1972 list of top winning dogs from Canada is now out and No.1 scottie was Cana. & Am. Ch. Firebrand's Book-maker with 1,042 points. He was also No.10 Terrier and had, I believe, 2 BIS- All Breeds. Congratulations to John Sheehan.

No.2 scottie was Ch. Biennein's Bobby Dazzler and third, Cana. & Am. Ch. Roylyn's Major Gold-finger.

The West of England STC Bulletin for July mentioned that William Singleton, President STC of England, world famous breeder (Walsing) and noted judge had suffered a heart attack some time before he was due to judge the Scottish Kennel Club Show. Mr. Singleton(Max) is also a member of STC of America and I'm sure all members will wish him a speedy recovery to good health.

Again from the bulletin (which incidently is sent to your Editor and I'm sure can be seen there), an article on judging which I found very pleasing. After reading recent reprints of the late Dorothy Caspersz judging critiques and now a review by the great W. L. McCandlish after a 1938 judging assignment, I really wonder what goes through the minds of many of our present day judges before they make their decisions. Commenting on Niddbank Avert, Mr. McCandlish wrote that he covered half as much more ground as most of the other dogs, and twice as much as many, with each step. "Neddbank Avert drives himself along with his hind quarters; there are many present day winners with extravagant heads and bodies which pull themselves along by the forelegs and the hind legs come pattering after, like the white rabbit they will be late." How true of today some 35 years later!"

FOREHAND

In view of the standard description of Forequarters, it is odd that some people imagine the front of a Scottish Terrier should be as narrow as that of the long-legged terrier breeds. The words - "the chest fairly broad and hung between the forelegs" should be sufficient guidance, but a practical test can be applied in that the flat of a large man's hand can be accommodated comfortably between the forelegs of a typical Scot of average weight.

HINDQUARTERS.

Hocks too wide apart, or hocks too close together, and weak hind legs that stretch away too far behind the dog, are features too often viewed with particular complacency and allowed to get by if the dog's front and is attractive. But when all is said and done, in the breadth across the muscular thighs, the well-bent stifles, the low position of the hocks, all conveying that impression of great power and springing ability, lies the key to the correct construction and true type of a Scot. This beautiful show was held at Battle Creek Michigan.

Last year I found a rather attractive etching of a Scottie and a Westie sitting on a golf club bag. It was signed by a Morgan Dennis. Being an incurable collector and seeing that not only the etching had been signed, but also the print and that it had been expensively framed, I paid the few dollars asked and brought my new "find" home. A call to the Toronto Art Gallery, another to the Fine Arts Library told me I had indeed stumbled upon a treasure. Two Galleries authenticated it as an original print.

Morgan Dennis is listed in the Who's Who of American Artists 1936 - 1937 Edition. Born in Boston in 1892 he became a favourite artist, illustrator and author. Mrs. Dennis who resides in the family home in Florida, kindly filled me in on her late husband's exciting career. His now world famous drawings of "Blackie and Whitey" done at the time of Repeal in 1933 to advertise whiskey appeared in many magazines for over 25 years, and the Texaco Company who also drew on Mr. Dennis' talent for advertising, once wrote him that his "Texaco Scotties" had been reproduced three hundred million times!

The mid forties found Morgan Dennis on Florida's West coast in his studio where he continued painting and teaching. Asked why he chose Florida for his home, he replied "When I saw Fort Myers Beach, on the sparkling Gulf of Mexico my thoughts turned backwards to other places I had worked and studied - to Provincetown on Cape Cod, where I had been a pupil of Bicknell (W.H.W.Bicknell) the etcher and to Penzance, Cornwall, England where I spent a summer studying painting with Sir Stanthorpe Forbes.....There (Fort Myers) maybe I could inspire my students with the knowledge and techniques I have acquired from years of experience and continued study."

Reporter Helen Green asked if Mr. Dennis could complain of being typed on account of his many scotties and animal illustrations, he replied with a grin "O.K. tell them I can also draw blondes."

Morgan Dennis has a special place in the hearts of scottie people. In the early 1930's he owned a pair of scotties, and his works show such great depth and understanding of our breed. Like Rudyard Kipling, Morgan Dennis sometimes wrote as if he was the dog himself writing and while some non-doggie folk would think this far fetched for an adult, again his deep awareness, sensitivity and understanding of the scottie is so apparent that very few readers cannot help but identify their own dogs with his. He illustrated Mr. and Mrs. Howard Snethen's Book, Pet Scottish Terrier, did many etchings of scotties some of which appear in The Morgan Dennis Dog Book 1946 - Viking Press, wrote numerous articles "Cat you amaze me!" by A. Scottie as barked to Morgan Dennis, also "Me, Sandy!" by Himself, to name a couple. A lovely etching was done also of the scottie Ch. Scotsholme Surprise and Mrs. Dennis owns a pair of bookends designed by her husband and cast in bronze by McClelland Barclay.

In a letter to Dorothy Burchfield (to whom I am indebted for much of my information, indeed it was Dorothy who started me on the Morgan Dennis trail!), Mrs. Dennis wrote, "Morgan Dennis was an extraordinary talent and a great person and a wonderful companion. Even after so many years (Mr. Dennis died in 1960), the world seems a much less gay and poorer place without him....."

### SCOTTIE

"SCRAM!" was one of my most popular plates, even in England, where, to my amusement, the title was changed to "SCRAMBLE!" The pair at the top are the "Look and Listen" Scotties. When I struggled with them, trying for that particular expression, I didn't know they were going places via the advertising medium, or that the picture would be reproduced some three hundred million times. Incidentally this was the first dog drawing of mine that was put to commercial use.

Dog handling Session was held on July 22nd at the home of Peggy & Jerry Burge and was taught by Bob Charves. Bob is a long time exhibitor and breeder and is very knowledgeable in the ring.

Bob opened by giving an informative talk on ring procedure, what the judge is looking for, and how to present your own dog in his best advantage. He then ran a mock show, answering questions and helping each exhibitor individually. SOME OF BOB'S POINTERS ARE BELOW:

1. Have a positive attitude! You must believe your dog can win and you must act like you believe it.
2. Observe the judge judging other breeds before you enter the ring so you will know his procedure.
3. If the class is large, decide which other dogs you want yours near in order to be shown to his best advantage. Most dogs look best near those of similar type and will "fire" better with some dogs. Scotties may also have preferences about being first or last in line.
4. Pay attention to the judge at all times; he may suddenly change his instructions or give an award.
5. When gaitting, know at what speed your particular dog looks best and learn to turn him without breaking stride.
6. Practice stacking in front of a mirror. Remember the judge sees the side opposite you, so you must know what it looks like.
7. If your dog is fractious being judged on a table, stand him near the edge. His sense of insecurity will make him less apt to move. When removing a dog from the table, put one hand under the neck and the other on the tail. Do not lift a dog by the lead.
8. Always treat the judge with courtesy - win or lose. Don't talk to him except to briefly answer questions and always thank him for ribbons whether you are happy or not.

The Scottish Terrier Club of Western

Virginia held its Symposium at the Lakeview Motor Lodge, Roanoke, Virginia, on 28, 29, and 30 August 1973. It was attended by 50 participants representing hometowns from Dallas to Connecticut. The Speakers Panel brought together an outstanding collection of experts in many aspects of dogdom, including Bill Schmick, Assistant to the Senior Vice-President of the American Kennel Club, Bob Graham, the Director of The American Kennel Club and former president of The Scottish Terrier Club of America, Senator Anthony Stamm, an AKC delegate and former president of The Scottish Terrier Club of America, his wife Miriam, who was the editor of the current Scottish Terrier Club of America Handbook, Dr. Alan Beck from Washington University in St. Louis, the world's authority on ecology and dogs, Dr. Nancy Lenfesty, an outstanding handler of Scottish Terriers, and a veterinarian well versed in the care of Scottish Terriers, Cliff Hallmark, one of the top terrier handlers, Ruth Johnson, a former officer of The Scottish Terrier Club of America and one of our outstanding breeders, and Dr. Tom Kirk from the local club.

As would be expected, all of the participants were present at the initial social hour and dinner where everyone had the opportunity of getting to know everyone else. But, the success of the meeting was the attendance at the subsequent lectures. With 90 plus percent in attendance at every session, I think the whole event has to be classified as a success.

Grooming was discussed and demonstrated and then supervised. Discussion of health as it relates to scotties, relationships of house dogs and stray dogs to the ecology, enlightened all of us. There was a discussion of breeding principals by people who have achieved success in breeding scottish terriers over an estimated total of more than a hundred years. A very fine and informative discussion was held on what The American Kennel Club means, not only in enlightening dog fanciers, but in allaying many of the gripes people, not in the know, find so easy to come by.

The three day Symposium was topped off by a Specialty Show Thursday night at the beautiful Exhibition Hall of Hotel Roanoke where Judge Bob Marshall passed on an entry of 55 Scottish Terriers. The entry was wide spread geographically for a regional specialty show. Entries, appearing from Texas, Arkansas, Florida and the eastern seaboard, quite represented the scottish terriers in the eastern half of the country. The last six months of the year (Actual show results for January through June), a total of 80 legs have been earned by Scotties in obedience compared with only 46 for the exact same period last year!

I have been corresponding with many Scottie obedience enthusiasts and have the following to report:

Stanley Putnam's Stan's Golden Timmy UD, who will soon be 7 years old, was awarded the Top Scottie in Obedience title from the obedience magazine FRONT & FINISH (among all terriers, he tied for 9th place). He also holds this title for 1970 and 1971. But Timmy is soon to have some competition at home. The Putnams have another Scottie, a 5 month old wheaton, and they have already introduced him to obedience.

Ken and Helen Winebrenner's Marlora Mac-Heath CDX already has 2 legs towards his Mexican CD, is now utility trained (with plans of showing him this fall after the weather cools down), and have started tracking with him. He, by the way, is the number 3 Scottie in obedience according to FRONT & FINISH.

Joan Duke's Clis-Nic-Duke should have his CDX soon. Two other STCA members have recently finished CD's on their Scotties. They are Bert Tryon with Milady Glowing Ember (his 2nd Scottie to do so), and Bill Allen with Suscots Zacharia.

In Canada, Mrs. Louise Whent and her mother, Mrs. Margaret Hunter, have 3 Champion Scotties all with obedience titles. Their Ch. Monteith's Angus MacTavish CD, earned his CD at 8½ years of age. In July, after just about giving up hope of doing so, their Ch. Honover's Wee Whiskee CDX, received his 3rd leg in OPEN. They also have Ch. Honover's Tarton Tyke CDX, at home.

Since June, 3 members of the S.T.C. of Northern Ohio, Beverly Haines, Bill Allen and Maureen Setter have been working with their Scotties in perfecting an obedience and drill team routine that they will present at the S.T.C.N.O. Specialty in October. The Scotties have red with plaid trim coats that they wear along with plaid tams and the handlers have outfits to carry out the same Scotch theme. They (the team) has already received requests to perform at other benefits.

## S.T.C.A. OBEDIENCE AWARDS

A decision will be made this year at the October S.T.C.A. Board meeting as to the awarding of honors annually to outstanding Obedience trial participants.

Before presenting a proposal, representative of owners and supporters of our dogs in obedience, a selection of the right type of award and recognition is important.

Important because it is a first for S.T.C.A. and important because obedience work offers competition for most owners of most Scottish Terriers. Hopefully, the awards will encourage and stimulate greater interest as well as point out our parent club is interested in all facets of ownership related to the betterment of the breed both in conformation and companionship.

The area of training and completing of any obedience title is not to be under estimated. To date there are 12 champions and slightly more than 100 non-champions that have completed obedience titles according to Maureen Setter, 25007 Lake Road, Bay Village, Ohio 44140.

Mrs. Setter, who has meticulously compiled a list of Scottish Terriers both here and in Canada that have competed and are presently competing in obedience, is maintaining a concise and valuable list through AKC records and catalogues.

For instance, she has tabulated that in 1969, 28 Scottish Terriers competed in AKC trials with 19 completing their titles in comparison to an increased number of 38 in 1971 with 20 winning a title. She has also recorded the scores of the dogs competing, and the number of times entered, noting that some compete in few trials while others must enter more often to obtain their titles of CD, CDX, UD, or TD.

As the challenge is constant and interest is increasing we are searching for the categorization and type of award that will honor the degree of difficulty and offer encouragement.
