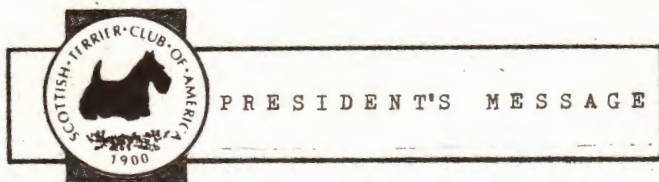

MINUTES OF REGIONAL CLUBS REPRESENTATIVES MEETING

Coach Inn - Fort Washington, Pa.

October 7, 1977.

The 2nd meeting of the Regional Clubs Representatives was called to order at 7:50 PM by Co-Chairman Miriam Stamm in the absence of Chairman Marilyn Meador.

REPRESENTATIVES PRESENT:

Billy Tolles and Kathy Brown - S.T.C. of New England, Danalee Saar - S.T.C. of Greater Atlanta, Marjorie Cohen - Greater Miami S.T.C. Inc. Barbara Dunham - S.T.C. of California, Ann Wooldridge - San Francisco Bay S.T.C., Wayne and Cass Ridgley - S.T.C. of Greater Dayton, and Jackie Seelbach - S.T.C. of Greater New York.

S.T.C.A. BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT:

Dick Seelbach, STCA President, John Sheehan, STCA Vice-President, Joyce Gast STCA Recording Secretary, Miriam Stamm, STCA Board Member and Committee Co-Chairman, Robert Marshall, STCA Board Member, and Louise Ellsworth, STCA Board Member.

CO-CHAIRMAN Miriam Stamm welcomed everyone and thanked them for attending. Since no agenda was available Miriam Stamm asked the representatives to have a round table discussion of ideas, questions and comments pertaining to the role this committee could play in opening communication between the parent and Regional Clubs.

SUBJECT: S.T.C.A. DELEGATE TO THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB.

Members, especially new members, would like to be kept informed of the Delegates voting at the A.K.C. meetings and to have the opportunity to express an opinion before the Delegate casts a vote in the name of the S.T.C.A.

Methods of communications between Delegate and Regional Clubs: A news letter sent by Delegate to Regional Clubs; a column in the Bagpiper; or a Regional Club Newsletter.

DISCUSSION: The question arose to whether the membership of the S.T.C.A. in electing the Delegate to the A.K.C. allows him/her to vote as his/her conscience dictates or should the Delegate consult the Board or Membership.

Representatives were informed that the Delegate contact the STCA Corresponding Secretary regarding any correspondence received pertaining to business with the A.K.C.. This is done before every A.K.C. meeting.

This subject will be brought up for clarification at the STCA Board meeting.

SUBJECT: A symposium covering all phases of nutritional requirements through the life of the Scottie, grooming, and general health was desired. It was hoped that the symposium could be conducted by professionals, i.e., Veterinarians, groomers.

A regular column, written by a Veterinarian, to appear in the Bagpiper as a means to educate members and be of assistance to them. Services of Veterinarian would be paid by parent club.

DISCUSSION: Members were enthusiastic with the suggestion of a Scottish Terrier symposium. It was reported that the proposed Health Bank was eagerly received by both STCA and Regional Club members.

Increasing the effectiveness of the Bagpiper would result in higher publication cost. Financing of these projects were discussed. Suggestion of having Regional Clubs contribute to the costs of these projects was not favorably received by the representatives present.

SUBJECT: How to interest non-STCA, Regional Club members in the STCA. Many representatives reported disinterest in the STCA on the part of some of their members. A large majority of Regional Club members participated only in social functions. Regional Clubs found it very difficult to have 100% participation of their membership.

DISCUSSION: Better public relations on the part of the Parent Club is needed to stimulate the interest of these non-STCA Regional Club members.

It was estimated that 4 out of 6 Regional Club members belong to the STCA. There is a need of interest serious and non-serious breeders in joining the STCA.

Several suggestions were made as to what could be done to recruit members. A fact sheet or graph, illustrating on an uncomplicated level, the reasons why STCA membership would be beneficial. Frequent, more precise issues of the Bagpiper would help stimulate the interest of non-members. The expense could be covered by increase in revenue derived from dues.

A thought provoking question was asked of the representatives. How did present STCA members who live, or have lived, outside a Regional Club area become a member of the STCA, why did they join? Should the STCA solicit members?

SUBJECT: Cooperation from Regional Clubs is needed to enable the Parent Club to keep abreast of the progress of each club. Some representatives expressed their clubs surprise to learn the

Parent Club showed an interest in them.

DISCUSSION: The lack of cooperation on the part of some Regional Clubs in answering the questionnaire sent out in 1975 was brought up. Extensive graphs were prepared from these questionnaires and sent to all Clubs. This was done to show the governing Board of the STCA the progress of Regional Clubs. Misunderstanding the Parent Club's motives for requesting the information was cited as one of the reasons for the lack of response from some Regional Clubs.

SUBJECT: Need for help from the Parent Club on duties involving Regional Club show committees on the local specialty level. Many clubs, some newly formed, some who have new members in office, are inexperienced on the duties of different show committees.

DISCUSSION: Outlines from more experienced committee chairmen could be submitted and compiled. From these a thorough s.o.p., i.e., standard operation procedure, could be compiled and distributed to Regional Clubs for reference.

It was suggested it was not communication but education that was needed.

SUBJECT: Education of members. It appears that there is a need to educate members on all aspects of the Breed and Club.

DISCUSSION: Breed books should be utilized in the education of the Breed and history of the STCA. Photographs of all Specialty B.O.B. could automatically be sent to STCA Historian by show photographer as a means of keeping a pictorial history of the Breed.

Co-Chairman Miriam Stamm agreed that there is a need to furnish Regional Clubs with information in areas where no source is readily available. Although the Mini Workshops have been extremely successful, time would not allow for a more complete workshop. Articles on grooming, conformation and Breed standard should be made available to those who request it.

SUBJECT: Request for a Parent Club referral service made available to Regional Clubs.

DISCUSSION: It was pointed out that the STCA could not become involved in supplying names of those who had puppies available. This had to be the responsibility of the Regional Clubs and Breeders.

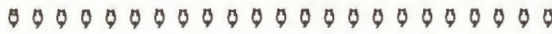
Co-Chairman Miriam Stamm reminded the representatives that the committee could not spread itself too thin. Results stemming from the committee would take time.

It is very nice to know from correspondence that these notes are actually read (at least by some!) and I was really delighted to receive one such letter from Mrs Betty Bailey of Ontario, Canada on the subject of our "Rescue Scheme." Apparently such a scheme had been in her mind for a long while so that when she read about the Scottish Terrier Emergency Care Scheme operating successfully in England she immediately mapped out details for a similar scheme for Canada in Co-operation with Barbara Dominski. Good luck Betty and Barbara, any help or advise we can give from this end is yours for the asking!

One thing I am sure of and that is that they will be surprised at the fantastic support they receive from the small breeder and pet owner, if our experiences are anything to go by. One such real Good Samaritan recently traveled 600 miles in a day to pick up 5 dogs we had rescued from the R.S.P.C.A., he and his wife giving up the whole of a Sunday and all he would charge the Scheme for expenses was \$1 per 100 miles. What is more he said, he would do it again anytime we needed him - with such good friends how can any Rescue Scheme fail?

Reading through "Dog World" before commencing this report I came across a paragraph headed, "A Scheme to Encourage" (having started on our Scheme I will keep on the same theme!).

This in fact referred to the thorny question of judging from the angle of up and coming judges. I did touch on how judges are elected in England in my last report but not on this particular aspect, which is an all important one for any breed. It struck me as being a very good way to encourage those who would like to judge but never seem to fit the chance. Although the breed in question is not ours there is nothing to stop it being adapted to any breed that has a number of Clubs within fairly easy reach of one another this I realise may be a problem in America but what better excuse for a get together of Scottie enthusiasts!

The Afghan Hound Club runs a training scheme and lectures for new judges at their individual Breed Clubs with a joint Seminar at which prospective judges can take tests and examinations - this latter point is somewhat similar to the European methods where Judges have to sit written examination before being passed.

The test is sit in two parts; one a searching question and answer paper sit by a qualified

Championship Show Judge in the breed and a written critique (as we call Judges reports over here) on five Afghans. This is done before three qualified Championship Show Judges who evaluate each candidates conduct, handling and examination of the dogs as well as the written critique which must include each dogs good and bad points, finally concluding with placements and reasons for such.

However good a judge he or she may prove to be they need practice so the next step was to try and persuade Societies to ask budding judges to this purpose, the Afghan Hound Club of Scotland sent round to other Scottish Clubs an explanation of what they call their "Junior Judges Examination" and a list of those who passed, with the promise that if Clubs chose judges from this list they would fully guarantee all classes, provide a special rosette and further all such appointments would be in an Honorary Capacity. This is a key point these days as at general shows the tendency in England is to appoint judges who can also do other breeds, so that one often has an All-rounder rather than a breed judge - with inflation as it is who can really blame any Club.

The Secretary of the A.H.C. ended by stating "that whilst we do not suggest sitting an Exam is the total answer to the making of a good future judge it does ensure that the candidates at least have a sound understanding of the conformation of an Afghan Hound and the Breed Standards.

Have you heard this one about the young man who had a Terrier which he took to show after show and never even got placed. After showing under a very well known old-time Yorkshire judge and getting nothing again he went up to him and said, "I can't understand it, this dog has a grand pedigree but I never win with it! What can I do?" The judge looked at him and then at the dog and replied, "Well, lad, if I was thee next time tha goes to a show take pedigree with thee and leave t'dog at home."

Finally I must tell you about two of my wife's bitches. One is nearly 11 years old and the other 6½ years (no direct relation), they have always lived in the kitchen with us and been clean until about nine months ago when the older bitch started drinking more than usual and needless to say the younger soon copied and followed suit. Gradually we found we were getting 'floods'. It finally got so bad that they could hardly be left a couple of hours it seemed before the water bowl was again empty and the mop was needed! So my wife decided that she would try taking them off their normal red meat diet altogether and put them onto white meat diet only (which included fish and eggs normally using as



# Are You

# Killing

# Your Puppies?

As dog breeders, we want to do everything possible to assure the birthing of healthy litters of puppies. Not only is this desirable from an economical standpoint, but in the majority of cases each litter has been carefully planned with the idea that from this breeding, hopefully, will come that great dog — the dog that will put us in the breeder-winners circle — a dog that will stamp his mark on the breed.

We study genetics and avidly read all the pieces of literature to aid us in not only producing an outstanding litter, but in raising all of the puppies to salable age. I am certain that most of you have read in this literature, as I have, the recommendation that penicillin or some type of antibiotic be administered to the bitch immediately following the birth of the last puppy to guard against uterus infections that sometimes occur after whelping. I have even read statements that this initial antibiotic should be followed by oral doses for the first week.

When their bitch is whelping, most "seasoned" breeders call on their veterinarians only in case of an emergency, having become more or less experts in delivering the puppies. I know many breeders, some of whom have been in the game a number of years and others who are complete novices who administer any shots they feel are necessary. These breeders are the ones who will purchase a supply of penicillin and store it in their refrigerator to have on hand at whelping time. When the last puppy arrives, they happily inject the bitch and sit back confident there won't be a chance for her to get any type of infection!

But then, something begins to happen. Sometimes within only 72 hours a puppy will begin acting full, sleepy and showing no interest in nursing. Later the puppy's stomach seems distended and it gives that pitiful puppy cry as death approaches.

"Oh well, you're bound to lose one puppy" the breeder reasons. It WAS one of the best looking ones though, and fearful the bitch might have gotten an infection that could be passed on to the puppies, he either gives another shot or starts the bitch on oral doses of antibiotics as a safeguard. Then, others begin acting the same way the first puppy did and the breeder stands by helplessly and watches the entire litter die, although his bitch is healthy as can be. What this breeder has experienced is the loss of his puppies to what is called "the fading puppy syndrome."

Before I write this I will knock on wood three times — I'm not superstitious, you understand — but I have been fortunate in all my breedings, and I have been breeding Collies since 1945, not to have experienced this "fading puppy syndrome" in any of my litters. Of course, in the earlier days we did not have penicillin or any of the other miracle drugs for our dogs. I remember, back in 1950 my husband had blood poisoning in his foot. The doctor impressed upon us how fortunate we were that we now had an antibiotic available to fight the infection, otherwise there would have been a danger of my husband losing either his life or his leg. The pills the doctor prescribed were called "gold pills" because of their high cost. Of course, since that time scientists have come up with more varieties of antibiotics and today they are being manufactured in large quantities and the price is within almost everyone's pocketbook.

As a breeder, I'm no different from anyone else with the exception that, possibly along with others of you, I am squeamish when it comes to sticking the needle in, so I take my bitch and puppies to my veterinarian within 24 hours after they are born so he can check them and the bitch to see if everything is all right.

MEMBER'S  
QUERY

We wish to thank the West of England S.T.Club - for the reprint of the following article that appeared in their October 1977 Bulletin N. 170.

In the July Bulletin we published a Query from a member who asked our advice on how to keep our complement of animals down to the capacity of one's kennel. We have much pleasure in giving below Miss Betty Penn Bull's suggestions for dealing with this problem.

"The potential breeder, "X", raises an interesting point which, of course, affects us all, and which we will all have to solve in our own way.

However, I do think it is important for anyone keeping a number of dogs to strike a happy medium between one's head and one's heart, and I think there is a great deal of misplaced sentimentality about not parting with dogs - just as there is unfortunately an element of callousness which disposes of dogs unsuitably, or puts them down unnecessarily.

As a general principle I think it is fair to allow 25% of one's stock to become pets and passengers, but to go beyond this is to upset the balance unreasonably if one has serious ideas as a breeder and exhibitor.

Then there are considerations from a dog's angle, and it is not much fun for a dog to spend its entire life in a kennel - and if it is not contributing to furthering the kennel's interests in the show or breeding programme then it seems pointless, and surely it is far better and kinder to place it in a home where it will have comfort and companionship. This is where I think the misplaced sentimentality comes in, and there is a lot of nonsense talked about not parting with a dog, when there is little enough to offer it, and it leads a dull and comfortless existence and would be far better off in a private home.

My own plan is to make a decision when a dog is five years old (if not before) and at this age I decide whether I intend to keep it permanently, or whether to pension it into a suitable home. My dogs are all companion-trained, so are able to go into private homes, but I always allow them to go on trial for a week or two to ensure they are happy and settle down, and that the new owners like them, and this safeguards both sides. I usually make a token charge of about 5 guineas to ensure that people do want the dog, but it is a low enough figure not to prevent ownership with those in the lower income group. But I would never give one unless I knew the people personally, as this can encourage an 'impulse' owner who does not seriously want the dog.

Now in the case of "X", as she already owns a Scottie bitch she would presumably wish to keep this as her pet. But unless it is good enough to form the foundation of her kennel she would be wiser to discard her from her breeding programme. If she breeds a litter from her it would be best to sell all and, with the price of two, purchase one better bitch - or, maybe, two better bitches with the proceeds of the whole litter.

If the existing bitch is good enough, then breed a litter and run on the two best from this. These can be retained until say six or seven months when the less good should be disposed of and the better one kept.

It is important at this stage to start being selective, and to keep parting with one youngster as it can be replaced with another better one.

If a kennel is limited to four, then I should say this could contain one pet, one brood bitch, and two youngsters from her to be running on. But if the pet does not count, then normally a minimum of two brood bitches are necessary to give scope, and this allows for the two youngsters coming on. The best youngster can be in the ring and in due course, when at its peak, it should be sold to make way for the next one. Or if there is scope to retain it for a litter, if a bitch, then this allows the opportunity to try it in this field. B.P.B.(to be continued).

OBEEDIENCE SCHOOL For Wee Scot. . . . . .

GOOD idea! But choose your instructor carefully. Visit a class first. An understanding instructor who knows Terriers will understand Wee Scot's desire to show off and challenge other dogs. Just keep your distance for a couple of weeks while diligently training at home. (With daily practise Wee Scot WILL know the meaning of the words words, "Heel, Sit, Stay", within a couple of weeks.) Once Wee Scot knows the meaning of your commands, he won't be confused by corrections. Since he knows he is being corrected for breaking a command, rather than being aggressive towards another dog, he will accept a challenge in the Breed Ring with confidence. Caution - Stay away from too permissive an instructor. Wee Scot does not need to be harrassed by large uncontrollable dogs.

YES, there is a secret to Obedience Training Wee Scot. Praise, Praise, and more Praise. The only form of correction should come through the collar and leash. Never, never strike our sensitive friend. Remember, all dogs learn by repetition. We only correct after Wee Scot has learned a command. Correction for something the dog hasn't had time to learn is cruel.

Begin and end each training session with a special treat and more praise. The time spent will be the highlight of the day for both you and Wee Scot.

. . . . .

GROOMING - The Fun Way. . . . . .

1. Set up two tables. You will be surprised at how fast the time flies when you have someone to chat with, or give you a helping hand. It is beneficial to swap ideas with owners of other wire coated breeds.
2. WORK ONE AREA AT A TIME. Avoid the temptation to skip around on the coat. The dog tightens the skin where we are pulling. Skipping around is irritating to the dog and discouraging to the groomer because random picking doesn't reveal progress.
3. TAKE MORE HAIR OUT than is necessary. A common error is to leave too much hair. Sure, you'll make mistakes, but hair grows back. Excess hair gives a sloppy appearance and makes the judge think you're trying to hide something.
4. ARE YOU CUTTING the hard-to-pull areas of the head and neck, instead of stripping it? Try Dr. Scholl's Foot Beauty Stone or Dr. Scholl's Beauty Stick instead of the stripping knife. Pulls hair slick as a whistle!
5. DON'T BORE YOUR DOG with constant chatter to him. A dog can't respond by talking back, so must answer with body language. Be still and he will.

6. REMOVE UNDERCOAT by raking with a stripping knife or fine toothed comb just as the hard coat comes in. Done several times a week as the new coat comes in, will give a tighter jacket that lasts longer.
7. AVOID FUSSING WITH THE TOP COAT once the loose undercoat has been removed. Constant combing will shorten the life of the jacket. KEEP FINGERS out of the top coat. Scots love a good rub-down but confine it to the chest or under the chin.
8. FILING THE NAILS WEEKLY is a must! File just to the soft tissue, not into the quick. Remember to file on the under-side of the nail so the quick will recede for next week's filing.
