PROPOSED

CODE OF ETHICS

The purpose of this code is to insure the well being of dogs in general and Scottish Terriers in particular.

1. It shall be considered unethical for any member of the Scottish Terrier Club of America to engage in the wholesaling of litters of puppies, or the selling of puppies or breeding stock to or through such places as pet shops, catalogue houses or other commercial sources of distribution, nor shall he engage in over-breeding his own bitches for profit, disregarding the quality of the puppies.

2. It shall be considered unethical for any member of the Scottish Terrier Club of America to knowingly violate any of the normally accepted ethical practices in breeding dogs, selling dogs, or holding dogs at public stud.

(No bitch shall be considered for breeding who carries known hereditary defects, nor who is not in good health and physical condition at the time of breeding. Knowing misrepresentation of the health or quality of a puppy or adult dog for sale shall be considered unethical. A stud owner will not knowingly breed bitches with hereditary defects, nor those not in good health or condition, nor shall he breed a bitch to any stud other than that agreed upon previously with the bitch owner.)

3. Every member of the Scottish Terrier Club of America shall familiarize himself with the American Kennel Club rules regarding record keeping, registration, sale and transfer of dogs, and the procedures regarding exhibiting dogs and the holding of dog shows. It shall be considered unethical to knowingly violate these rules and regulations.

4. Each member of the Club has an obligation to protect the best interest of dogdom by conducting himself in a manner designed to reflect credit on himself, his breed, and on the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA ANNOUNCES A PROGRAM OF MINI-WORKSHOPS TO BE HELD IN VARIOUS PARTS OF THE COUNTRY OVER THE NEXT 12-MONTH PERIOD.

WORKSHOPS OF ONE OR TWO DAYS' DURATION WILL BE SCHEDULED ON A FIRST-COME, FIRST-SERVED BASIS AT THE REQUEST OF GROUPS EXPRESSING A NEED AND DESIRE FOR SPECIFIC KINDS OF HELP AND INSTRUCTION, SUCH AS GROOMING AND CONDITIONING THE SCOTTISH TERRIER FOR SHOW, ORGANIZING A CLUB AND GETTING IT RECOGNIZED BY AKC, CONDUCTING SANCTIONED MATCHES AND SPECIALTY SHOWS.

THE SUM OF \$1,500.00 HAS BEEN BUDGETED FOR THE PROGRAM AND WILL BE USED TO PAY TRANSPORTATION COSTS OF INSTRUCTORS SENT BY THE S.T.C.A. TO CONDUCT THE WORKSHOPS. THE HOST GROUP, IN RETURN, WILL BE EXPECTED TO PROVIDE ACCOMODATIONS FOR THE INSTRUCTOR, AS WELL AS WHATEVER EQUIPMENT, MATERIALS, AND FACILITIES MAY BE NEEDED FOR THE WORKSHOP.

MEMBERSHIP IN THE S.T.C.A. IS NOT REQUIRED, NOR DO THE PERSONS REQUESTING THE WORKSHOP HAVE TO BE A FORMALLY ORGANIZED OR SANCTIONED GROUP. THEY MUST BE DEDICATED SCOTTISH TERRIER FANCIERS, HOWEVER, AND MUST BE ABLE TO DEMONSTRATE THAT THE KNOWLEDGE GAINED FROM THE WORKSHOP WILL BE OF LONG-TERM VALUE AND IN EVERY INSTANCE WILL BE PUT TO GOOD CONSTRUCTIVE USE FOR THE BETTERMENT OF THE BREED.

I UNDERESTIMATED WALLACE the first time I saw him and I also underestimated Jake when he first came into my life. It took me a long time too to realize that they needed each other.

Wallace, the dog, came first. I was feeling flush. I had just signed my first teaching contract for the coming year and had made arrangements to live in an old house in a very respectable neighborhood in a nearby Virginia town, sharing expenses with two other teachers. For some reason I thought I needed a dog. The house was surely big enough and I had a room to myself to share with a canine companion.

I came from a long line of school teachers and thrifty Scots. Anything Scottish is special to me, so what more natural than I buy myself a Scottish Terrier to take to my new life. I answered an ad in the local newspaper early in the summer. I went to view a litter of pups. By the time I saw them, the choice was limited to the last one.

"You'd probably have wanted one of the big ones," the breeder said, "but they are all spoken for. There's just the little fellow left. He's got lots of personality even if he is small."

The runt gave me a frosty stare with something of challenge in it as if he already knew about rejection and could handle it.

"I need to get them gone," the breeder added. "I can make you a good price for the little one. He's going to be a nice pet but he's not show quality."

The idea of a bargain was the last straw. No Scot could resist such a temptation. I bought the puppy and I named him Wallace for my favorite hero. I had him house-trained by the end of the summer and when we went off to the teaching post, he and I had established a good country-walking relationship. What I had not visualized was the effect of city life and my absence at work on my dog.

Mary Sue and Catherine were good sports about sharing the house with him. They too liked animals and at first things went well. They were often out in the evening or if at home, like me, they had work to do in their rooms. Wallace kept me company. He would lie on the bed and watch me busy with my papers and preparations for the coming day's teaching. But already he was in trouble with his new environment.

Mrs. Thomas, the cleaning woman, had let him out several times. He had prowled the neighborhood searching for mischief to get in to. First there was a pair of shoes chewed—they had been left carelessly on the front porch of the house next door. He chased a cat up a tree and the irate owner had to rescue it with a ladder. He was taking on every male dog in the area and in spite of his size he was leaving his mark.

"That darn dog just hides round the

corner 'til I open the door and then out he scoots," complained Mrs. Thomas. The neighbors were beginning to complain too.

Meanwhile down at the school I had met Jake. He had been truant at the beginning of the term and was not at first assigned to my class but one day the principal called me in and told me about him.

"He's a difficult child," I was told. "The family background is not good. One brother in jail. The father is gone a lot and the mother works. He has a bad scar on his face and he is sensitive and pugnacious about it."

There was more to the story according to some of the older teachers who gave me the more lurid details of experiences they had when Jake was one of theirs. I began to build up a monster in my mind and his first appearance was a shock. He was small, delicate of feature and one could not believe that so much trouble could be packaged in one small boy.

I recognized him by the scar when he first sauntered into the classroom although it too was not apparent until he turned his head.

"Hello, Jake." I had made my first mistake.

"Hi, Blue-Eyes, how come you know my name?"

I told him I had seen his picture in the file folder.

"Okay, then what's his name, or hers?" He knew he had me as he pointed to other children in the room not set aside by his disfigurement.

"Take a seat, Jake."

He looked around. "I'll take one if you say," he stated and he walked up to a seat and dumped a boy on the floor. This child was wearing braces on his leg and I was shocked at the cruelty of the act.

"How could you do such a thing to Robert?" I asked after class.

"I reckon it's because I know Robert. I remember his name on account of the braces like you say you remember me on account of my picture."

A child like that should surely be smart enough to do passing work or better, I thought, and all my school teacher blood cried out for reforming him. I had fantasies about leading him from the darkness of ignorance into the light of learning.

Well, it wasn't going to be easy. He brought a garter snake to school and was furious with me because it did not frighten me. He smoked in the rest room and we were both called into the principal's office. He brought dice to school and gambled for lunch money and won. There were constant fights and I was ready to throw in the towel.

I went to visit his home at the principal's suggestion and Jake gave me

the grand tour pointing out the home of the boy's father involved in the criminal charges against his brother. He showed me the beat up car belonging to his brother. He was keeping it shiny and running the motor. "When J.B. comes home we're going to Texas. We'll look for jobs on a ranch."

The visit seemed not to solve a thing and when I got home there was more trouble with Wallace. The telephone was ringing as I came in the door.

"I'm calling about your dog," said an irate voice. "He chased my cat right into the house, he went right through the screen door."

"I'll pay for any damage," I promised as I had been doing for weeks.

"That may not be enough," the voice warned. "We're thinking about getting up a petition. You can't hang a shirt on the line. You can't plant a shrub without that dog getting into it. You'd better be thinking of some way to get rid of him."

I hung up and looked around for Wallace but he was not in the house. I toured the neighborhood but no luck, no dog. Wallace usually knew when he was in disgrace and had a habit of disappearing. I went in the house and fixed a dinner of leftover stew. I listened for the usual penitent scratch on the kitchen door but it did not come. I would have to find him a home, perhaps have him put down. All sorts of miserable thoughts made the stew tasteless. Maybe I would never see him again. He had never been out this late.

There was no scratch on the door but a loud pounding. Somehow I was not surprised to find Jake standing on the threshold with Wallace in tow. They seemed two of a kind and both making my life miserable.

"Hi, Teach," Jake greeted me.

"Where on earth did you find my dog?"

"Wallace? Gee, what a lousy name. A dog like this you should have called Killer or Spike. He was down at the pool hall mooching off the fellows. I read your name on the tag and brought him home to you. This fellow is really one of them juvenile delinquents."

This was surely the pot calling the kettle black and the picture of the two of them hanging around a pool hall was too much. First I laughed and then I cried and Jake wanted to know wasn't I glad to get my dog back safe.

I told him of the complaints and how I'd been thinking about a new home for him or having him put down.

"There should be a jail for dogs," he

said, "stick them in the cooler for awhile like my brother, J.B."

Then he asked if he could have the dog. I tried to explain that the dog would be as much a problem for him as he was for me. I couldn't see Jake handling the responsibility and he saw through my floundering excuses.

"You're like the lousy cops," he said angrily. "You'd rather kill him than give him to me. You think I couldn't take care of a little old mutt like him. Well, you can have him."

He left in a hurry and he avoided my eyes for the next few days but one afternoon he came up to my desk after school was out.

"I talked to my dad last night about your dog. He says we'll buy him from you. We'll pay whatever you say. Dad thinks he'd be company for me till J.B. gets out of jail."

This time I was really hard put for excuses. I explained that the dog needed a home where he could be safely confined and supervised with space for



exercise so he would keep out of trouble.

"I'd keep him tied," he suggested. I told him this might make the dog vicious and I would rather see him dead than chained up somewhere for the rest of his life.

Jake accepted my statements with bad grace. He went back to his gambling, smoking and fighting. Wallace was good for awhile but as spring came on his escape pattern began again. Then he committed a really serious crime. He squeezed through the door of a grocery store and tripped up an elderly customer. She wasn't hurt and she didn't threaten to sue but on this occasion I was not greeted by a phone call when I got home. There was a friendly policeman on the doorstep who gave me a stern warning.

News travels fast even in a small city. That night I was again wrestling with my dog problem when Jake appeared again at the door.

"Okay," he said without preamble, "so you won't give me the dog and you won't sell him to me but I looked all week and I found a place for him. Guy

used to keep a hunting dog and it's dead now. You can board him there by the week and I can go by and feed him and take him out for walks every day. I'll keep him out of trouble and this way we both got a dog."

Jake was right. For a while we both had a dog. I got busier as the term neared its end and he took more and more responsibility for Wallace, walking him all over town on his leash. In Jake's neighborhood a dog on a leash and a dog that was purebred was a rarity. Jake seemed to think it gave him status to be seen everywhere with such a dog, particularly one with Wallace's reputation. Wallace was happy too as he had someone who had plenty of time for walks, and stick throwing and sitting in the park watching the world go by. Often I would meet them and we would walk together and it was a very happy time for all three of us.

It would be nice to say that the love and companionship of a dog solved all of Jake's problems. Nothing in this world works out so neatly. However, the boy was happier and he was doing enough work in school to pass—although by a narrow margin. This promotion was not going to be a "social" one or a way of passing him on to another teacher as had been done in the past. What he was getting he was deserving.

I was to go home for the summer and attend summer school in a nearby college and then move to a larger city the following term. I had planned to take Wallace home with me and see if I could interest my parents in taking him on but they were not well and I was concerned about asking them.

A few days before I was to leave, I had arranged to meet Jake at the park for a walk with the dog. I went downtown to look for them and saw them sitting on the brick wall edging the park. For once, they were both being very quiet. Jake was staring at the little dog and looking wistful, thinking, I am sure, that his time with the dog was nearing its end. As I watched them unaware of my presence I knew what I had to do.

I called Jake and he looked around, his expression showing his dread of a "last" something. "Hi."

"I've got some news for you, Jake. I've decided that I can't take Wallace home with me after all. Do you think you can take care of him now? You've learned to brush him and feed him and I think he'd be happier with you—he doesn't know my family."

Jake didn't wait for me to finish. He let out a whoop and went running off in the park, the dog frisking at his heels. For once I had left him speechless. No fresh comebacks, only a watery smile.

The picture of the two of them frisking off together stays with me still as one of those scenes in which the world seems just right.

# "SCOTTISH TERRIER MATRIARCHS"

The S.T.C. of Greater Washington, D. C.

In a "matriarchy" there is a stronger than usual mother-to-daughter sequence. Although the term is not customarily used in connection with dog breeding, it seems appropriate in those few cases where the family line is so important in the production of high class stock that it equals or surpasses the male line. Wherever an important family line continues to produce winners, there is evident a key bitch, a matriarch who is able to pass along the best qualities of her line and to establish an ever-widening sphere of influence through her daughters.

Prepotent bitches which throw good ones to different sires appear only occasionally, but it is possible for any intelligent breeder with patience and foresight to build up a family line capable of producing better than average stock. The foundation matron chosen must come from producing bloodlines and be of good breeding type for through her, by careful selection and breeding of her best daughters, the bottom line of the pedigrees which result can become an increasingly strong base for future breeding efforts.

British breeders, perhaps less hurried and impatient than Americans, have built up more of these influential families and by far the most impressive of the lot was that marvelously productive line of matrons bred in William Singleton's Walsing kennel in the south of England. The line was based on the key bitch TWINKLE OF DOCKEN. She was a daughter of that great sire of good bitches, CH. ORNSAY BRAVE, and on her family line traced to the Tottenham group of matrons, also producers of good daughters. Bred to CH. HEATHER NECESSITY, she produced the sisters, MALGEN STARSHINE, Grand-dam of CH. MALGEN JUGGERNAUT, and that most famous of bitches, CH. WALSING WHISPER, who founded a mother-to-daughter sequence which is known wherever good Scotties are bred.

From one of Whisper's daughters, CH. RIPPLE OF ROOKES, originated many of the Marlu winners through her granddaughter, CH. MARLU MORNING GLORY. The main line from Whisper and the one most often seen in American pedigrees was, however, thru the daughter, WALSING WAITRESS. Waitress was the dam of two important daughters, WALSING WAIVER, the source of many Tomlin champions, and BR.CH. WALSING WELBORN,

justly famous as the dam of three great sires. HEATHER BENEFACTOR and the champions, W.WARRANT and W.WHIRLWIND. WELLBORN also continued the family line thru three daughters, W.WYONA and the champions W.WISHBONE and W. WELLADAY. WYONA was the granddam of AM. CH. WALSING LOMOND LANCER OF HAMPTON HILL. He is an unusual example of breeding to a family line for each of his eight great-great-grandparents trace in direct tail female to WHISPER. In a combination of line breeding to FASHION HINT and family breeding to CH. W. WELLBORN, Tom Lin Kennels produced three champions in one litter: WALSING WALKOVER, WHIRLWAY, and WINSOM OF TOM LIN. Most of the champions emanating from the the Walsing matrons reveal strong inbreeding to the family, a program which many breeders consider more productive of high quality terriers than breeding to the male line. Certainly, WHISPER and her daughters, when bred to BARTY, NECESSITY or their best sons, left an imposing roster of great names as their contribution to Scottish Terrier history.

CLUB HISTORY - In the early '50s the only Scottish Terriers of quality in Florida came out of the Middlemount Kennel in Clearwater Florida and was owned by the late G. Bruce Webb. He had a number of home bred Champions and boasted of having the rare Golden Wheatens, one of the few breeders in this country to breed this color.

In the early part of 1956 it was decided to form a Club to improve the quality of local Scotties. At the 1st meeting, Mr. C. J. Fitzgerald (Boston Terrier fancier,) was on hand to give his most able assistance in working up our Constitution and By-laws. On Aug. 7, 1956 the 1st monthly meeting was held.

During this memorable evening the members selected a name, GREATER MIAMI SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB. Officers were nominated and voted into office. President Ralph MacDonald; Vice-President Monroe Reese; Treasurer Samuel Hollister; Secretary Louise Ellsworth; Directors Miriam Reese, Eleanor MacDonald and Bonnie Hollister.

This small group of Scottie lovers worked very hard to build up the Club's membership, and raise money to hold the first AKC Matches.

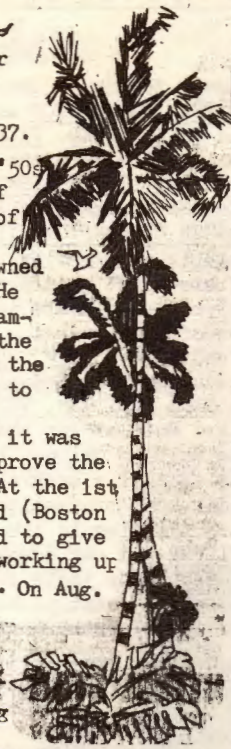
The American Kennel Club approved the Club's Constitution and By-laws and advised that we hold two AKC Sanctioned "A" Matches within the year. In mid summer 1957 the 1st "A" Match was held. A most successful affair, with an entry of 20 some dogs. The 2nd "A" Match was held with an even larger entry.

With the required AKC Sanctioned "A" Matches behind us, the Club was ready for its 1st point Show. Our young and very small Club was asked to join the Combined Specialty Clubs of Miami.

The first Specialty was scheduled to be held in January 1959. Mr. Alva Rosenberg was our 1st Judge and he gave BEST OF BREED to Ch. Blantart Bewitching. (Witchie was owned by Blanche Reeg and Blanche handled her to BEST IN SHOW next day at the Miami All Breed Show)

In September 1958 the Club was incorporated in the state of Florida as a non-profit organization and received the State Charter.

Of the original 20 Charter members only five remain in the Club to-day. Edna & Bob Cleary,



Florence Buch, Ann Landry, and Louise Ellsworth.

There have been good times and again some pretty rough times for a young and growing Club. During the years of our existence it is felt that there has been great improvement in the breed in this area. With all our active members striving for top quality Scotties, we honestly believe without all the efforts spent this could not have happened.

With the continued effective leadership the Club has been fortunate to have in the past, we are assured of the continued growth both in membership, leadership and high quality of the SCOTTISH TERRIER in South Florida.

ABROAD

With not much in the way of show news happening in Canada and our postal unrest further complicating things, perhaps this time can be devoted to an article which appeared in the 1949 Year Book of the S.T.C. of England. Here one should note that this was the last year of the old standard for our breed and hence the reason for concern. I feel this is worthy of reprint as, after the article I wrote entitled "The Degeneration of the Scottie" and which finally appeared both in The U.S. and England, I received several lengthy letters, clippings from magazines etc, not only to do with scotties but with all terrier breeds and a general feeling DOES prevail that terriers are getting TOO LARGE. It would have been most interesting to have received some word from "the other side", ie, one who likes a large scot.

The following is re-printed by kind permission of the S.T.C. of England, and for those new to our breed, the late Mrs. Winnie Barber bred under the Scotia prefix. Coming from a "terrier family" she knew what a scot should be and she never forgot what the prime aim in breeding one was. She exhibited Scotia Generous Gift first at age of 11 months in 1934 and took the bitch C.C. and quickly made her a Champion, with four C.C.'s to her credit.

#### WINNIE BARBER SAYS HANDS OFF THE STANDARD WEIGHT.

Mrs. Caspersz has given me a choice of subjects on which to write a few words, and mine goes to "Size and Weight" because I feel very strongly about this particular subject.

There have been, through the years, a number of attempts to alter certain aspects of the Standard, and just recently the question of weight has reared its ugly head. I feel most emphatically that any movement to increase the Standard weight IS UGLY, because it widens the scope of SIZE, which is much more important than actual weight could ever be.

I am not an advocate of the little 'uns, neither am I anxious to condemn the big 'uns, for there are good ones in both categories, but what I do want to ram home is that the Standard is our GUIDE and has stood us in good stead. As a guide it can be of the utmost service and therefore we must keep it moderate and never extreme. Weight and size can never be properly measured to the fraction of an ounce or the fraction of an inch; "ain't natural," and heaven forbid that the Scottish Terrier should ever be subjected to the weighing machine or the measuring stick. We ourselves differ very considerably, and it could never be laid down that every woman should tally with the measurements of the Venus de Milo!!

However, in our breeds, we must have a guide, therefore we must state a weight. In the

Standard adopted by the Scottish Terrier CIUB of England, size is described thus:

"The ideally made dog in hard show condition would weigh from 17 lbs. to 21 lbs." The Standard could perhaps be more descriptive (I have always thought that Standards were rarely made sufficiently clear); it could well describe bitches from 17 lbs. to 20 lbs. dogs from 19 lbs to 21 lbs. However, I think it is a mistake to tamper too much with fundamental things, and the Standard of a breed is fundamental. The Standards of our British breeds were drawn up by wise men, and aided and abetted by succeeding generations of breeders. The Scottish Terrier became a power in the land, not only in the British Isles but in many parts of the world to which his popularity had carried him. He is world renowned, so why tamper with the basic rules laid down? If the weight were raised now, to suit those who wish to cross the T's and dot the I's, mark my words, in five years there will be bigger -- but I much doubt better Scottish Terriers. Then it will be "up she goes again" and the grand little Diehard will no longer be a handy size terrier, but an awkward misfit, who will no longer be eligible to enter the category of low-legged Terriers, and may be dangerously near getting pushed into the long-legged section! !

The Scot must retain his size in order to maintain type, and pray let us keep Scottish Terrier type as our main consideration. A Standard weight should, in my opinion, be a guide, a brake, but not a master. The argument for raising the weight at the present time is-- "None of our winners could do the weight; they would all be a pound or so over," and so, in blissful ignorance it is proposed to alter the weight to fit the dogs! ! Is not that a retrograde step? To me it sounds like opening the door wider instead of an attempt to close the gap.

I love the breed deeply, and my love for it did not begin with my owning Scottish Terriers around 1934; it began many moons before that when my Father bred them when I was a child. I learnt much Diehard lore from him and from his friends, the foremost breeders of those days: W. L. McCandlish, E. Royston Mills, H. R. B. Tweed, Mrs. Hannay and many others, and whilst they might not exactly approve of the modern Scottish Terrier they would be very unhappy if they knew that the Standard weight was likely to be increased.

The year 1974 saw 41 Scotties in the obedience ring -- 27 in NOVICE, 12 in OPEN, and 2 in UTILITY. In 1973, only 5 were shown in OPEN! The obedience 'Certificate of Merit' awards will be mailed out soon to the 23 Scotties who had their degrees listed in the '74 Gazettes -- this includes 16 in NOVICE and 7 in OPEN. Starting this year however, the 'Certificates of Merit' will be mailed out as soon as they are listed in the Gazette.

Did you know that the Scottish Terrier Club of Northern Ohio presents an engraved English Tankard to each member who has either finished a Champion or completed an Obedience Degree during the past year at their annual Awards Banquet!

Obedience buffs will enjoy reading 'The Story of Dog Obedience' which has just been published (Howell, \$12.50). The book is essentially two books in one. The first half was written by Miss Saunders and covers obedience from its infancy (1933) up thru the early 1960s. Miss Reiley then continues the story (Miss Saunders passed away in 1964) and brings the reader up to the present time. The book has many pictures from the early days in obedience plus many statistics.

The following is an excerpt from the January '75 issue of OFF-LEAD"-- it is an item about Diana Wittich's Scottie "Brae Bonnie McTavish". "I started training Bonnie when she was six months old. After four weeks, she finally learned to 'sit'. It went like that for about two years; after which she was retired without even having been to so much as a match. Every now and then I unretired her for a day or two, only to give up again. Then followed a lovely interlude during which I got my Malamut, Teeka, and put her through to a CD. Bonnie then suddenly decided that she wanted to work! Back to school we went and she did quite well until I put her in a few matches and a trial -- then she acted like she never had a lesson in her life. She was retired again and then last spring I took her to a match and finally entered her in the Greenwich K.C. Trial -- where she qualified with a 184! On top of this shock, Greenwich must be the only show in the country to offer a trophy for the Highest Scoring Scottish Terrier in Trial. But, then there was another Scottie entered -- however, this was Bonnie's day and we took home a lovely silverplated trophy. Bonnie is now 8½, which will give her the distinction of being one of the oldest Scotties to receive a CD (when she receives 2 more legs)".

Diana's little story brings up another subject which is worthy of mentioning. Many of you donate trophies for the breed ring -- but have you ever thought to offer one for 'Highest Scoring Scottish Terrier in Trial'?
