### Cover Scottish Terrier 1995 Montgomery County BISS Am. Can. Ch. Gaelforce Postscript "Peggy Sue"

We cannot begin to express our thanks to everyone who has made 1995 a year to remember. We are so proud of "Peggy Sue" and her accomplishment - not just for us, but the breed. This year's Montgomery County win marks the sixth time our "Peggy Sue" has won a national specialty, a breed record over a record-breaking entry. Thank you Breeder-Judge Carol Annan.

We are pleased that Peggy Sue now holds the record as the all-time Specialty winning Scottish Terrier in breed history. She has amassed 21 Specialty Best in Shows, including 6 Scottish Terrier Club of America National Specialty wins. She is a three-time winner of the Stalter award. Peggy Sue also has won 30 All-Breed Best in Shows and holds the record for the most Scottish Terriers defeated in a single year.

We are overjoyed by the positive response our Peggy Sue has received in the past three years. We received over 200 letters of congratulation - even a telephone call from Mrs. Elliot Roosevelt - following her Westminster Kennel Club win. Two thousand people turned out to see Peggy Sue at the Seattle Kennel Club following Westminster. The mention of her name and ownership even got Vandra out of a speeding ticket en route to the Rotating Specialty in June. It seems the police officer was a fan who was more excited about seeing Peggy Sue than issuing her law-breaking co-owner a speeding ticket. We are proud of our Peggy Sue and welcome her home to be a mother. Joe got to talk on television several times and Camille, Peggy's breeder, got her picture in the local papers. We are so very thankful.

## AKC Delegate's Report . . .

**JoAnne Kinnelly**  
September 11, 12, 1995

A proposal to formalize the AKC National Gun Dog Championship was defeated and a resolution adopted to cease holding it until consensus is reached with 10 pointing breed parent clubs. For vote in December are: 1) allowing professional judges to serve as delegates (paying delegate/judges); 2) removing "nominal" from references to Board fees; 3) requiring 10% of delegates signatures on Board candidacy petitions (up from 20 signatures); 4) removing "nominal" from references to Board chairman's salary; 5) allowing suspension from some or all AKC privileges; 6) having delegates rather than the Board select meeting sites, and 7) allowing delegates meetings further than 50 miles from AKC headquarters. Also, Board candidates may speak for up to 3 minutes each.

The "Parent Clubs Committee," discussed the Gun Dog issue and Standard copyrights. Some clubs preferred AKC hold their copyright, thinking that AKC can better defend and distribute them. Many felt the parent club should have the copyright. The AKC board announced later that a committee, including 3 parent club delegates, would consult a copyright attorney. STCA board voted 10/5 to copyright our standard.

Committees reported at the Delegates' Forum, including: The Dog Show Rules Committee recommending agents' names in catalogs, identification of unattended dogs at shows, event disaster/emergency plans, changing move-up time to BOB/BOV to just before breed judging and disclaimers for limiting liability for rescue dogs on grounds. The All Breeds Clubs Committee addressing tenting and site requirements, emergency medical care,

regulating parking, calculating the 200 mile radius in road miles, stewards' training and revising the show manual. The Canine Population Issues Committee recommending a registration waiver giving AKC agents access, refusing P. O. Box addresses, all registrations by breeders, study of early sterilization. The Parent Club Committee distributing a specialty show site manual, discussing specialty approval 3 years in advance, breed standard copyrights, policy on rotating national specialty dates, and a parent club desk at AKC. The Future Nature and Structure of the Delegate Body Committee addressing quality of member clubs and delegates, nature of membership, frequency, location and type of meetings. The Health Research and Health Education Committee reviewing results of its survey. The Canine Health Foundation introducing the board and new director and reviewing its history and goals, stressing the fancy's responsibility to give to the future of dogs. □

Premature Closure of the Physis in the Dog - Joseph H. Kinnarney, DVM, MS.

"Surfin the Net with the Scottie" - Charles Lounsbury.

The Meeting began at 9:00 a.m. with each one of the presenters being well prepared. Each presenter used either a slide presentation, flip chart or overhead projector which made the subjects a lot more interesting. Handouts and "freebies" were also distribut-

ed to all who attended. There were representatives from Florida to Michigan, from California to Atlanta, just to mention a few.

The presentation on the Microchip made all of us aware of how inexpensive it is and how beneficial it will be. The scanners are being placed in almost all of the Animal Shelters nationwide, and if you have a kennel of 20 or more, they will supply you with a free scanner.

"Program," the new Flea Preventative, will protect the dog or cat from any adult fleas, but this does not eliminate them totally unless their surroundings are kept treated.

The Premature Closure of the Physis in the dog was explained in detail by Dr. Kinnarney, with the use of actual x-rays. He explained that the physis in the immature animal is the weakest point of the long bone, and the fastest growth is between 4 and 5 months of

age.

"Surfin the Net with the Scottie," presented by Charles Lounsbury, gave a very factual and easily understood talk on computers and the Worldwide Web. He pointed out that the AKC is going on-line with Breed information and that this will be an excellent "tool" for sharing information about our Breed.

All-in-all, the program whet everybody's appetite, and as Sue Martin pointed out later, there were so many questions you wanted to ask, but knowing the time element, you held back.

That brings me to my point of wanting to know what your Club would like to hear about at the next meeting, or what suggestions they may have.

I would like to give special thanks to Bonnie Lamphear, Gail Gaines and Russ and Mary Louise Somma for giving me suggestions for the topics covered.

Looking forward to a challenging and interesting year! □

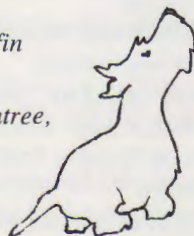

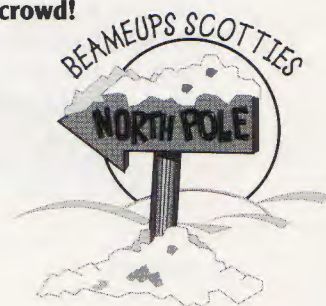

## Montgomery Judge's Comments

By Carol Annan

I was honoured when I received the Invitation to judge at Montgomery County. It was a superb entry for which I thank you. To my stewards John Sheehan and Muriel Lee, I extend a special thanks for their good work and great efficiency.

The size of the entry gave me an opportunity to study the breed in America. Heads I found to be on the average good, however, I did come across a few which were too Fox Terrier in type. This gives an incorrect expression. Most ears were good and well set. Eyes I feel must be watched as there were many large, round and very light examples. Generally, mouths were correct with a few exceptions.

A very prominent fault in most Scotties was fronts, narrow and bent at the pasterns. Quite a number had upright shoulders, this being particularly

noticeable when on the move.

Bodies I found to be unsatisfactory in that a number lacked spring of rib and had no depth of brisket. Most exhibits were well coupled. Tails were not a problem, however, there were a few examples of the whip like variety. Hind quarters left a bit to be desired. Don't let this get to be a big problem. A Scottie needs good quarters and it was noticeable that quite a few were narrow and shallow behind, thus lacking the correct drive. Coats were generally good and most exhibitors are to be complemented on the presentation.

My BOB, BOS, WD and WB, I found to be well balanced throughout and all presented in tip-top condition. They represented four Scotties I would be happy to have in my kennel. My Best of Breed was CH Gaelforce Postscript. A black bitch presented in sparkling form and extremely alert. She responds so well to her handler and

is beautifully balanced and correct in all essentials. On top of that, she moves freely.

Best of Opposite Sex was CH Thistlepark Seas The Moment, a very handsome black dog. He was so well balanced, not overdone and correct in all essentials. He has a great ring presence and was presented in grand form. Best of Winners was the Winners Bitch, Macinscot's Mollyanna. A brindle bitch full of quality and presented in lovely condition. She moved with drive and again was correct in all essentials. Winners dog was Glenby's look Me Over, again a very handsome brindle who caught my eye when he entered the ring. Again correct in all departments and presented in lovely bloom. He moved freely and was unfortunate to come up against such a lovely bitch for BOW. □

## Scottish Terrier Club of America Sweepstakes Judging

By Ms. Jean C. Ferris

I would like to thank the STCA for giving me the honor to judge their National Sweepstakes this year. I would also like to thank the exhibitors for their overwhelming entry. There is nothing dearer to my heart than the Scotty and I thoroughly enjoyed the day.

When a breeder is asked to critique or pass judgment on their entry, one must remember that this is a personal opinion in relationship to the standard, and that a given area may be more important than another, but the overall dog is what must be evaluated. During my whole time of judging these youngsters two things stayed paramount in my mind; #1-Sharpness of expression makes the terrier, and #2-Overall balance and symmetry are most important.

I found the exhibitors' presentation and grooming of the dogs to be excel-

lent on the whole. If one had to fault this area it would only be in the lack of undercoat.

Overall I found what I considered very good body type, deep chests, good bone and tail sets, moderately short backs, substantial small packages, and for the most part, low to the ground. I did find some lacking in movement, that unique Scotty roll, the drive from behind, the ability for those short legs to cover ground, NOT WALK, but propel oneself with strength and determination from the hindquarters.

The area I found most lacking was in the heads. When one looks straight up the nose of the Scotty, one should hesitate before reaching. If the expression is correct the Scotty should look straight back and say, "I dare you". To me this means a proper stop, with small very dark eyes, equal lengths of skull and muzzle, erect ears with minimum lobes, clean cheeks, and a de-

finer strength of muzzle, with the whole head clean but not overly narrow. I found many large, soft, kindly eyes, a lack of stop, and in very many, a long muzzle coupled with a short skull. Again, when looking for the correct head, we must remember that the head has to fit the body type - overall balance. I found a good deal of soundness, with nice shoulder laybacks, and good straight front legs.

My best in Sweeps bitch I found exceptional. She had it all and she knew it. She's a wonderful bitch to go over. She enjoys the ring and acts with all the confidence the Scotty should. My second place bitch in the 12-18 class I also liked very much, she just didn't have it altogether yet. My 12-18 dog was a very fine youngster with much to offer. He will do well in the ring.

Overall a very pleasing entry to examine, with much future potential.

It was fun, thank you. □

# STCA Third Licensed Obedience Trial

Neither rain, nor snow, sleet or shine - even Hurricane Opal - could keep the terriers from their appointed rounds during Montgomery County weekend. As Opal was shaking off her fury, it took a lot of terrier tenacity for the handlers and dogs who were arriving at their headquarters on Thursday. For the Obedience Committee, Opal added a bit of a challenge to the unloading of mats, ring gating and jumps; when they were finished another beautiful ring was ready for the 28 Scotties who would compete.

Friday, October 6, dawned with the promise of a beautiful sunny day, and indeed it was! The show site was buzzing with activity; the sweepstakes ring was being prepared, coffee was being made and the final touches were being completed for our Obedience Trial. As the Scottie teams began to arrive, there were lots of hugs and greetings from old friends and warm welcomes to the many new folks who joined us this year.

Our judge was Nancy Withers. She had judged our very first AKC Sanctioned Obedience Match in 1992 and we were really pleased to have her back. Our chief steward, Dottie O'Donnell, who has been active with the STCA Obedience program since the first demonstration in 1988, had everything in order for a smooth running ring.

Nancy began judging at 8:30 a.m., with the Utility A and B Classes. What a thrill to watch these little dogs perform the toughest of all tasks! Next were the Novice A and B classes. Richard Lawn and Miss Molly Scot earned a leg and placed first in the Novice A class with a score of 180. The Open A and B classes had some fine working dog teams. Lucille Berninger brought her father-daughter team, Lucky Me - Pippergirl Tweed, CD in Open A and her Dad, Pip Ol-Chap, CDX in Open B. They both earned identical scores of 190 1/2. Pip may have said to his little girl, "Ya coulda beaten me if it hadna been for the crooked sit," and she might have responded, grinning with a twinkle in her eye, "Next time, Pip-Pop, next time."

As it was, she won the Open A class, he placed second in Open B. Nancy Schaus and Ross the Boss McTavish, CD competed for the first time in Open A (and at our trial), not only earning a leg, but also placing second with a score of 181. Ray Rinaldi and Rocket and Rye, UD attended for the third year and it was a good one for them. They won the Open B class with a score of 192 1/2 and were awarded High in Trial for the second year. The Veterans class was a joy to behold with six dogs entered; the oldest was 14 years old. They gave us all a thrill and a chuckle as some changed the heeling pattern to their own design. Betty Fairchild and Scottish Rose, CDX, age 11, placed first with a score of 193 1/2; second went to Betty Henderson and Ch. Bruce, CD, age 9; then third to Betty Fairchild again, this time with McTavish, CDX, age 14; and fourth to Letty Passig and Scarlett, CD, age 11.

Good Sportsmanship and warm support for one another were felt throughout

the day, in and out of the ring. We all worked together to "break down" the ring, rolling mats and folding up ring gating. Then to lunch with our judge and steward; good food, animated conversation and warm friendship prevailed.

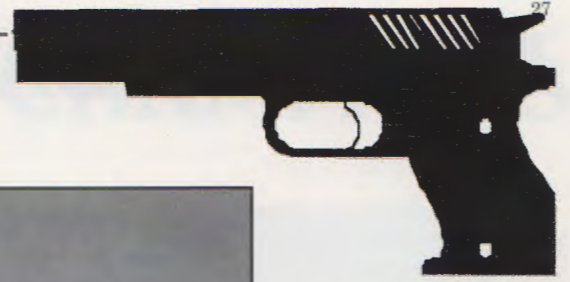

The following information deals with litters and breeding practices. Of the 278 people that said they have had at least one litter, the average breeder has had 7.5 litters and an average total of 33.9 puppies. This produced an average litter size of 4.52. When asked the average size of their litters, the figures worked out to 4.01 puppies per litter. Compare this to the average litter size from the litter survey of 4.22, you can see that all these figures are very similar. This indicates the reliability of this information. The largest litter size was 10 (reported 5 times, one of which was a litter of ours) and the smallest was the single "only child."

The average age for breeding a bitch for the first time was 2.03 years and the last time at 5.43 years. Of the 162 people reporting Caesarian sections, they estimated they had C-sections 40% of the time. Uterine inertia occurred 217 times for 93 breeders. These may be the same people who experienced a higher number of C-sections. Eclampsia, Mastitis, Pyometra or Metritis and Ruptured uterus occurred 16, 43, 92 and 13 times respectively.

One hundred fifty-three people reported missed breeding for an estimated 25.4% of misses to pregnancies. The average bitch came into season for the first time at 8 months and 3 weeks, with the earliest being 7 months and the latest at 10 months and two weeks. The average frequency of seasons was six months and two weeks.

The majority of owners assisted their bitches in whelping (220 yes to 17 no) and routinely spayed bitches when no longer being bred (212 yes to 30 no). The numbers were a little closer

regarding neutering males when no longer being used at stud (126 yes to 67 no). The average at which they would neuter a male was 7.4 years.

Of the 278 owners who have had a litter, over half (146) have experienced stillborn pups. One hundred eight reported fading pups and 60 speculated they have had reabsorbed pups. Interestingly, this was not guesswork on the part of two breeders; it was confirmed by ultra sound. Technology pulls us into the future every day.

The typical lifetime of our dogs is 11.2 years, pretty much where we have always thought the life span to be at 10 to 12 years. And the average oldest is 13.2 years. The oldest dog noted was 19 years of age.

Heartworm medication was not as controversial as I thought it might be. Owners use one form or another 358 yes to 82 no, with the majority using the monthly medication 304 to 56 for the daily. Seven people used both the monthly and daily for their animals, daily for breeding stock and monthly for the others. While the use in stud dogs was high (128 yes to 16 no), the use in bitches in whelp was much closer at 86 yes to 75 no.

The list for canned diets was overwhelmingly led by Pedigree for both adults and puppies. This was distantly followed by Mighty Dog, Science Diet and Iams. Many people added extras to these diets. Most popular were vegetables, chicken, home cooking (rice, pasta, meat, etc.), and yogurt.

The list of supplements is almost as long as the list of dog food. Topping the list is Pet Tabs, vitamins (no brand listed), specific vitamins (E, C, D), brewers yeast, In and Derm Caps. For bitches in whelp we add Pet Tabs and vitamins, plus calcium, cottage cheese, raspberry leaves, eggs and liver most frequently. All other brands of dry and canned food and supplements were listed 10 or fewer times.

There were 19 brands of food listed as causing problems. Needless to say, for everyone that successfully feeds a major brand of food, it has caused a problem for someone else. This just indicates how individual each dog's digestive system is. Science Diet was almost exclusively used as a prescription food for health problems. Few people add anything to their dog's drinking water but those that do, use: bottled water, filtered water, cider vinegar, Oxy Fresh and lemon juice.

Hypersensitivity and intolerances ranged from grains (wheat, soy, corn) to meat, fish and vegetables. Lactose, copper and fat were also indicated as causing problems.

### Health Survey

The health survey is the biggest part of the survey and it includes the most data. There were 471 health forms returned from 287 members and 184 non-members. This included information on 1540 dogs, 772 of which re-

ported at least one health problem and 768 who reported no health problem.

Health problems were reported in 140 categories, plus 51 problems which we were unable to diagnosis or classify. Our goal in this portion of the survey was to confirm what we have theoretically believed to be problems with our Scotties. The following areas of concern were randomly named at an Education and Health meeting, June 1994, at the Chicago specialty: cancer, seizures, endocrine diseases, immune disorders, CMO, Scotty cramp, vWD, thyroid and allergies. One significant problem that showed up on the survey that was not mentioned at this meeting was aggressiveness.

Following is a list of disorders that occurred 20 or more times among the 772 dogs reported to have a health problem. You must keep in mind that the diagnosis of these problems was sometimes made solely by the owner, by a veterinarian, a specialist or lab tests. The disorders followed by an asterisk (\*) are known in the literature to be of genetic origins in Scotties.

Cancers would seem to head the list of diseases with liver cancer at 16 and bladder cancer at 17 the most frequent. But if you add together atopic dermatitis, persistent chewing at skin and coat, and pruritus (significant itching) together, skin problems come out on top. The random list made at the June 1994 health meeting was pretty good. Six of the areas appear in significant numbers on the survey. Missing are CMO, vWD and immune problems. We had identified our issues rather clearly and then confirmed them with the survey. Now we can make decisions on fact rather than on theory.

**Litter Survey**

The litter survey is the smallest portion of the survey with 141 responses, 115 from STCA members and 26 from non-members. Keep in mind that these were litters born only in the two-year survey period.

Health problems were noted in 61

pups prior to 12 weeks of age. These ranged from Scotty cramp at 14 occurrences and swimmers at 9 to umbilical hernia (7), tail kink (5), inguinal hernia (4) and parvo (4). Seizures and undershot jaw accounted for 3 each; cleft palate, CMO, extra toe, heart murmur and rib cage deformity, 2 each; hip dysplasia, liver shunt problem, overshot jaw, spina bifida, undescended testicles and ventral septal defect, 1 each.

There were 122 puppie deaths between birth and 12 weeks of age which represents a 9.8% neonatal death rate. The leading cause of death by far was "unknown" at 49. Fading puppy (which we could almost call "unknown") took 9, while chilling accounted for 8 deaths. Parvo and ventral septal defect each took 5 and, lest you think parvo is the only killer virus/bacteria out there,

leptospirosis was fatal to one pup.

You can see by the birth distribution chart that the spring and fall are the expected times of year for most bitches to come into heat with the majority of the litters then born in early summer and winter. A distribution very similar to this litter chart was created using the date of birth information in the health survey. The majority of births were again in the early summer and early winter.

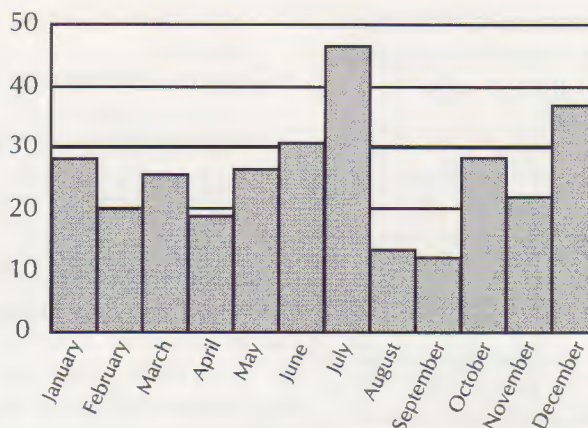
#### Conclusions

One of the things that became apparent when entering the data on the health surveys was the general nature of the disease classifications. It was evident that our veterinarians are not giving us details when treating our Scotties for illnesses - or we are not asking. We have fought long and hard to get our medical doctors to deal with us like partners in the treatment of our ailments. Now we need to do the same with our dogs' doctors. Let your vet understand that you want to know the

exact name of the disease, what kind of shot was given (not just "an antibiotic"), what side effects and complications can be expected. In other words, expect the same directness that we now get from our own doctors. We can do a better job of communication.

This survey has been a landmark for our breed. Up to this point, the literature on genetic diseases in Scottish Terriers was limited by the lack of da-

ta. Now we can say more definitively what problems affect the breed. The 41.35% response rate was commendable, but we can do better. We should not think of a health survey as an invasion, trying to find out what is wrong with your dogs or your line, but as a means to improve the future of our Scotties. Next time. □

# Seriously Speaking...

By Ruth Ann Krause

It is difficult to obtain hotel facilities for a large group of exhibitors such as ours for any Specialty weekend, much less the Montgomery County weekend. This is not a new revelation, nor should it be a difficult concept for STCA members to understand. When you realize that nearly 3,000 terriers alone are

exhibited at the Montgomery show, the logistics of finding accommodations for our membership is staggering.

What can we do to insure our eligibility at hotels? The answer: simply be respectful of our host hotels' facilities. Many of us grew up with parental advice to keep the Golden Rule. This can well apply to our circumstances and seems perfectly appropriate. When

you travel with your dogs, treat your hotel rooms and grounds better than you would your own home and yard.

STCA cannot afford to be guilty of damage to or disrespect of another hotel facility. With this in mind, I offer guidelines for our membership and will present them for Board approval at our January meeting. I would appreciate your thoughts on this subject. Additional suggestions should be put in writing and sent to me at your earliest convenience.

## PAWSITIVELY CLEAN SCOTS!

### PROSPECTIVE GUIDELINES FOR MEMBERS ATTENDING SPECIALTY SHOWS

A. Traveling items should include the following when appropriate: Heavy duty plastic for floors, newspapers, heavy duty garbage bags, paper towels, baggies for picking up solid waste. A general cleaning solution, white vinegar and water in a spray bottle for the carpet (in the event your dog has an accident en route to the outdoor exercise area), and a good room deodorizer. Water, food, spoons, can openers and dishes. Medication for diarrhea should be routinely packed. It is not uncommon for a dog to develop colitis during the excitement and stress of a long weekend. Drying towels for your dogs must come from home!

B. All dogs are to be crated when owners are not in the hotel room. It is often helpful to leave the TV on softly. Dogs will not respond to unfamiliar sounds if they don't hear them. If your dog is prone to barking (we've all had at least one), you will want to take the dog with you when you leave the room. Dogs guilty of continuous barking may subject their owners to being removed from the hotel, with no room refund.

C. PAWSITIVELY CLEAN crates are located at hotel exits with items you may have forgotten to pack. STCA provides these items for your convenience. . . please use them.

D. Outdoor exercise areas must be kept clean! Do not exercise your dog in any area except designated areas and pick up solid waste immediately and dispose of it in the proper receptacle.

E. If the hotel specifically requests NO GROOMING in your room, RESPECT OF THEIR WISHES IS MANDATORY. NEVER USE HOTEL TOWELS ON YOUR DOGS. When there are no grooming restrictions, common sense and STCA dictates that you spread a bed sheet or spread from your home under the grooming table before grooming. If possible, a hand held vacuum should be packed and used when necessary.

F. Taking litters of puppies to a Specialty weekend is never encouraged for the health and welfare of the pups. If you MUST travel with them, they should be kept in the standard puppy pen, NOT an exercise pen. The activity level of puppies is high and they can easily move an exercise pen around.

G. As a show of courtesy and as a responsible dog owner, we encourage you to leave your calling card and a tip for the housekeeper. Responsible dog owners are willing to stand up and be counted!

H. All rooms are subject to inspection during your hotel stay by an STCA member, as well as a hotel representative, to insure that these and other specific hotel guidelines are being followed.

I. STCA members are expected to report any infractions to their Show Chairman or members of the Board as soon as observed.

J. It is understood that each member will be fully responsible for any and all fees charged by the hotel in the event they are found guilty of improper behavior and/or of damage to the hotel facility.

K. STCA membership WILL BE SUSPENDED for a period of 6 months to anyone found guilty of improper behavior and/or damaging any hotel property during a STCA Specialty event.

### **EXEMPLARY MANNERS ARE THE ONLY MANNERS ACCEPTABLE!**

When your Show Chairman informs the host hotels that we are responsible dog owners, he expects the membership to take this responsibility seriously. STCA can no longer accept members who are not responsible, nor respectful of hotel facilities during Specialty events. □

### Fala! A Recollection

"A really companionable dog is an accident of nature. You can't get it by breeding for it, and you can't buy it with money. It just happens along."

E.B. White (1899-1985)

Helen Dodson is ninety-five! A small, sprightly woman. Alert! Very bright! Perhaps the strongest individual I have ever known and my true friend. Over the years I have been regaled by her recollections. She recalls as a little girl being in the grandstands with her older sister on the cold, blustery day of McKinley's inauguration. But I especially enjoy her dog stories, for Helen was a long-time breeder of Scotties in which she takes great pride. She recalls visits to the Ambassador Animal Hospital in Silver Springs, Maryland, with her Scotties. On occasion, during the Forties, the war years, a limousine would pull up and out would come F.B.I. Agents with President Roosevelt's Scottish Terrier, Fala! He would be brushed and clean and always in the rough. The President never wanted Fala "trimmed" but kept "as nature intended him to be, at least until the hot weather came." (Suckley, 1942, p. 50) Those agents would never allow Fala out of their sight. One would stay right with Dr. Ruebush, the vet. Helen Dodson often played bridge with Dr. Ruebush and his wife.

Well, it's very interesting, because it turns out that Fala was not just one of the dogs of our presidents, but he was quite a little character with an infectious personality matching Mr. Roosevelt's and became F.D.R.'s constant companion, capturing the hearts of the American people. To recollect President Roosevelt and his Fala is to recall the rare, quiet pleasure of companions in the loud, quick press of our days.

Margaret "Daisy" Suckley (pronounced "Sookley") was Franklin Roosevelt's eighth cousin. Geoffrey C. Ward in *Closest Companion* writes, "In August of 1940 Daisy presented F.D.R. with a gift, a four month old Scottish Terrier puppy that the president named Fala - after toying with the idea of naming it Wendell, for his Republican presidential opponent, Wendell Wilkie. Lovingly trained by Daisy, the dog quickly became the most celebrated presidential pet in history." (Ward, 1995, p. 134) In 1942 Miss Suckley wrote *The True Story of Fala*, a chil-

dren's book with Alice Dalgliesh, a professional writer. The President heartily approved. Here, she tells of the Scotties Wendy and Peter producing a litter of five puppies. A male is named Big Boy because of his big personality, and he is sent to live with Peter's mistress in Connecticut. (Suckley, 1942, p. 3) She "gives Big Boy to Daisy, who lived in Dutchess County, N.Y. on the Hudson River not far from Hyde Park, the country home of the President." (p. 5) Daisy takes Big Boy for F.D.R. "F.D.R. had had a Scotty before, 'Murray, the Outlaw of Falahill,' after an ancestor, and he'd give the new dog the same name. That was how Big Boy became Fala and went to live in Dutchess County." (p. 5)

"Perhaps [Fala's] points were not just right but his eyes were bright, and interested, his tail always ready to wag a welcome. He wasn't all black, a good many brown hairs among he black ones ...." (p. 4)

According to Doris Kearns Goodwin in *No Ordinary Time*, Miss Suckley was "quiet and plain, free from the slightest shade of coquetry. Short and thin with a dry sense of humor and a gentle demeanor, Daisy was an intelligent listener, a lover of birds, dogs and books." (Goodwin, 1994, p. 362) F.D.R. would have a longer, more intimate companionship with Daisy Suckley than with any other woman.

Fala won his place in the hearts of the American people not only by being President Roosevelt's pet but also by his endearing personality. "Thanks to Daisy, in a short time Fala could give his paw, speak, roll over, lie down and jump. He learned 'to speak' quietly, for a dog that barks loudly or too often couldn't possibly go to live in the White House." (p. 5) Daisy presented the President with the puppy on Christmas Day, 1940. "He had longed



for a puppy for years, he told his cousin as he lifted the little Scottish Terrier into his arms, but Eleanor did not consider the White House a proper place to bring up a dog. Roosevelt had had pets before, but Fala became his friend in a way no other pet had been. Fala accompanied the President everywhere, eating his meals in Roosevelt's study, sleeping in a chair at the foot of his bed. Within a few weeks of his arrival, the puppy was sent to the hospital with a serious intestinal disturbance. He had discovered the White House kitchen, and everyone was feeding him. When he came home, Roosevelt issued a stern order to the entire White House staff: 'not even one crumb will be fed to Fala except by the President.' From then on, Fala was in perfect health." (Suckley, p. 5)

Fala wonderfully matched F.D.R.'s exuberant personality. Who doesn't recognize the familiar smile, the long cigarette holder jutting up from the corner of the mouth, the brim of his hat turned jauntily up! He was a charming man with a heads-up personality who genuinely loved people and politics, and the Scottie was a charmer. "He smiled his funny puppy smile, curling back his lips to show his teeth." (p. 10) "Once in a while, if things are very dull, Fala thinks he can liven them up by running wild for a few minutes. He dashes around the study, under chairs and tables, out into the hall, around through another room, back again to Mr. President who makes an encouraging lunge at him, off again as fast as he can go, leaving rugs turned over at the corners, and anything which can be moved out of place. Just as suddenly as he started, he stops, and collapses near Mr. President with a look out of the corner of his eyes, that says very plainly - 'That's fun, why don't you do it too?'" (p. 31)

"... and where the President is, there Fala his Scottish Terrier is almost sure to be." (p. 1) "Eleanor was in the middle of a press conference on Monday morning, December 1, ... when Fala came running into the room. 'That means the President is here,' she told reporters a smile on her face as she

leaned down to pat Fala's head." (Goodwin, p. 286) The President, Eleanor, Daisy and an entourage toured several army bases on a six-week train trip through the Midwest and the South. "As usual Margaret Suckley was in charge of Fala, a favorite with the crowds. Fala was invariably greeted with oohs and aahs whenever he emerged from the train for his limbering-up walks." (pp. 424-25) Once Daisy recollects, "We sat in the observation car until after eleven with orange juice, Fala much the center of attraction." (Ward, p. 174) And at Camp Jackson, Columbia, South Carolina, "During our walks I usually speak to the guarding soldiers and make them release from their wooden attitudes - they all know about Fala ... and are thrilled to see him. In a small way he represents the President to them." (p. 183) And at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma, the troops "all knew about Fala, had seen him on the (movie) screen last week - recognize him from his generally black mop-like appearance! All wanted to pat him, and talk to him. At one point, a soldier picked him up and sat him on a wall. Some thirty crowded around for a touch of him. One boy held up a hair of Fala's and asked how much they would give for it. I suggested to the boy who held him that he charge a quarter a pet! He took it up at once and there was much joking and laughing ... Polly saw the mob surrounding Fala and me and was mildly alarmed - but the minute I said I thought I'd have to take Fala back to the train, the 'mob' fell back and dissolved. All those boys will write home about it. A workman was doing something to the back of the private car. He saw Fala and asked if he could pet him. Fala wagged his tail as usual. The man said: 'Well, this is quite a day for me; I work on the President's car, and now I am petting the President's dog!'" (pp. 213-214)

In a 1944 campaign speech, F.D.R. delivered "one of the memorable speeches of his career, centered on the Scottie to which he and Daisy were both so devoted." (Ward, p. 328) "... he pitted his dog, Fala, against the entire

Republican establishment. 'These Republican leaders have not been content with attacks on me, or my wife, or on my sons,' Roosevelt said in a mock-serious tone. 'No, not content with that, they now include my little dog, Fala. Well, of course, I don't resent attacks, and my family doesn't resent attacks, but Fala does resent them. You know, Fala is Scotch, and being a Scottie, as soon as he learned that the Republican fiction writers in congress had concocted a story that I had left him behind on the Aleutian Islands and had sent a destroyer back to find him - at a cost to the taxpayers of two or three, or eight or twenty million dollars - his Scotch soul was furious. He has not been the same dog since. I am accustomed to hearing malicious falsehoods about myself ... but I think I have a right to resent, to object to libelous statements about my dog.'

The audience went wild, laughing and cheering and calling for more. And the laughter carried beyond the banquet hall; it reverberated in living rooms and kitchens throughout the country, where people were listening to the speech on the radios. The Fala bit was so funny, one reporter observed, that 'even the stoniest of Republican faces cracked a smile.'" (Ward, p. 548)

As the war dragged on F.D.R.'s health declined. Daisy recollects, (May 26, 1944), "He said he was very tired and all alone and was going to bed at one o'clock. He said Fala was very sweet - jumped into the front seat of the car beside him and went to sleep." (p. 159) And "May 22, 1944, cloudy - but the President has had three perfect days ... [He] looks worried and tired, and his color is not good - but he makes an effort to be natural and talks along and jokes - little Fala stayed nearby .... (p. 301) And at Hyde Park, "Driving through the countryside during the day or lying down in the clean linen of his bed at night with his dog, Fala, at his feet, he must have felt for a few moments at least, as though the war was far away." (Goodwin, p. 284)

Of course, we all know about F.D.R.'s death at Warm Springs, Georgia, the throngs of tearful people lining

the miles of tracks as the funeral train moved slowly north to the Nation's Capital. "Arrived at the White House. There was a Navy band ... drawn up beyond the portico. The caisson and several cars drove in through the gates. The casket was lifted off and slowly carried into the house while the band played the National Anthem. It is beautiful the entire thing, the dignity and simplicity ...." (Ward, p. 422) The burial was at Hyde Park on April 15, 1945. "A perfectly beautiful day .... Fala came with me (Daisy Suckley), and stood with Polly, Mrs. J. R. Roosevelt, Mrs. Douglas Robinson and me. When

they fired 3 volleys into the air, Fala gave a sharp bark after each. An unconscious salute of his own, to his master -" (p. 422)

As a celebrity, Fala received many letters from all over the world. One of these letters poignantly tells of the important role this Scottie played in the life of the President.

"A letter came to [Fala] from his Scotty Cousin, Jock Murray, who live[d] across the ocean:

'To our wee brither Scot, Fala O'Falahill.

You are a lucky boy, Fala. Give all you have to make your master happy,

and always wag your tail. He has big heavy burdens to carry, and parcels, what the humans call "burdens and responsibility" - you can sometimes help to carry them.'

And this is just exactly what Fala [did]." (Suckley, p. 62)

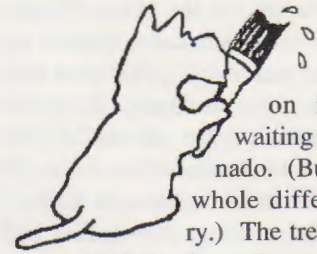

Kansas farm family who came

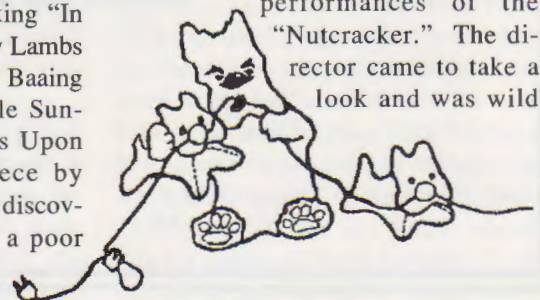
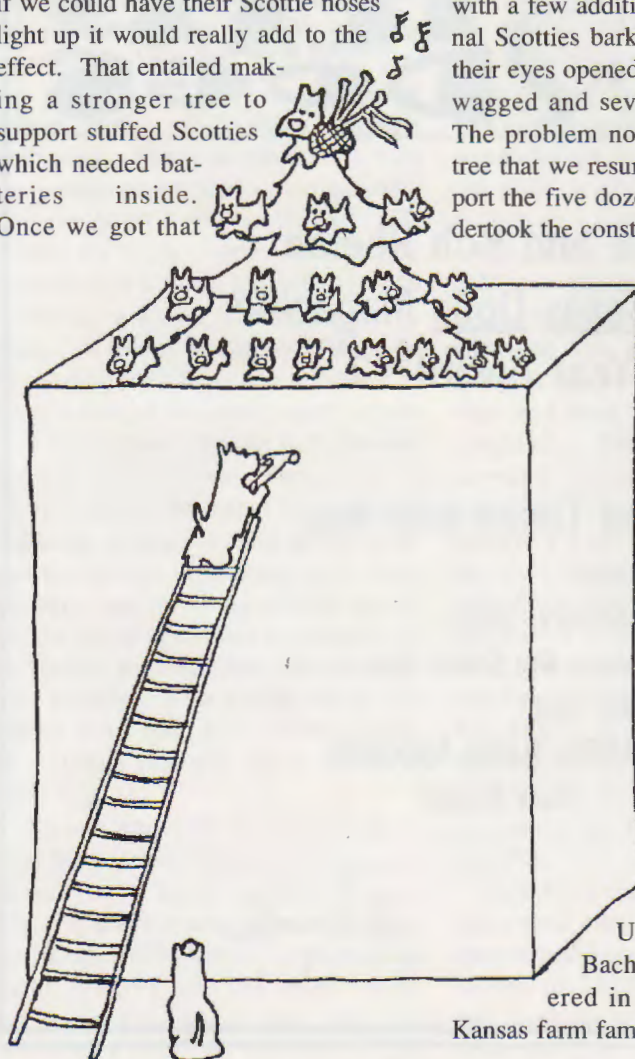


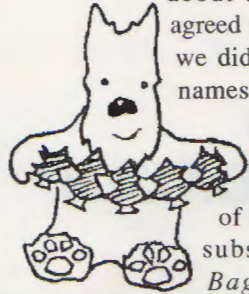
up-

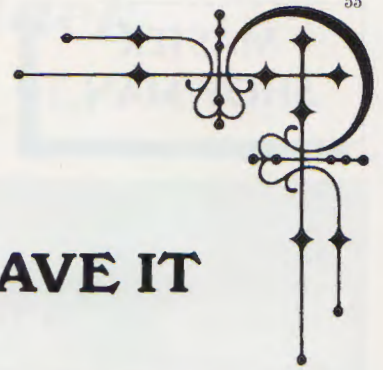

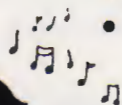

# Scotties ... On The "NET"?

While discussing the possibility of somehow doing the STCA awards tally via computers, Bonnie Lamphear and I got side tracked into discussing the need for STCA input into what was contained on the "NET." As a result of this discussion I was asked by Connie Smith to make a presentation to the Regional Meeting at the headquarters motel during Montgomery weekend. I enjoyed preparing and making the presentation on what I thought the "NET" and the "WEB" have to offer dog people and why we should be involved in presenting information on the Information Superhighway. During this discussion I also attempted to take a little of the mystery out of computers and Cyberspace for those in the audience. I hope the following will provide valuable information for you also.

How did I manage to combine Scotties and computers? A strange combination at best, though I have found during the last few years that I'm not the only Scottie enthusiast to use the computer to find out more about them and to share information with other Terrier people. My family first became involved with Scotties in 1931 when my aunt purchased a pet from a local Connecticut breeder. For our first Christmas together, I purchased a Scottie from our friend, Jim Murphy, for my wife Barbara who had also had Scotties since childhood. Now we were into Scotties together, and joined the Scottish Terrier Club of New England, local breed clubs and fi-

nally STCA. We were hooked and enjoyed every Scottie-involved weekend. But once in awhile we would miss a show, or wonder what happened at a particular Specialty and I soon learned that I could get show results and other information by accessing it on my computer. By this time I had been working with computers for over twenty years and using E-Mail to find information was easy, as I had access to the Internet through the university where I was working as a media consultant.

This was the same university where, twenty years before this, I had been the IBM Systems Engineer in charge of advancing the use of communications. After leaving IBM I ran my own consulting firm for many years. When I married Barbara, I took a job teaching computers and applications at the college where she was employed. Seeing the need for a doctorate to continue teaching at the college level, I went back to school studying Educational Psychology with a specialty in Instructional Media and Technology. It was during my graduate education that I became acquainted with the INTERNET.

When attempting to gather information on another breed a couple of years ago I discovered that the university did not own any reference books showing AKC recognized breeds. There are certainly, as all of us know, many publications available by which to obtain

information about dogs, the *Bagpiper* being one of them. On a wider scale there are commercial publications, such as *Dog Fancy* and *Dog World*, to mention only two of the many available. There are also many articles published in newspapers and magazines. If you are lucky enough you might also find a friend or mentor to ask about Scots and to gain insight into what dogs and shows were like many years ago. The problem is: if you don't have access to these resources or know anything about them, where do you get information on Scotties?

In the past decade the computer began to move into the family home. America On Line, Prodigy, CompuServe, etc. have all done their part to win over the family. These computer services offer information that was previously available only through specialized information sources. You can now find out if the leaves have reached their peak color in New England, how much snow is on the mountains in Colorado, how much it will cost to fly to the Alps if the skiing forecast isn't good for the US, etc. Besides archival information of this type, the computer services also offer a way for people to communicate with others with similar interests from around the world.

Starting in the 1970's people began to appreciate the power of the computer, but the distribution of the information produced was basically limited to paper printouts or punched cards or tape to transfer data to other computers. Computer-to-computer communication was very limited and expensive. And don't forget that these were "mainframes"; personal computers (PC's) weren't really available until the '80's. But look what has happened since their arrival! The awesome pow-

er and speed of the '70's "mainframe" computers is now considered outdated in the PC world. The arrival of the Pentium chip coupled with the CD-ROM and communications capabilities beyond imagination a few years ago has unleashed a whole new world.

The Information Superhighway is an outgrowth of the ARPA, a government project in the early '70's. ARPANET was split in 1983 and became ARPANET for civilian research and MILNET for military use. In 1986 the National Science Foundation founded the NSFNET. This was the forerunner of the INTERNET which we are now enjoying. You may have noticed the two addresses following my byline - these are my Internet addresses. By addressing E-mail (Electronic Mail) with them, the Internet will deliver the mail to my personal "mailbox." During the process, my incoming mail may be split into packets and these packets can travel by different routes and may need to be retransmitted several times. But when I read my E-mail the packets will have been reassembled and I will read exactly what the sender wrote. If I know someone on the 'NET who has the information I need, this is a very effective way of communicating. The other party doesn't have to be present to receive my mail. Transmission is almost instantaneous around the world, and the addressee can respond at his/her leisure. What happens when you don't know anyone with the information you



need or you just want to keep up-to-date on a s u b - j e c t ? This is

where MAILLISTS come in. You "subscribe" to a MAILLIST and every message exchanged by members is available for you to look at, comment on, or question. Some very heated discussions take place. You may be FLAMED, but in general everyone is very careful to observe Netiquette (DON'T TYPE IN CAPS OR YOU WILL BE SHOUTING!). There is a vast amount of information available though MAILLISTS. If you want a particular document referenced in a discussion, they are generally available via FTP (File Transfer Protocol). Computer transfers of these documents are very fast and they are received in computer readable format, therefore very easily integrated into your computer resources. Programs and other computer-related items can also be transmitted via FTP. There was a problem however, in that people couldn't find out what was available at the FTP sites unless they "called" into them and looked around, so someone developed ARCHIE to search the FTP sites and return the location of the desired files. This evolved into the GOPHER who reportedly was better at routing out these locations and made the interface more user friendly. But what if you weren't sure what you were looking for, or you were curious about something you saw in the article you were reading? A whole new method of computer interface has emerged that is the foundation of the World Wide Web (WWW, W3 or just "the WEB"). This interface technique is Hypertext. Using this technique you read a document on your computer screen and if you see a subject that interests you, you move your cursor to the word and click the mouse. What happens now is dependent upon how the author of the document set up this particular word, but in general you will be shown a document about this subject. While reading an article about dog breeding in general I might see a reference to Scottish Terriers and if these words are highlighted, and I click on the highlighted area, I would then be looking at a document about

Scottish Terriers. While in this document I might again spot a reference to something such as von Willebrand's and click on it. At anytime I can go back one level at a time or return to the original document.

This Hypertext technique has now been adopted by the Internet and incorporated into the World Wide Web. Scotties have been and are currently quite well represented on the WWW. I first saw a list of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ), a very common type of document on the Internet, on Scotties about six months ago. This list was provided by Camille Partridge. Shortly after finding this "Web Page" while reading the mail on the TERRIER-L maillist, I heard that the AKC was going to provide a "Home Page" on the WWW. A "home page" is the starting point for your personal tour on the WWW. If you don't know the address of the home page, or are looking for a new subject, there are a number of "search engines" available on the WWW. One of the most popular is YAHOO. I know from personal experience that YAHOO knows about the AKC and the SCOTTIE home pages. Preparing a home page is a rather simple task now that HTML (Hypertext Markup Language) is readily available as an add-on to most of the popular word processors. HTML produces documents that become home pages or reference documents. In order for a document to be viewable on any computer, a special method of publication needed to be established, and HTML has been adopted as the standard. The "Webmaster" for an organization is in charge of administration of the WEB documents and usually provides an E-mail address as part of the home page to facilitate further inquiry about any information not readily available on the home page. There is a real need for the STCA to not only provide accurate and reliable information on the WWW, but the STCA should also have a home page to allow cybernauts and other interested parties to find information on the breed. No one owns documents on the WWW; they are made available

and people link to them, either on a personal tour, or through links in other web pages. No one can prevent misinformation from being presented on the WWW, but usually given a choice between two pages, a user will choose the page from an authoritative source. We can be providing information on the WWW about our standard, breeders, breeding, health, rescue, etc.

**What do you need to take part in this new Information Superhighway?**

It's difficult to answer this question completely in a short paragraph, but basically you need a PC, either IBM or compatible or a MAC, with at least a 14.4 KB modem and a subscription to one of the on-line services: America On Line, Prodigy, MSN, and CompuServe. There are also local compa-

nies now supplying Internet access; check your local phone book or newspaper. Once you are on-line, check out the WWW feature on your service. Watch out! These services can be addicting and we do want to see you at the Scottie ring in person, not via the NET! ☐

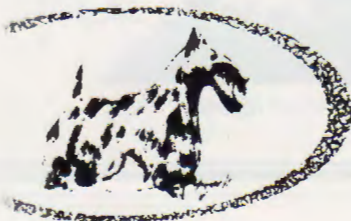

*Education and Health...***Nutrient Requirements and Foods For Dogs***Introduction by Linda Anderson*

The following article is by Dr. Thomas Hubert, a nationally-known expert in canine nutrition. Dr. Hubert is Professor of Physiology and Pharmacology at the University of Georgia College of Veterinary Medicine. In my discussions with him, he said, "In our society, we have become status-seekers and that is even reflected in the dog food we choose. Some of the dog foods we choose are trendy, some we choose just because they are the most expensive, others we choose because the advertisements are catchy." He believes that if we have the information we need to make an informed decision, common sense, and a watchful eye, our diehards will benefit the most. His article for this issue of the *Bagpiper* will provide the information we need to make an informed decision.

**Nutrient Requirements and Foods For Dogs****By Dr. Thomas L. Hubert**

It is likely that there are more commercial foods with different physical forms, flavors, ingredients, nutrient content and cost available for dogs than for any other species of animal. No other products of the animal food industry are as aggressively advertised as are dog foods. It is, therefore, understandable why confusion exists as to food selection. To compound matters, pet food manufacturers have developed their own terminology for foods that includes terms like super premium, premium, grocery, and price brands. It is obvious that these terms were developed to infer quality. The following text will discuss nutritional requirements of dogs, food labels, and



the classification of different types of pet foods.

**Nutrient Requirements of Dogs**

Until 1991, most pet food manufacturers based their diet formulations on nutrient requirements of dogs as recommended by the National Research Council (NRC). Thus, most dog food labels contained a statement that the food "meets or exceeds the NRC recommendation." The NRC recommendation for many nutrients was determined with pure forms of nutrients that were assumed to be 100 percent available when consumed by dogs. Although the NRC recommendations were correct, they did not account for decreased availability of nutrients in natural food ingredients, nutrient interactions in the gut, or nutrients lost during food processing. In 1991, the Association of American Food Control Officials (AAFCO) established new nutrient profiles for dog foods that addressed the above problems. It is assumed that most major pet food manufacturers have adapted AAFCO's nutrient profiles shown in Table 1. These are the minimum concentrations of nutrients that a dog food should contain if the food contains 3.5 Kcal of metabolizable energy per gram of dry matter. Foods with different moisture contents must be compared on a dry matter basis. Dry matter is determined by subtracting the moisture percentage listed in the guaranteed analysis from 100. By dividing the percent of each nutrient by the dry matter percentage, the

nutrient concentration on a dry matter basis is obtained. For example, a dry food contains 8% moisture and 21% protein and a canned food 75% moisture and 8.0% protein. On a dry matter basis the dry food contains  $(21 \div 92)$  or 22.8% protein while the canned food contains  $(8 \div 25)$  or 32% protein. Another important concept is that dogs tend to eat to meet their energy requirements. They eat less of a high energy food than a low energy food. AAFCO's nutrient profiles are based on the food containing approximately 3.5 kilocalories of utilizable energy. Thus, high energy (high fat) foods always contain more nutrients per gram of dry matter to compensate for reduced food intake. Finally, it should be understood that AAFCO's and/or NRC recommendations are for *minimal* food nutrient content and *not optimal*. Assuming the proper food has been selected for feeding a dog during a specific life stage (growth, lactation, etc.), the feeding instructions on the label should be considered as a starting point for amount fed. Actual amounts fed should be judged by the response obtained. For example, body condition (fat or thin) might indicate the need for a feeding rate other than indicated by the label. An old livestock adage, "The Eye of the Master Fattens the Ox," sums up the importance of a common sense approach to food intake.

As noted above, the pet food industry has their own terminology for foods. A brief description of the general characteristics of these classifications may be helpful. Super premium foods contain 15-20% fat and 25-30% protein. Due to the high fat content, they are high energy foods and food consumption is less than with lower energy (fat) foods. Thus, amounts of protein and other nutrients must be elevated to insure adequate consumption of these nutrients. It is not known whether health, performance, or

longevity are improved in dogs consuming high nutrient density foods. Due to reduced food consumption and increased digestibility (5-7%), less stools are produced by dogs consuming super premium foods. These foods are marketed in pet stores, through veterinarians, and by direct distribution. It would seem that this marketing scheme is designed to infer special quality. However, foods with similar nutrient profiles and ingredient quality are available in grocery stores.

Premium foods are usually produced by large pet food companies. These products are marketed nationally and are made from high quality ingredients under strict quality control procedures. These products almost always have been fed to dogs prior to marketing. Although these manufacturers produce foods with nutrient profiles similar to super-premium brands (for certain life-stages), they also produce a variety of lower nutrient density foods. These products are marketed anywhere pet foods are sold. This has led the consumer to falsely question the quality of these foods. Although premium foods are sold in grocery stores, the grocery brands usually include those manufactured by or for major grocery chains and carry the store name. Price brands are low cost foods that are marketed anywhere pet foods are sold, including grocery stores. The number one product of both grocery and price brands is the 21% protein, 8% fat food.

#### Food Labels

Feed control laws of most states require these nutritional related items on a dog food label. These are a guaranteed analysis, a list of ingredients, and a nutritional adequacy statement. The guaranteed analysis does not provide information regarding quality. It merely states that the food contains certain minimal percentages of protein and fat and certain maximal percentages of water and fiber. It does not provide information about protein quality (amino acid content), vitamin and mineral content, or digestibility. Nearly a 20 per-

cent difference in digestibility has been observed in foods with identical guaranteed analysis.

The ingredient list contains every ingredient added by the food manufacturer. This list not only contains ingredients that supply nutrients but also additives such as coloring and flavoring agents, antioxidants that prevent fat from becoming rancid, emulsifiers to prevent water and fat from separating and antimicrobial agents. The ingredients are listed in descending order of contribution by weight. With some experience, one can gain some information regarding protein quality and digestibility from the ingredient list. Also, it is important to recognize that an ingredient added in wet form may be listed first due to the weight of the water giving the impression that it is the predominant ingredient in the food. If

the water was removed, it might appear well down the list. This situation would be more likely in canned foods containing a mixture of animal tissues and cereal grains.

Nutritional adequacy statements are required on labels of food intended as the sole diet for dogs. Such claims usually indicate that a food meets or exceeds NRC or AAFCO recommendations for nutrient content for specific or for all life stages. Dog food manufacturers may make this claim by using published values of nutrient content in ingredients, from actual chemical analysis, or by actual feeding tests. Of the three methods, only feeding tests actually provide measures of digestibility and ability of the diet to support various life stages such as growth, lactation, and gestation. It is not unreasonable to limit consumer food selection

to those products tested in dogs prior to marketing. A typical nutritional adequacy statement for these foods might be as follows: Complete and balanced nutrition for all life stages substantiated by animal feeding tests in accordance with the Association of American Feed Officials (AAFCO).

#### Summary

There are many excellent commercial dog foods marketed nearly everywhere dog foods are sold with a considerable range of prices. Foods that have been tested in feeding trials in dogs prior to marketing should be given preference. Use of foods requiring extensive supplementation should be discontinued in favor of a higher quality food. □

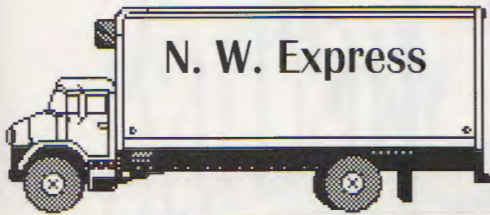

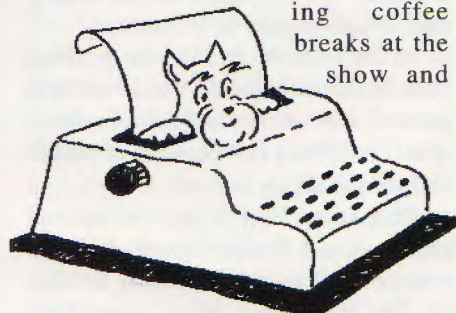
