GUIDELINES FOR STCA SPECIALTIES

- I. Proposals to host - an STCA Rotating Specialty must be made in writing to the STCA Corresponding Secretary at least 18 months before the date of the proposed show.

Proposals should include the following:

1. Date of show.
2. Location and site layout-graph, if available.
3. If show is to be held in conjunction with an all breed club, give name of club or organization.
4. A list of Terrier Judges judging in the area during time of show may be submitted for consideration by the Board.
5. Any amenities to be offered by host club as an inducement to STCA.
6. Name and address of superintendent.
7. Previous specialty experience.
8. List of Club's officers.

- II. STCA Board will consider all proposals and make a selection. Judges will be selected by the STCA Board.

STCA Vice-President shall serve as National Show Chairman for all STCA specialties.

STCA Corresponding Secretary shall notify host club of STCA acceptance of proposal and write AKC for approval.

Upon receipt of AKC approval, Corresponding Secretary will notify host club and STCA president.

Host club shall select a Co-Show Chairman, who will work with and keep National Show Chairman informed. Co-Show Chairman will be responsible to the National Show Chairman for progress reports when requested and oversee all committees pertaining to the show.

You are supposed to handle puppies after their eyes are open. Some people think that you should keep everyone away from them and don't handle them. You don't grab them, you don't handle them fast, but they should be handled every day. Children can if you watch them and they handle them easily because the puppies must get accustomed to hands.

Swimmers are common when you start raising Scotties. I can't tell you why. I had them years ago and I don't have them now and I have all the same line of dogs. When you have the same line down through the generations and you have had swimmers and then you don't, it must prove that it isn't inherited - it's something in the management. I don't think that it is fatal and I don't think that it's usually permanent damage and it seems to even confuse the Veterinarians. I have never tried to do anything with them. I don't believe in hobbling them or putting anything under them at first. If they are slipping on paper, the more they use their legs - the more they're going to get their muscles going. The best thing, of course, is out on grass when they get four to six weeks old. A little leg massage for better blood circulation may help.

Always keep puppies on the level floor and this is very important for puppies. There are so many things that can happen to them going up and down and especially in small pens where they are jumping up at you all the time. Jumping on their back legs, especially if they are too fat, the weight on those bones, we feel, makes them cow-hocked especially when they get up to four months old when they are getting their teeth, their bones are soft.

There are ways to manage the teeth so that you don't have trouble. In fact, I don't think there need be any serious trouble with teeth, although it is hereditary in some lines. If you find --(and I'm not real sure about the time) but it's from four to five months -- the lower canines will often come up inside of the puppy canines and they'll stay inside and they grow up into the jaw if you don't get those outside baby teeth out. That is why we give them large bones at a certain age but not after they get their teeth - - about 5½ to 6 months. You can start at 2 months with bones and they will work at them. If you can't get those teeth out yourself, take the pup to your Vet and ask him to pull the lower canines. I think that the more they use those jaws, the better the teeth are going to be. You know if they use their jaws after they get their second teeth and they play with ball and open their mouth too wide and do pulling and that sort of thing they get muscles on their cheeks which is bad. Also from 3 months on let them chew on dog biscuits or purina chow -- but watch so they don't get them caught in their mouth or teeth.

I usually start feeding puppies at three weeks, and I use scrapped beef with a little warm water and a tiny bit of salt. It seems to me that they learn to eat that better than they do with milk. If not hungry they are getting enough milk from the mother.

Lack of spread in ribs can be improved with correct management, by feeding them only three times a day -- two meals and one milk meal -- giving one large meal at night. Getting their stomachs full at night and letting them go to sleep seems to spread their ribs. We don't keep water down for puppies. It bloats them and it takes up the room that they are supposed to have for food. Remember to feed the bitch according to the size of the litter. Then too, remember that while the puppies are nursing, you must look out for worms. A vet once told me that if the bitch is kept clean and washed off there wouldn't be so much of this worm problem.

There is another thing that I think we should all watch for in Scotties is temperament. I have bred for temperament and I think to make our breed a desirable breed we should always think of temperament. Watch out for the timid puppy. Temperament is too important in the show ring -- you want an alert dog that knows everything that goes on and one with a little bit of fire. However, a timid puppy can make a nice pet for someone and some prefer it.

Another thing is what age to sell puppies. We like to get a very decent price for our dogs. They're valuable little dogs and we don't want them to get too common. I think we should keep them a little longer. I think we can deliver a puppy at 10 weeks with perfect safety for the purchaser if they have had their shots.

Then there is lead training which is another thing that I think is important. About 8 to 9 weeks is a good time to start. Put a tape or something similar around the puppy's neck (which he'll sit and fuss at for awhile but in a couple of days he'll forget about it.) This way he will get accustomed to having something around his neck. Don't just take him out and stand still and wait on him to walk. It might sound cruel but puppies respond to comfort and discomfort. Put a light show lead on him and walk and keep your feet going all the time whether he goes or not and make him very miserable when he doesn't do the right thing. Don't pull constantly on the lead but jerk and let loose repeatedly and then just the minute he takes a step or two, tell him how good he was and pet him and you'll be amazed in five minutes the first day how much he has learned.

III. Upon notification of STCA and AKC approval, the host club will notify STCA Corresponding Secretary and National Show Chairman of the names, addresses and telephone numbers of the following:

1. Co-Show Chairman
2. Local Trophy Chairman
3. Local Advertising Chairman
4. Dinner - Hospitality Chairman
5. Headquarters location.

Host club will arrange for competent ring stewards if necessary.

Requests for any necessary monies must be made in writing to the Corresponding Secretary and National Show Chairman with an explanation of need. Subject to approval of the STCA Board.

Co-Show Chairman must notify Corresponding Secretary, National Show Chairman and the National Trophy Chairman of the type of premium list to be used, (Regular or Abbreviated). Co-Show Chairman immediately upon being advised of premium deadline and advertising deadline will notify Corresponding Secretary and National Trophy Chairman.

Co-Show Chairman will contact superintendent as to parent Club's responsibility, re: Sweepstakes rules and procedure, does superintendent require a check to cover Sweepstakes prize money before date of show, is STCA Treasurer responsible for supplying all cash prizes and envelopes.

Corresponding Secretary shall be responsible for preparing premium list.

Co-Show Chairman will notify Corresponding Secretary, National Show Chairman and Treasurer of entry fees for Sweepstakes. Regular and Non-Regular Classes well before cut-off date for submission of premium list to show superintendent. Also advertising rates.

IV. Local Trophy Chairman will work with the National Trophy Chairman. Local Trophy Chairman will be responsible for selection, purchase and setting up of trophies at the show. Local Trophy Chairman will be furnished with a complete outline. National Show Chairman will be responsible for insuring that National Trophy Chairman provides such an outline to local counterpart.

Any checks received by Local Trophy Chairman must be made payable "STCA Trophy Fund". Checks will be forwarded along with name and address of donor to the National Trophy Chairman.

Local Trophy Chairman will contact superintendent approximately two weeks before the show for total entries for classes and Sweepstakes, and will notify Treasurer of Sweepstakes entry.

V. Corresponding Secretary will contact Hospitality Chairman as to STCA's needs of a meeting room, date and time. Cost of room is STCA's responsibility.

Hospitality Chairman will contact judges and formally welcome them, asking if hotel and club dinner reservations can be made. Arrangements for meeting judges at airport, or otherwise (if needed), will be the responsibility of the Hospitality Committee.

Judges dinner at banquet to be paid for by STCA.

Needs and comfort of judges at the show, (coffee, cold drink, lunch, "Wash & Dries", pen and chair), will be the responsibility of the Hospitality Committee.

Hotel reservation cards (supplied by hotel) will be mailed to STCA membership by local Co-Show Chairman.

Clear directions to show site and judging time shall be made available to all at official headquarters by Co-Show Chairman.

A "Hospitality Room" will be at the discretion of the host club. If one is decided on a mention can be made in dinner reservation notices and in premium list if an independent specialty is being held.

VI. Local Advertising Chairman will work with National Advertising Chairman and will be in charge of soliciting all local non STCA advertising. All checks received for advertising shall be made payable "STCA". Checks, ads, names and addresses of advertisers will be

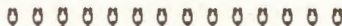

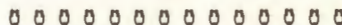

Don't ever let him run with his head on the ground even if you have to hang him up by the lead. It won't take long. Just a few minutes at a time. Proper lead training is very important if you intend to show your dog and must be correctly done from the first.

Like lead training, proper behavior during grooming is important also. Teach your dog to stand properly on a grooming table.

I bred for 15 years before I got a blue ribbon. If I can in any way help people to get some fun out of this in 5 years, what it took me fifteen, I would feel like I have done something for Dogdom. However, no one is a born handler, breeder, trimmer, or groomer, and I say you have to serve an apprenticeship.

Percy Roberts, one time, made a speech about breeding and judging and he said, "Just remember, there is no standard for mediocrity, only for perfection". (end)

SCOTTISH TERRIERS

WHELPING PROBLEMS.

Emergencies may not occur too often during whelping but when they do, prompt action is usually necessary to save puppies or the bitch. One such emergency has recently been called to my attention which will be related in the hope it might prove helpful in a similar situation.

A champion Scottie bitch, five years old, was whelping her third litter. The first born, a bitch was ruptured in birth or by the mother cutting the umbilical cord too close. The aperture was about the size of the end of a pencil. Immediately a considerable length of intestine popped through the opening. Any effort to replace it caused further pressure, which in turn caused additional lengths of intestine to be expelled. The puppy was taken from its mother and wrapped in a clean soft cloth to keep it warm and to prevent further protruberance of the intestine. This action also served to preserve moisture and to prevent drying out of the intestine.

As usually happens, it was after office hours. However, the veterinarian when called at home, promised to come by the office, pick up his instruments and come as quickly as possible. Within thirty minutes he was examining the puppy. He found it impossible to reinsert the intestine through the original opening. Without anesthetic he made the opening larger, reinserted the intestine, sewed the inside of the incision and then pulled the outer skin together and firmly sewed it. After the operation was completed an antibiotic injection was administered to prevent infection. The puppy was then returned to its mother, who in the meantime had two additional ones! She welcomed the troubled one and cared for it as tenderly as the others--seven in all.

The litter grew up normally. The one operated upon was standard in weight, size and possessed normal characteristics as though nothing untoward had ever occurred. Prompt action saved the life of a puppy.

DOGGY DENTIST - While not recommended for all cases, a true story of a Scottie bitch correcting a painful maladjustment in a partial dental happened to a friend of mine. The bothersome plate had been sleepily placed under the pillow, and on awakening the owner heard a cracking, crunching noise made by her Scottie bedfellow in play. On examination the toy was found to be the dental plate. In an effort to discover the damage, after careful washing, the plate was found to fit perfectly--all maladjustment was corrected and has remained so for several years.

Terriers were on Friday, February 11th this year (they alternate between Fridays and Saturdays) and despite it being a normal "workday" for most people there was an almost record crowd, certainly it is a long while since I've seen so many round the Scottie ring. People were standing two and three deep, some said four deep in places, behind those lucky enough to have got ringside seats.

Mrs. Muriel Owen (Gaywyn), President of the Scottish Terrier Breeders' and Exhibitors Association, judged an entry of 66; the slightly lower entry than last year being accounted for by the natural absence of Gaywyn Stock! Her final choice made two people unexpectedly happy - Mrs Elsbeth Clerc, who flies over regularly from Switzerland to exhibit at our major Championship Shows, handled her English bred resident Swiss Roansch Solo (2 C.C.'s and numerous Reserve C.C.'s upto Crufts) by Ch. Reanda Rocksilver out of Ch. Jetstorm Black Mystery and was given Best Dog in the Open Class over 9 full Champions entered in the Class and went on to get the Dog Challenge Certificate and finally Best of Breed. Reserve C.C. was Miss Jane Millers' Brio Offenbach.

The bitch ticket went to Nanette of Noonson, by Am. Ch. Noonson Merry Monarch out of Gillson Enterprise, Handled by Geof Corish for her owner, Mrs. Nellie Holland Reserve Bitch C.C. was Mrs. Mary Sheppard's Tadwick Fontasia, which is just waiting to be made up, with so many reserve tickets. Her day will come very soon.

Mrs. Clerc's win was also a nice welcome home present for Mrs Elsa Meyer who had only just returned home after a serious eye operation, which I'm glad to be able to tell all her many friends was successful, though it will be some time before she can write letters.

I heard that a bottle of Champagne was broken open during the evening in celebration!

Both C.C. wins were well deserved as one could not meet two nicer or more enthusiastic and careful breeders, both put the well being of their dogs above everything else. Solo has been with Elsa Meyer since birth. But now she is made up will soon be joining her owner in Switzerland. He has already sired a number of promising progeny, the latest being a Canadian Champion owned by Mrs. Margaret Moran of Regina.

The rest of this report is still on Crufts. There was a tremendous number of overseas visitors, far more than usual, and amongst those from USA

I spotted Mrs Munro, Mrs. Kinney, Ms. Crissey, Mr. & Mrs. Marjedens and Mr. Alfred Mitchell; Mrs. Joyce Holdham President of the Canadian S.T.C., with strong contingents from Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Italy, France, Holland, Spain, and Belgium, etc. Many were over trying to buy stock but I fear that some of those wanting bitches may have been unlucky as they are at a premium these days; in the last few years we seem to have had nothing but a surplus of dogs, in fact I know of one breeder who recently had three litters with eleven dogs and not a single bitch. The S.T.B.E.A. Breed Club table was busy all day with visitors and I reckon more than 500 people must have come up to look at the display, if not to purchase or pay their Subs! The most popular item seemed to be a nice Scottie Asktray in Melamine. Two girls from the famous Dagenham Girls Pipers Band were in attendance in full Scottish costume (but without their pipes and drums!) making an additional attraction and entered into the fun of things by having their photographs taken with visitors. They were shown on our "Nationwide" T.V. news programme on the following Monday, giving Scotties some welcome publicity.

As I mentioned in my first report the A.G.M. of the Scottish Terrier Club (England) was held in the afternoon, (Dewar) Mrs. Lilian Dewar was elected President to replace the gap left by the death in early 1976 of Mr. W. M. Singleton, the father figurehead of British Scotties and almost as well known in America, as in England, for his WALSING breeding. The Board of Directors has approved the comprehensive revision of the Sanctioned Match Regulations, effective July 1, 1977 (copies of these regulations will be available without cost as of June 1, 1977.

(see March Issue of the Gazette page 168)

Every breed has its pillars - those dogs or bitches which in themselves have contributed considerably or brought about a turning point in their respective breed either by their prepotency in males or by an ability in females to produce excellent specimens in every litter who in turn breed true to type. In Scottish Terriers, CH. HEATHER NECESSITY a sensation when he first appeared, went on to win 20 C.C.'s and to rake up an equally impressive record as sire of 16 British Champions. NECESSITY represented the ultra-modern type of his day, he was long in head, short in body, he was black and he was so prepotent he set his stamp on his progeny and from his time on the Scottie did not look back, thus it is without hesitation that NECESSITY is considered a pillar and most, if not all Scottish Terriers today trace back to him.

From NECESSITY we travel a number of years on and another 13 generations in tail-male line through such great names as HEATHER, WALSING, ROSEHALL, GLENDOUNE, VIEWPARK and on to KENNELGARTH. Quite an impressive list! From NECESSITY and counting him, there were 9 champions, the other 5 were born during the War years when no shows were held, however one, WALSING WIZARD made a lasting name for himself without a title. It is worthwhile noting this tail-male line from NECESSITY for the next 13 generations.

To most people the number 13 would seem unlucky, but to Betty Penn-Bull that number had no meaning at all when on November 20th. 1959 she tended her CH KENNELGARTH GLEAM about to give birth to a litter sired by her own CH. KENNELGARTH EROS. There were four puppies, all males. They were quite even in type and ultimately two were sold as pets and two retained. One became KENNELGARTH GLADIATOR, the other KENNELGARTH VIKING. GLADIATOR did quite well at shows but was sold when about one year old as VIKING looked the more promising and Miss Penn-Bull did not wish to keep two litter-mates.

Those of us who have had Scotties for a number of years and regard them as housepets and companions, know that along the way will come that very special one who seems more than any other to attach himself to you. He follows you around the house, is your absolute shadow. His eyes constantly gaze up at you to take in every thought, expression or word you utter. Even when out with the others seemingly enjoying himself in carefree frolic, his glance will show he has not forgotten you and if you move away he will immediately leave the rest to follow you. Such was VIKING. He went everywhere with his owner. To her he was perfect and there could never be another like him. He had the three requisites - looks, temperament and ability to reproduce his like. He lived quite a bit of his life in London. The garden was large and the Kennelgarths were certainly not cramped for space. Daily walks to Streatham Common just minutes away, outings to Wimbledon Common (a Common is a wooded area) or Richmond Park, all must have been a truly delightful sight to behold as Miss Penn-Bull accompanied 10 at a time, all running free and happy.....one of them being little VIKING who was later to be called The Living Legend.

International Judge, Mr. Warner Hill hailed him as "The Sire of the Century in any Breed". Stanley Dangerfield in an article entitled Top Dogs wrote, "I choose the Scottie, CH. KENNELGARTH VIKING. He dominates, not merely the world of Scotties, but the world of most other breeds. For me he is the dog of the decade." A feature page in The Field on Cruft's in 1969 was headed, 'A Viking Among Terriers' and to quote, "Perhaps the most remarkable dog present this year was a Scottish Terrier who was not competing. CH. KENNELGARTH VIKING is owned by Miss Betty Penn-Bull of Water Oakley, Windsor. VIKING is our greatest stud dog of any breed, and was present on parade only. Twenty-two of the thirty placed Scottish Terriers were his direct children or grandchildren, winning among them awards for Best of Breed; both Challenge Certificates and both Reserve Challenge Certificates."

In Britain, Championships do not come by lightly and to sire 23 British Champions is indeed a worthy feat, with a grand total of over fifty around the world, plus hundreds of winning and champion descendants and you have a picture of a modern day pillar of the breed. The achievement of siring 23 British Champions is one which has never been exceeded by any dog in any breed in the history of British Dogdom.

No article on CH. KENNELGARTH VIKING would be complete without a list of his British Champions, in alphabetical order, Dogs and Bitches.

When VIKING turned 11, he was honoured with a birthday party at the home of friend Nellie Holland. He sat on the rug by the fireside with Nellie's two cats, two dogs and watched by their family parrot and was quite self-possessed and dignified. Nellie wrote of him, "One has only to see this beautiful little dog to understand why so many of his descendants have that unmistakable star quality. At 11 years of age he is still every inch a Champion. Compact, retaining his lovely head and outline, and with his superb coat, he is indeed an eye-catcher, but perhaps even more than his looks, the truly outstanding thing about VIKING is his personality. A Showman through and through (how Betty must have rejoiced when she took him in the ring); obviously teeming with terrier 'guts' and spirit; a gay, gallant little gentleman, monarch of all he surveys and yet willing to make friends with those odd two-legged creatures who come to stare at him - no wonder he is a star."

Understandably Betty Penn-Bull wrote me, "It was perhaps the saddest day of my life when I had to have VIKING put to sleep on 1st June, 1971 age 11½ . . . he still looked wonderful and even at the end he stood with ears and tail up and watched and followed me and his courage never failed."

There is no doubt in my mind, CH. KENNELGARTH VIKING should be afforded the initial "V" in male lines and all stock tracing from him in tail-male lines and all stock tracing from him in tail-male line would display his V and be of lineage AHCLNFV. He was indeed a pillar, just as his illustrious ancestor 13 generations back was.

I would like to thank Mrs. Nellie Holland (Noonsun) and the North of England STC for allowing me to reprint excerpts from their Bulletin and especially to Betty Penn-Bull herself for kindly helping me trace a little of the life of her CH. KENNELGARTH VIKING, the Scottie who became a "LEGEND IN HIS OWN TIME" yet who lived the happy, carefree life of a housepet, totally unspoiled by all his greatness.

S.T.C.A. Board Meeting - October 6, 1973
Motion - T. Allen Kirk. . The STCA will offer the following:

1. A Certificate of Merit signed by the President will be awarded to ALL OWNERS OF SCOTTISH TERRIERS OBTAINING ANY OBEDIENCE DEGREE.

2. For STCA MEMBERS ONLY: The STCA will award, on an annual basis awards to the top obedience Scotties of the year. The award is to be computed by the total of the 3 highest scores received by the dog from October to October. Awards are to be given one to each Division: Novice (GD); Open (CDX); Utility (UDO). The owners will be responsible for notifying the statistician of these scores. Second by Tom Natalini and the motion carried.

This is the complete motion that was passed by the STCA Board.

As it only takes three qualifying scores of 170 points or more/and more than half of the points in each exercise to qualify for a leg, it is only necessary to send me the scores of the three legs to be computed.

As I have just received this position, please be patient, all those who deserve the certificates and awards will receive them.

The owners will be responsible for notifying me of the following:

1. Date of issue of obedience certificate from the A.K.C.
2. The A.K.C. Gazette that the conformation of title appeared in, if known.
3. The obedience degree received.
4. The name of shows and dates where the three legs were obtained.
5. Whether the owner is a member of the STCA.

I will honor degrees obtained since 1976 (October 1975 thru October 1976).

Once I have verified the degree, you will receive your STCA obedience certificate of merit.

Dear Mrs. Ellsworth:

I have had Scotties for several years, and have competed with them successfully in obedience. Approximately four years ago we lost our three year old bitch to a rare form of cancer, lymph sarcoma, or lymphoma. Needless to say, we were horrified to lose her like that, but resigned ourselves and went out and got another dog. We still had our male, and got another bitch.

Last month I noticed that the male's nodes were slightly enlarged, so rushed him to the Vet for a checkup. One Vet diagnosed lymphoma, but ran a blood test which did not have an abnormal white count, so ruled it out. I went to another Vet for a second opinion; he diagnosed lymphoma immediately, stating that the blood test is inconclusive; the white count is not necessarily elevated. This Vet did a great deal of research on this disease for me; he also showed me the textbooks and let me read for myself. The disease is always fatal, although medication may keep the dog alive for a period of from six months to two years. There is also a new medication available for experimentation that is said to keep them alive for up to five years. "Boo" was quite far gone at this point, so we had him put to sleep.

I questioned the Vet on the odds of my having two dogs within four years die of such a rare form of cancer. The two were unrelated, and both Vets assured me that nothing I was doing could have any influence on their contracting the disease. I think only 5 out of 100,000 dogs contract lymphoma, so the odds are astronomical against this happening to us.

Then, at a dog match, we spoke to another Scottie breeder, and learned that he too had lost a dog, five years old, to this disease. This begins to become quite a coincidence. He happens to be from Louisiana also, but the only other relationship between the three dogs is their breed.

I am curious to find out if there is an abnormal percentage of Scotties contracting this disease, which would not necessarily be noticed by Vets because of the relative scarcity of Scotties. It is quite possible that Scotties are much more susceptible for some reason, but that no one has made the correlation yet. I would be interested to hear from anyone who has lost a Scottie due to this cause. I don't know

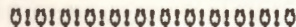

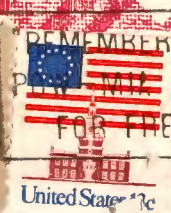
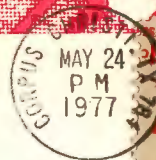
