JUDGES' EDUCATION COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Most dog clubs and organizations plan for education activities at least a year in advance with some organizations looking two years ahead. Planning for the STCA Scottish Terrier educational breed presentation is presently underway for 1999 with also a thought for the year 2000. Our goal is to schedule an educational breed presentation nation wide as follows: one north, one south, one east, one west, and one central. This coverage may be a little ambitious and may have to be done over a period of a year or two.

Our first presentation in 1999 is planned for the New England area in conjunction with the New England Scottish Terrier Club specialty show. Their show is usually in May. We are still in the discussion stage on this one, but informational flyers should be out in plenty of time to alert everyone that wants to attend.

Since the Rotating Specialty is to be held in Southern California in June, 1999, a presentation there would be in conjunction with the rotating specialty weekend. The Scottish Terrier Club of California, with Tina Sadovsky as local coordinator, has offered to host a breed presentation as part of the STCA activities for that weekend. Tina has assured

me that lots of advertising will be done for the breed study.

The Houston Kennel Club in conjunction with the Astro Hall Dog Shows puts on a judges' seminar that goes on for a couple days and involves many breeds of dogs. No official date has been set yet, but I believe the Astro Hall Series of Dog Shows are in August, 1999. We have been welcomed to do a breed presentation by the judges' education coordinator of the Houston Kennel Club. STCA member Felicia Gurrola has agreed to be the contact person in Houston.

STCA board member, Joseph Pendon, who is liaison to the STCA Board for the education coordinator, has indicated that no Scottish Terrier breed presentation has been done in Northern California in a very long time. Joseph is the coordinator for that presentation and has indicated that a good time for the presentation would be in conjunction with the SFBSTC specialty in October, 1999.

The north and central presentations will need to be done in the year 2000 along with a presentation for the year 2000 Rotating Specialty.

STCA CENTENARY YEARBOOK

Although it has been necessary to abandon the original plan for a STCA Centenary Yearbook, the STCA is pleased to announce that there will be a Centenary Publication to honor the 100th anniversary of the Scottish Terrier Club of America. Muriel Lee has graciously accepted the position of Editor. More information regarding this publication will be announced following the winter board meeting in January.

AKC Delegate's Report

June 9th, 1998 - Renaissance St. Louis Airport Hotel, St. Louis, MO (First AKC Delegates Meeting held outside of NYC since September 1893 in Chicago.) 230 Delegates were in attendance.

Prior to the Delegates Meeting, AKC Senior Vice President and chief operating officer, Nicholas D'Altilio, gave an interesting talk on projects the AKC has planned for the future.

Most of the meetings business centered around proposed and recommended amendments to the "Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedures for Dachshunds," as well as for Retrievers.

Also discussed: Plans for the re-engineering of the AKC.

An update of the DNA program was given by Mr. Cheauré. AKC has "...7,000 samples..... collected from over 700 kennels. They include 1,535 family units, (defined as sire, dam and offspring).....accuracy of parentage is

87%.....just the month of May, the accuracy is 92%."

Another "pitch" was made for *The Stud Book* to be available by breed and by group through the AKC Internet access, as well as in text form. This subject in under consideration.

An informal vote was taken to hold an off-site, outside NYC Delegates Meeting at least once a year. Members were in favor of the off-site, outside NYC meeting.

Meeting adjourned:

September 14th and September 15th, 1998 - Crowne Plaza Manhattan Hotel, NYC, NY.

On Monday, September 14th, I attended a meeting of the AKC's Parent Clubs Committee, chaired by Dr. Robert Brown. The meeting lasted two hours, and approximately 35 Delegates attended.

Parent Clubs Committee now have a web page with about 50 clubs represented. All parent clubs presidents and/or secretaries were mailed an updated list of show sites directories and a list of various codes of ethics.

The matter of AKC not asking parent clubs for input when publishing breed articles was brought up. The position stated by the Parent Clubs Committee mandated that all breed information be approved by the breeds parent club before publication. The Committee's position will be presented to the AKC Board of Directors.

On Tuesday, September 15th, The Open Forum convened at 10:00 a.m. This informal meeting is always held before the Delegates Meeting. Delegate Committee reports were given and a question and answer program was conducted by AKC Board Chairman David Merriam and AKC President Alfred Cheauré.

At 11:30 the Delegates meeting was called to order by Mr. Cheauré for the sole purpose of casting ballots for nominated Delegates to fill vacancies of various committees. Adjournment followed.

The meeting was reconvened after lunch and the counting of ballots. New committee members were announced.

Voting on five proposed

amendments took place. The only non "Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedures for Dachshunds" and Retrievers', which were all approved, was an amendment to Article XXI, Section 4., dealing with the reading of proposed amendments to By Laws, the proposed amendment would make it optional to read either the entire amendment or a summary of same, (at Delegates meeting). The full amendment would still be distributed twice and published twice in the Gazette. Amendment approved.

A proposed amendment was read regarding the AKC dealing with contract disputes. The proposed amendment to Chapter 3., Section 6. of "Rules Applying to Registration and Discipline"....Proposed amendment: "The American Kennel Club must be presented with properly completed paperwork, including all required signatures, in order to register a litter or dog. When a disagreement occurs, the parties must resolve it themselves. AKC will abide by the decision of a court."

Methods for detecting fraudulent signatures on registration papers are being studied. Solving this problem would alleviate most of the difficulty in contract disputes. (Note of interest. Less than 50% of all "blue slips" are returned to AKC).

Increases in registrations effective January 1, 1999: Litter - \$20.00; Individual - \$10.00; Transfer - \$10.00; Supplement Transfer - \$10.00.

Purchase of liability insurance to cover judges at events has been approved by the Board of the AKC. Cost is estimated to be \$85,000 per year. (Note of interest. The AKC Board has agreed to pay "reasonable" attorney's fees for the Judge being sued by an exhibitor.)

Lastly, AKC will move to their new headquarters at 269 Madison Avenue, NYC, December 1st. A Housewarming party will be held in conjunction with The Westminster Dog Show in February.

Regarding the explanation of being allowed to move up a dog from 9 to 12 months to 12 to 18 months, but no further.....it has been allowed to move up from 6 to 9 months to 9 to 12 months, but no further. Now a dog may be moved up from 9 to 12 to 12 to 18.

The next meeting will be held in December, and I plan to attend. Next June, the Delegates Meeting will take place in Raleigh, NC. I plan to attend.

Health Trust Fund News

Submitted by Carole Fry Owen, HTF Publicity Chairman

Thanksgiving 1998 was a time of thanks for STCA's Health Trust Fund, and every Scottie owner. From Jan 1 to Oct. 17, donations of \$20,618.75 came in, each with the subliminal message, "Please help all scotties be healthy." We are thankful that Scottie/Cairn/Westie CMO DNA research was accepted in June by AKC's Canine Health Foundation (CHF) and that your donations enabled HTF to send \$10,000 in August, toward our breed's total commitment for that two-year, \$60,000 project!

We are thankful that HTF also can move into additional health areas for Scotties. You told HTF about an emerging problem of liver shunt in Scotties, and in October trustees voted to donate \$1,200 to AKC CHF's new \$14,000 liver shunt research at Colorado State University, "Investigation of Oxidant Stress and Antioxidant Levels in Livers of Dogs having Congenital Portal Systemic Vascular Anomalies." That donation is contingent on approval of the STCA Board. The antioxidant project could have helpful spin-off for other Scottie liver problems.

We are thankful HTF has the beginnings of monies to develop a DNA-based Scotty Cramp carrier test. HTF has received a Scotty Cramp proposal from Michigan State University researchers Dr. Patrick Venta, Dr. Vilma Yuzbasiyan-Gurkan and Dr. William Schall. They estimate linkage-based Scotty Cramp research will cost \$100,000, or if a candidate gene approach can be used, \$30,000. Though we might receive some funding from AKC's CHF, there won't be other breeds to share expenses as in our CMO research. We're on our own! We need deep-pockets to finance Scotty Cramp research.

DNA collection of samples from Scotty Cramp-affected dogs, littermates, parents and grandparents will start soon. Researchers say we need DNA from 30 to 50 affected Scotties, plus relatives. Call Marilyn Lindsay (937/323-6537) for information.

"Cloning and Significance of Tumor Suppressor Genes in Canine Melanoma" is another AKC CHF project of interest to Scotties that HTF is investigating. CHF has requested \$3,000 contribution from clubs of highly affected breeds for this \$53,000 project at Texas A&M University. Melanoma is rated as the #3 cancer in Scotties.

Chocolate Scotties are coming back as Christmas angels this holiday season. Pam Wilson is back in the kitchen whelping and selling more chocolate Scotties. She'll send profits to HTF once again. Other "one person's" making a difference

are Scottie artist Marion Krupp who is donating one copy of her print "Geranium Gentleman" to HTF and British breeders Muriel Owen and Susan Gaskell who flew a lovely English Scottie print with them to Montgomery for auction at STCA's annual banquet. You'll have a chance at Marion's print later.

Ed and Dana Leab's annual reunion for puppy buyers welcomed other Scottie owners, too, and grew into "Gathering 1998." It was a day of pet grooming, and Cindy Cooke spoke on health topics like CMO, liver shunt, Scotty Cramp and vWD. Mary O'Neal and Rich and Julie Korenchuk helped, too. A bowl marked "Voluntary Donations for STCA Health Trust Fund" collected almost \$200 from attendees who were not even STCA members. They do love Scotties!

Tuck this idea away: When a Scottie owner dies, include HTF in the obituary among suggested memorial funds. Ron Galler's family listed HTF in his funeral announcement. So far, 24 donations have come in Ron's memory, many from non-Scottie owners, including Hutchinson High School, Hutchinson, KS.

HTF's Health Registry Committee has been appointed to consider registries. Please share your thoughts and ideas on health registries with Chairman Marilyn Lindsay and committee members. HTF distributed packets of brochures from existing health registries at Montgomery Sweepstakes. To learn more about health registries, request a packet from HTF Publicity Chairman Carole Owen, 9 Coachman's Circle, Big Spring, TX 79720.

The liver shunt research database of Institute for Genetic Disease Control in Animals is collecting data on terriers to determine the condition's genetic basis. The first Scottie is now in this database. Scottie owners who have had liver shunt-affected Scotties may wish to provide information on their dogs to advance research. Data is accessible only to researchers at this time. Any purebred terrier diagnosed with porto systemic shunt by surgery, ultrasound, scintigraphy or necropsy is eligible. Contact GDC at 530/756-6773 for information.

Scottie owners also may wish to help establish the Scottish Terrier database at University of California, Davis, School of Veterinary Medicine Veterinary Genetics Laboratory. The lab is collecting DNA from many breeds to establish a genetic profile for each breed at each genetic mark. Data will provide baseline information for future disease or trait association studies. The researchers have DNA from 40 Scotties, but need 60 more samples from Scotties unrelated in the first generation, i.e. no brothers/sisters or half brothers/sisters. vWD DNA testing continues to be a major HTF emphasis. Owners purchased six VetGen DNA tests at HTF's education table during STCA Sweeps. Those smart shoppers saved money! HTF also sold vWD test "specials" last spring at the STCA Rotating Specialty, and STC Michigan's September Specialty. By 24th of Sept., 589 Scotties had been vWD DNA tested.

Karen Lynn Harris from STC Greater Atlanta was on hand at HTF's education table to promote sales of the four-tape Luv Your Scot! grooming series. Profits come to HTF. Report of the Corresponding Secretary, Polly O'Neal:

A written report was distributed addressing Correspondence received, and answered, Grooming Manuals mailed, Breeder Referral Requests, Requests for Bred By Medallions, and AKC Correspondence.

Membership report: 700 domestic units; 27 Canadian; 13 International, for a total of 740 units, and approximately 1300 members.

Report of the Treasurer: Gene Hains:

A written report was distributed. Balance in

checking: \$64,723.47. Rescue Fund: \$3677.11. Stalter Interest Fund: \$11,683.85. CD Stalter: \$10,000.00. Our total assets are \$90,084.43.

It was reported that the in-house audit of books, and Health Trust Books showed all to be in good order.

Report of the Vice President (Show Chairman): Maxine Stickler

A written report was distributed. Important general information from written report as follows:

Sweeps/Obed./Agility Day at Lulu Temple: There will be ten vendors who have rented tables at Lulu Temple. They will all be located in lobby area.

Montgomery plans are proceeding smoothly. Spec. Arrangements has received 251 reservations for the Sweeps Buffet, and 188 for the Annual Meeting Banquet.

The Rotating Specialty for 1999 will be hosted by the Scottish Terrier Club of California, in conjunction with Great Western Terrier on June 26, 1999. Plans are progressing smoothly, and Maxine commented that she was very confident that arrangements were very well in hand.

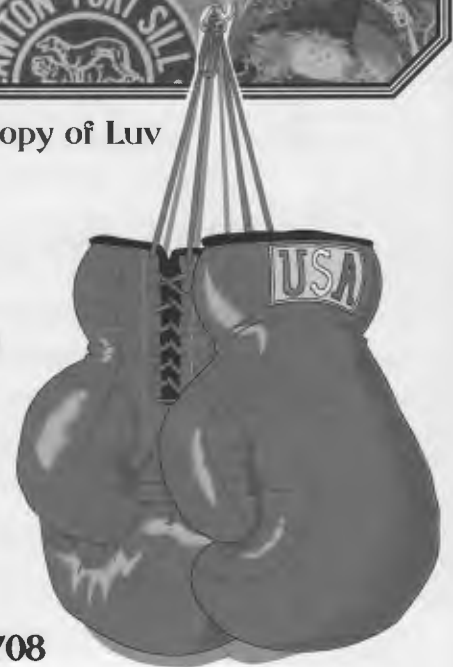

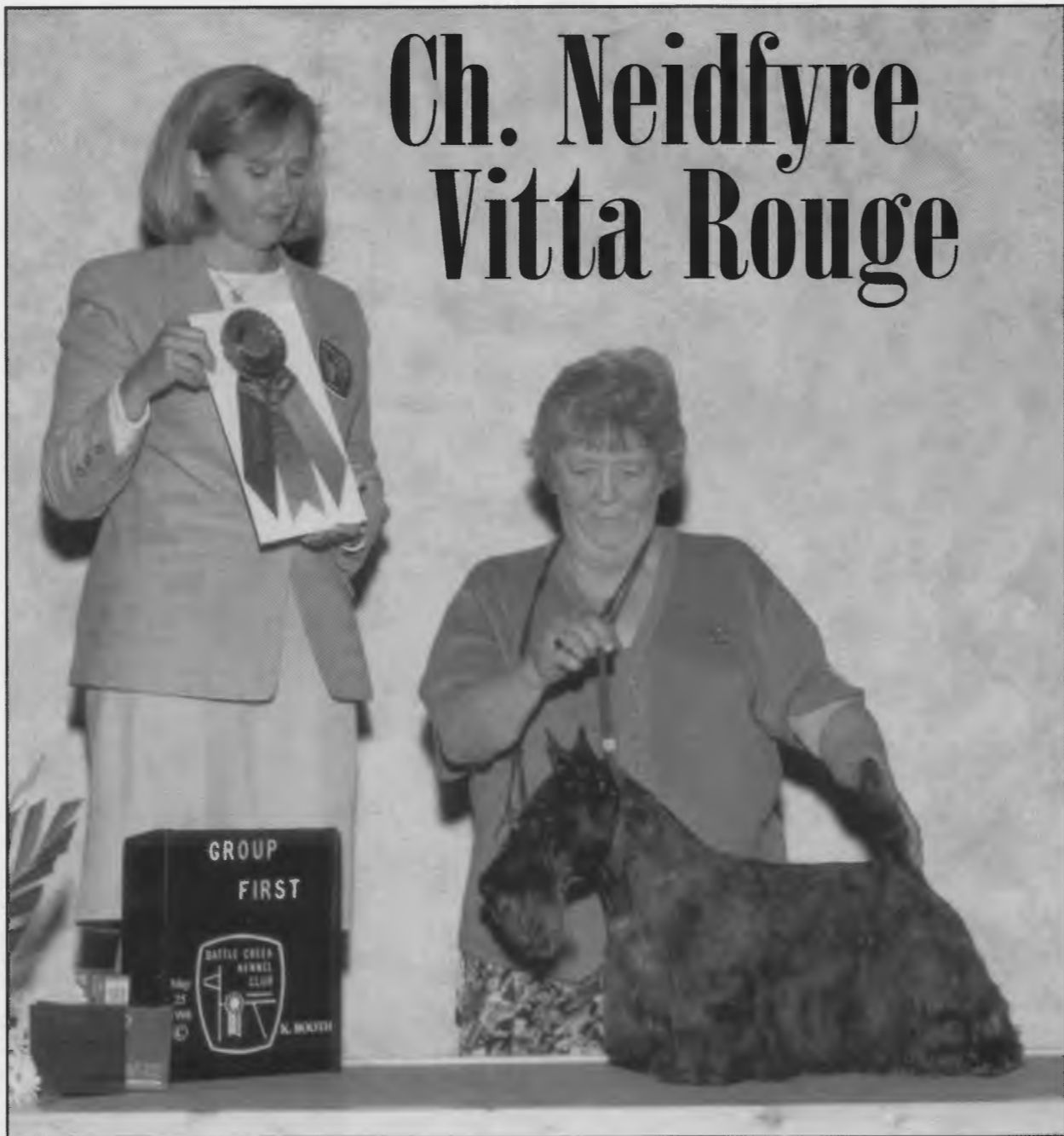

RESEARCHERS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION OF GENETIC MAP FOR DOGS

PROVIDED BY SUSAN EDMONDS,
CORNELL UNIVERSITY



Researchers at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle and the James A. Baker Institute for Animal Health at Cornell's College of Veterinary Medicine reported the development of a framework reference map of the canine genome in the December issue of *Genomics*, published by the Academic Press.

The ultimate goal of canine genome research is to find all the genes in the DNA sequence of dogs and make this information available to others to develop tools to better diagnose disease well before the appearance of symptoms. It is believed that dog genetics offers the hope of discovering the genetic basis of both development and behavior in a variety of mammalian species including human.

"The notion of a canine genetic map had been proposed by the genetics community years ago; over the last three years we developed the markers to serve as the cornerstone of the map," said Elaine Ostrander, PhD, lead investigator and molecular biologist, Hutchinson Center. "Cornell became the catalyst that allowed assembly of the map to begin in earnest two years ago."

"We were able to provide a number of highly informative pedigrees of dogs that, for several years, had been bred specifically for genetic studies such as these," said Gustavo Aguirre, VMD, PhD, professor of Ophthalmology and director of the Center for Canine Genetics and

Reproduction at Baker Institute.

The map covers most of the canine genome and represents a major step toward the completion of a more comprehensive canine genetic map. It was constructed from 150 highly informative markers, known as microsatellite markers, developed by the Ostrander group and typed on informative pedigrees developed by the Cornell team. The linkage panel used included information from 17 three-generation pedigrees with genetically distinct backgrounds, a total of 212 individuals.

The development of a canine genetic map is of particular importance, not only in solving questions of inheritance in dogs, but in humans as well. Purebred dogs, though all of one species, in practice represent a multitude of closed breeding populations. Many of the genetic diseases that proliferate in inbred dogs also occur in the human population, but are difficult to trace genetically, according to Aguirre, because the high degree of genetic diversity and low number of offspring in human families make informative pedigrees a rarity. The diseases include cancer, epilepsy, retinal degeneration, bleeding disorders, skeletal malformations, and a host of others. Dogs represent a unique genetic resource with each of several hundred breeds exhibiting distinct physical and behavioral traits with remarkable consistency among its members.

"In spite of their obvious breed-specif-

ic differences, all dogs belong to one species, and can therefore crossbreed successfully. A great deal of genetic information can be gained by analyzing crosses between two highly distinct breeds of dogs," said Aguirre. "This information will potentially lead to an increased recognition of the role inheritance plays, not only in appearance or in susceptibility to disease, but also in behavior, both in humans and canines."

The project was conducted by Dr. Ostrander and her associates at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center as a continuation of work that she had initiated with Jasper Rine, PhD, Professor of Genetics, Department of Molecular and Cell Biology, University of California, Berkeley. Collaborating with Ostrander's team was a team of Cornell researchers led by Dr. Aguirre. Other members of the Cornell team included Gregory Acland, BVSc, a Veterinary Ophthalmologist and Senior Research Associate in Genetics, and Kunal Ray, MS, PhD, Senior Research Associate in Molecular Genetics.

The research was supported by The Canine Health Foundation of the American Kennel Club, the Wellcome Trust, The Foundation Fighting Blindness, Morris Animal Foundation, the American Cancer Society, and the National Institute of Health.

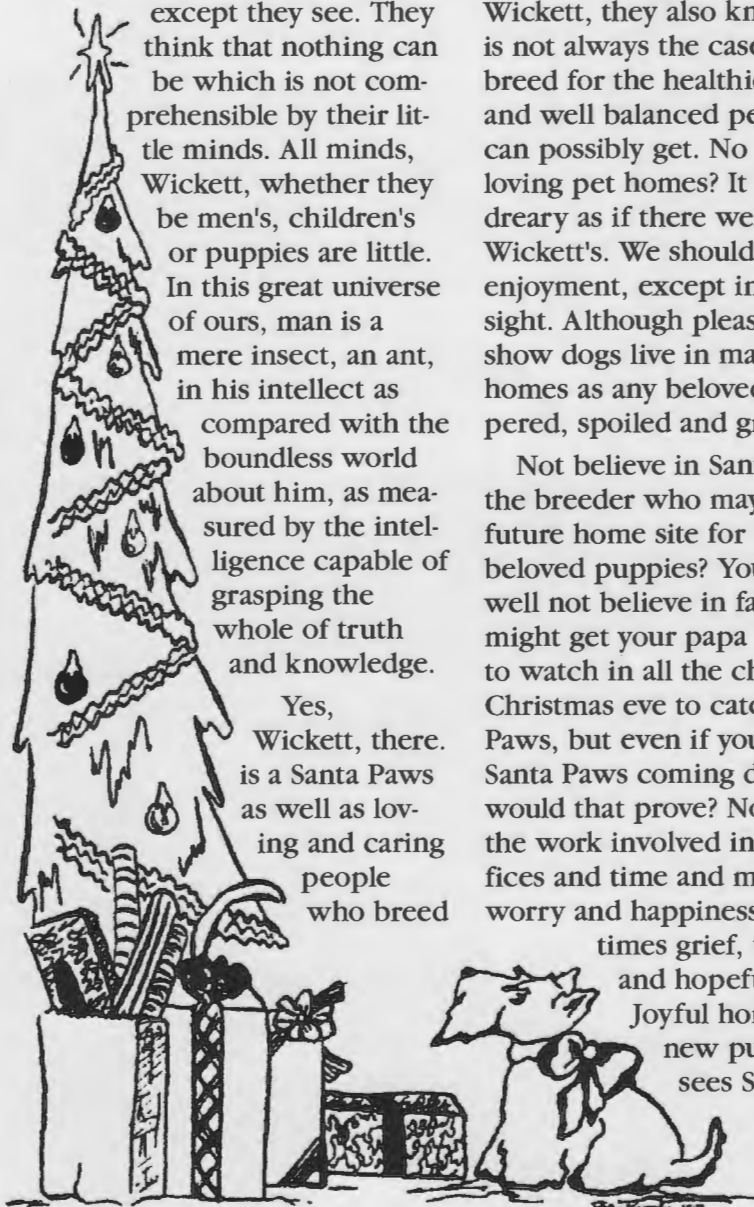

At Work

With the Montgomery County Specialty and the "Gathering" having taken their appropriate places in my personal history it seemed appropriate to pause, reflect and give thought, to these two events. As I thought about them I came to the conclusion that in many ways I had learned a lot of new lessons and had gained a new respect for life and the lessons these experiences taught. I decided that I had some of my belief systems validated and reinforced. In other ways I was left scratching my head with indecision.

Like each of you a major source of pleasure in my life is my Scotties. Much has been written by better writers than I on that topic, so I will not labor you with my interpretations about it. However, what I would like to share is a belief system these two events reinforced strongly on me and I therefore espouse to you. That is the concept of stewardship.

My wife and I, like all other breeders, over the years have placed Scotties we have bred in pet homes. Because of our (mostly her) curiosity, and our fear that something, despite our checking may not be right, we did our best to periodically call "our owners". After a couple of years of this Dana suggested we hold a "Reunion". The purpose of the "Reunion" was multiple. One purpose was to see for ourselves the physical and mental condition of the "puppy" and exactly how well they had grown and thrived. Another, was to give our owners the opportunity to socialize and meet each other. This gave them the time and place to look at Scotties we had placed with other people and to ask how things were going.

So, we had our first "Reunion" two years ago. It was very well attended. June of this year we had the second which was equally well attended. This year however our owners asked us to hold another "Reunion" before the summer was out. They suggested they would like it to be a "Theme Reunion". The "Theme" being to teach them "pet grooming" and to go into detail about such things as CMO, liver shunt, Scottie cramp, vWD and other health issues they had heard about that affects their Scottie. So, we decided to have a "Gathering" of all Scottie owners not just "our owners". It was to be free of charge with each person attending bringing a covered dish.

So, on Sunday, September 20, 1998,

after some advertising, we held the "Gathering" out at our house. Cindy Cooke agreed to be the guest expert speaker. We got started at about 9 a.m.. The interest the owners had in learning to do their own grooming was more than obvious. Mary O'Neal saw that Cindy was really busy, and being the "Can Do" person she pitched right in helping Cindy.

We broke for lunch about noon and was it ever good. After lunch Cindy spoke on vWD, liver shunt, CMO along with other topics and conducted a wonderful question and answer period. Following this Cindy and Mary did some individual wrap up grooming. Dana had set out a bowl marked "Voluntary Donations for the STCA Health Trust". The people were so happy with the events of the day and the work Cindy and Mary had done, that they donated almost \$200.00. Keep in mind these are not STCA members, they are just pet people!

Julie and Rich Korenchuk helped me hold everything together so that Cindy and Mary could concentrate on answering questions about grooming and health issues. Julie and Rich truly did a yeoman's job. Later in the day, as we broke up, each person asked to do this again in the spring. They said that because they are pet owners they are largely ignored and don't have the chance to be exposed to grooming and health information. Cindy emphasized to them, and they obviously heard her, that one of the reasons they should do some grooming is that it gives them the opportunity to go over their Scottie with their hands for themselves and discover problems a professional groomer may either miss or fail to report.

My conclusion is that this day, and its events, defined stewardship, breeding,

and what breeding is all about. It became obvious to me the care of our Scottie does not end after the "sale". After the sale is when it begins. Yes, it is nice to breed that really nice show dog; that is one of the reasons to breed. It certainly makes you feel good when the judge points to you and says "Best of Breed". But we must remember it is the dog, not us, the judge is pointing to and talking about.

On Sunday, September 20, 1998 when I saw the face of each one of these "pet people" as they prepared to leave our house, and the warmth and sincerity in their voice as they said their "good-bye's" and "thank you's" to Cindy and Mary, I know what my stewardship responsibilities are and why I breed Scotties. Each one of these people, thanks to Cindy and Mary, now has a better factual understating of pet care, vWD, liver shunt, and CMO. Of course, and it goes without saying the "UNPAID KENNEL HELP" Rich and Julie Korenchuk can not be thanked enough for all they did.

I once read and in my opinion the speaker must have had dogs in the back of his mind when he said, paraphrasing -

*"When I was hungry, you gave me eat
When I was thirsty, you gave me drink,
When I was cold, you gave me shelter....
remember what you do to the least of
these, you do to me"*

I hope we will keep these words in mind as we provide stewardship to those for whom we voluntarily took it on, and accepted it. Remember your Scottie had no say in the decision making of coming to live with you.

Red Raspberry

Red Raspberry has been used by many dog breeders as the miracle cure for all whelping and pregnancy ails. With the introduction of uterine contraction monitoring, through the "WhelpWise" service, potential problems that can develop with the use of Red Raspberry have been discovered.

Many people do not realize that when they are giving or taking "herbal remedies", they are in fact ingesting drugs. Most of our prescription drugs come from either plants, fungi, or bacteria. The advantage that a drug has over the plant is that the drug has a known quantity and quality of the chemical that it is providing. Herbal preparations can vary significantly in the amount of chemical they contain. One batch may have a minimal amount, the next toxic levels. What people also should understand is how this plant/drug works, ask if this is the desired effect, and what are the potential risks of administering this plant/drug.

Raspberry does exactly what the distributors say it does. It makes the uterus contract. What the knowledgeable breeder needs to ask is, "Do I want my bitch to have contractions? How can I regulate the contractions so that they are not excessively strong."

The uterus is composed of smooth muscle, not skeletal muscle as are our arms and legs. Other smooth muscles in the body are located in the blood vessels, the intestines, and the bronchial tubes. Uterine contractions occur throughout life. Even as you are reading your *Bagpiper* (providing of course that you are female), you will have at least one contraction.

Someone, somewhere, obviously not aware that smooth muscle does not get stronger with use, decided that the uterus needs to be exercised, therefore causing contractions during pregnancy will make the uterus stronger. Quite the contrary! "Exercising" the uterus makes as much sense as inducing an asthma attack to make your lungs stronger, raising your blood pressure to make your arteries stronger or how about diarrhea to make your digestive system more effective!

The uterus, being a generally smart organ on its own, has specific contraction patterns to facilitate a healthy pregnancy. A non-pregnant uterus generally has 1 contraction per hour. As estrus approaches, contractions increase, with 3-4 per hour at ovulation. The purpose of increased contractions at this point is to help spread the eggs down the uterus so that they do not try to implant in one area. The second through fifth week of gestation is the time of the least uterine contractions, frequently less than one per hour. This uterine quiescence provides a stable target for embryos to implant on and for placentas to develop.

Beginning week six of a bitch's pregnancy, a gradual increase in contractions per hour is noted with the average number of contractions per hour during week eight, being two to three. The last 24 hours of pregnancy will see the establishment of an organized contraction pattern, with deliveries beginning 8-12 hours after its onset. Frequently the organized contraction pattern in the early stages is not identifiable without the use of the uterine monitoring equipment, therefore we think a dog's labor is 1-2 hours.

Why would the use of the Red Raspberry be a problem? If you look at early gestation where it is best for the uterus not to contract, Red Raspberry can actually cause the fertilized eggs to be expelled. A moving uterus also makes a difficult target for the embryos to try to implant on, as healthy placentas must burrow into the uterine muscle to remain well attached, a difficult task if the uterus is contracting. If placentas do not become well attached, less blood and oxygen supply will be available resulting in smaller, less vigorous pups and possibly resorptions. Labor, the time of most stress on the placenta and puppy, can cause premature placental separation if the placenta is not well attached.

Use of Red Raspberry during labor can cause contractions to be too long and/or too strong. Every time the uterus contracts the blood supply to the puppy is cut off because the blood vessels going to the puppy go through the uterine muscle. When the muscle contracts, the

blood supply is cut off. If Red Raspberry is used there is no way to regulate the amount of chemical entering the system, and no way to prevent over-stimulating the uterus. Exceptionally strong contractions contribute to puppy compromise by decreasing oxygen to the puppy, causing premature placental separation and in some cases, uterine rupture. Additionally, the unregulated use of oxytocin, especially in high doses has the same effect.

Documented cases of premature labor have also been associated with the use of Red Raspberry. Fortunately, with the early detection of the contraction pattern, and the use of medications to stop the labor, these cases were able to make it to their due dates.

My advice for pregnancy and whelping: Pregnancy is a process best left alone. Good nutrition is one of the best ways to have a healthy pregnancy. Feed a dog food designed for pregnancy or feed a well-balanced dog food (free of chemical preservatives), through week six, then switch to puppy food. I supplement the last week and a half of pregnancy with a natural dairy food like cottage cheese or yogurt to help increase calcium consumption. My general rule is 1oz. / 10 lbs. of body weight per day. This also helps with the "picky eater" syndrome. A multi-vitamin supplement is OK, but make sure you read the label to see what it contains.

Whelping interventions should only be made when there is a documented problem. Medication to support labor should be only used if indicated, and in very small amounts. Ideally, no medications should be given unless a uterine contraction monitor is used.

Mother nature has actually done a very good job designing the reproduction process. It is important for us to support the process, not intervene unnecessarily, potentially causing harm along the way. Should you need to intervene, be informed of the actions of what you do, and above all, proceed with caution.

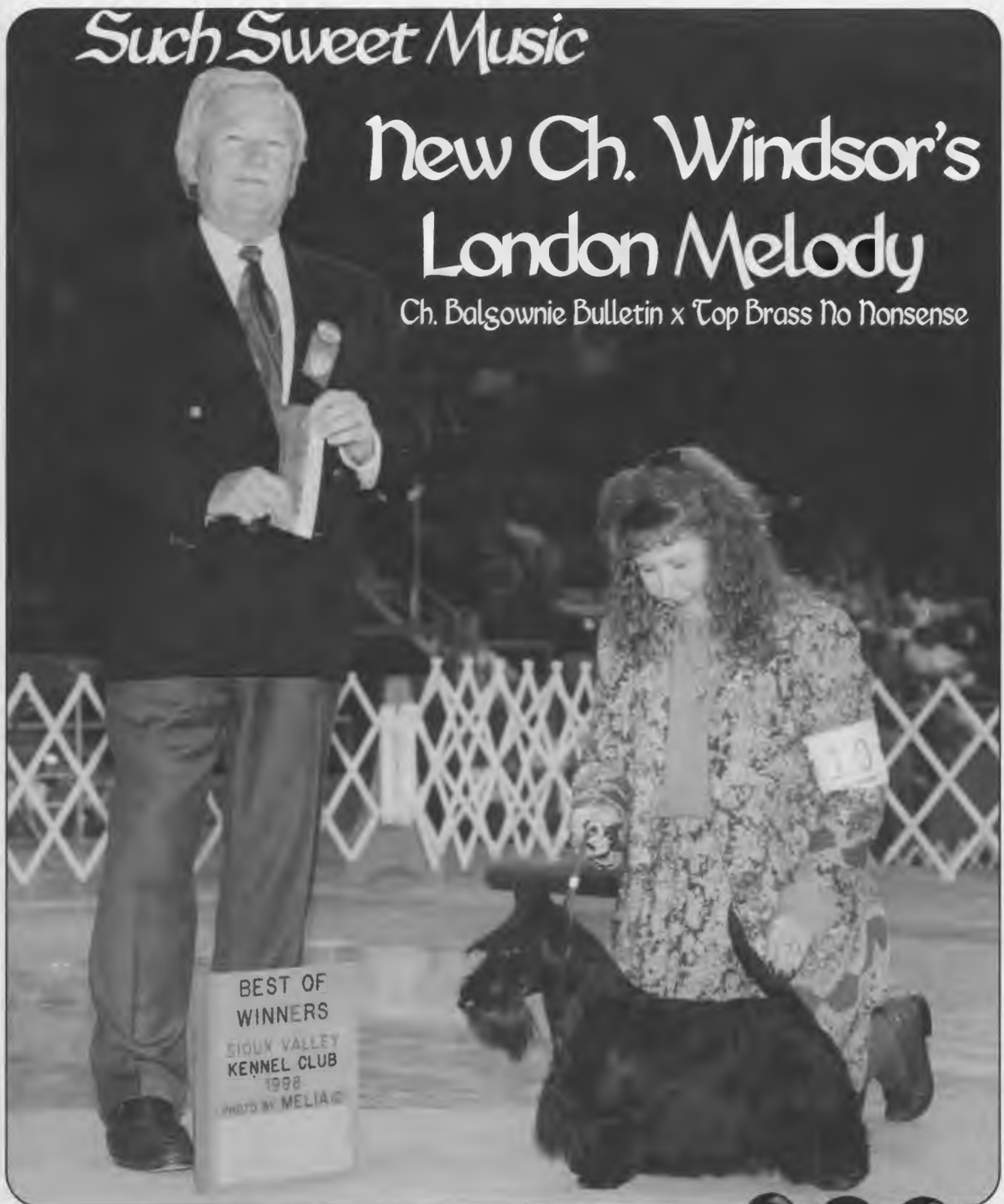

Adages, Homilies, Precepts and Maxims

Reproduced from "English Dog World", December 1997

1. Do realize that dogs are living creatures with senses, needs and feelings and that their well-being, health and happiness are your responsibility. These must be your first considerations and should take precedence over all other factors of fame, glory or material benefits.

2. Nobody is compelled to keep animals, so be sure that you do so for the right reasons. It is both a privilege and a commitment; a way of life which is demanding and time-consuming, but also very rewarding. It should be a partnership which can enrich life for both sides, adding a new dimension to one's everyday demands and obligations.

3. Enjoy your dogs and appreciate how wonderful it is that it is possible to share your life with such fascinating members of the animal kingdom.

4. Try to ensure that you and your dogs obey all the written and unwritten rules of good behavior so none of you bring discredit to dogdom.

5. Value other people's contributions to the world of dogs, whether as breeders, exhibitors, judges, journalists, or simply as dog-owners, or dog-lovers. Collectively, all these make up the group of which you, too, are a part.

6. Breeders, exhibitors and judges are the guardians of their chosen breed. They should endeavor to further the interests of the breed in every way possible and also try to ensure that the original characteristics have been retained.

7. Don't wear rose-colored spectacles when among your own dogs for this will hinder your progress; appreciate their virtues but be aware of their shortcomings. But a dog is both born and made and it will never achieve top honors without a great deal of work, time, trouble and effort being embarked upon at home.

8. Don't imagine that you are the only person who has ever had a run of bad luck such as bitches missing, puppies dying, promising youngsters developing faults, good dogs getting bumped and other setbacks. Others, too have experienced these and worse misfortunes.

But the strong ones have survived, and you can do so too.

9. Do believe that if you have a really good specimen in perfect condition its merits will be recognized. Today's expert was also once a novice and only achieved success by his skills, so you can do so too if you have top stock and equal abilities.

10. You may have a good dog but few dogs are unbeatable. Other people also have good ones and sometimes they too deserve to win. However you must not complain when you lose if you have second-quality stock or if it is badly presented, for you are then where you deserve to be.

11. "Star quality" is not easily defined, but it has to do with character, deportment, style, stance and certain intangible factors which, in addition to type and soundness, bestow an invisible "aura" upon an animal which can be a positive impact on beholders.

12. There are three collective ways to assess a dog: visually, manually and on the move. There are some dogs which look better than they really are, while others may be better than they initially appear to be, so all aspects must be considered.

13. Be sure you don't knock people or dogs because for some reason you are prejudiced against them. Try to keep an open mind and to appreciate the good things they may have to offer.

14. You must not expect others to be ecstatic when you win if you show no pleasure when they do, for this must be a two-way exchange.

15. When judging be courteous to exhibitors and gentle with their dogs. Dog shows should be enjoyable for all, so do your best to ensure this is the case.

16. Don't be a fault judge for this is not constructive and is the prerogative of the beginner or those without perceptive ability. Look for good dogs; no dog is perfect but its merits may well outweigh its faults; so try to assess it as a whole; look for the good points

and then you can consider where there is room for improvement.

17. Be brave enough to select an unknown dog for top honors if you are confident in your own judgement. But don't try to be a "Clever Dick", for remember that later results must prove that you were right.

18. Don't imagine that only your top awards are important. Every single placing will be remembered forever by someone! It can well be the case that a really bad "boob" may permanently have lost you a valuable supporter, so every placing should be carefully considered.

19. If a written critique is required be sure to fulfill this obligation conscientiously and with thoroughness and care. There can be only two reasons why you fail to do so: lack of ability (can't give reasons; don't know why I placed them as I did) or lack of interest (can't be bothered; why waste my time writing about these dreary people and their dogs?).

Both reasons seem to question the suitability of the elected judge. Exhibitors have paid a marked compliment by entering under him/her; they have spent money, time and trouble in doing so. Surely, in return, the judge should show his or her appreciation by spending a little time writing a helpful and constructive report.

20. Have faith in yourself. Listen to the views of the experts, but also be independent and make your own decisions. Be optimistic and look to the future, but also be realistic. Miracles rarely occur and success is usually attributable to skill, application, enthusiasm and hard work.

May you find life among dogs and doggy people that has brought you pleasure and a degree of fulfillment. But it would also be a bonus if you too had contributed something to further the interests of the world of dogs.

AN ACT OF Kindness

Once in a while someone comes along to restore one's faith in humanity. Primo is such a person. A consultant for the US Marine Corp, he was at Camp LeJeune, NC on business in June of this year when he found two Scottish Terriers in the parking lot of his hotel. They were heading for a major highway and would never have survived. In spite of being in really bad shape with fleas, runny ears and eyes and huge bald spots, they were friendly and seemed happy to meet a kindly human. Primo took them to a veterinarian in the area and agreed to pay all expenses for whatever treatment they needed. He returned to his home in Pennsylvania but kept in touch with the vet.

We were contacted by Primo two weeks later. He had found us on the Internet and needed help finding homes for these two boys he had named Bobby and Pete. They had been vaccinated, groomed and treated for their various health problems. North Carolina is one of the States where we have no rescue contacts but Wee Beasties Scottie Rescue in Virginia has been covering that area for us and agreed to take the dogs if we could not find a home for them.

Pat from Columbia, South Carolina had contacted us a short time before this about adopting another Scottie as a companion for her Ashes. South Carolina is another State where we are still trying to find some rescue help and

had been unable to refer Pat to a source. We contacted her and asked if she might be interested in two Scotties and it did not take her long to decide when she heard the story.

Primo and Pat met at the veterinary clinic and she took possession of the two dogs. As she was going on a trip and Ashes was to be boarded for a week, Bobby & Pete went to the same kennel in adjoining runs so they could all become acquainted while she was gone. On her return they all went home together and everyone is getting along fine.

We receive regular updates from Pat. "Pete" is now "Primo Le Dude" and is still fighting ear infections but otherwise they are both healthy dogs. Primo spent over \$600 on their veterinary care and refused to accept any reimbursement from Pat or from us. He asked that any donations are made to rescue and we designated the Wee Beasties group. This man is an extraordinarily humane and generous person. We all hope that he understands how grateful we are to him for his act of kindness.

In her latest message to us, Pat says, "I've decided they must have been "meant" to come here. There were so many little "accidents" of fate that got us together and they are all getting along with no trouble. It is a real joy to have them all. All three - including Her Majesty Ashley - are better for it."

.....

Not all of the rescue stories have happy endings but many more would have if we had more volunteers to help us in areas that are not currently covered. There are several states with no rescue coverage at all. If you live in one of these states and think you would be willing to help, please contact us. If you are willing to cover an entire state or just the shelters within a 10 or 20 mile radius of your home, we will welcome your help and give you all the assistance you will need. You do not have to bring strange dogs into your home if you do not wish to. The dogs picked up at shelters can be taken to a veterinarian for evaluation and treatment.

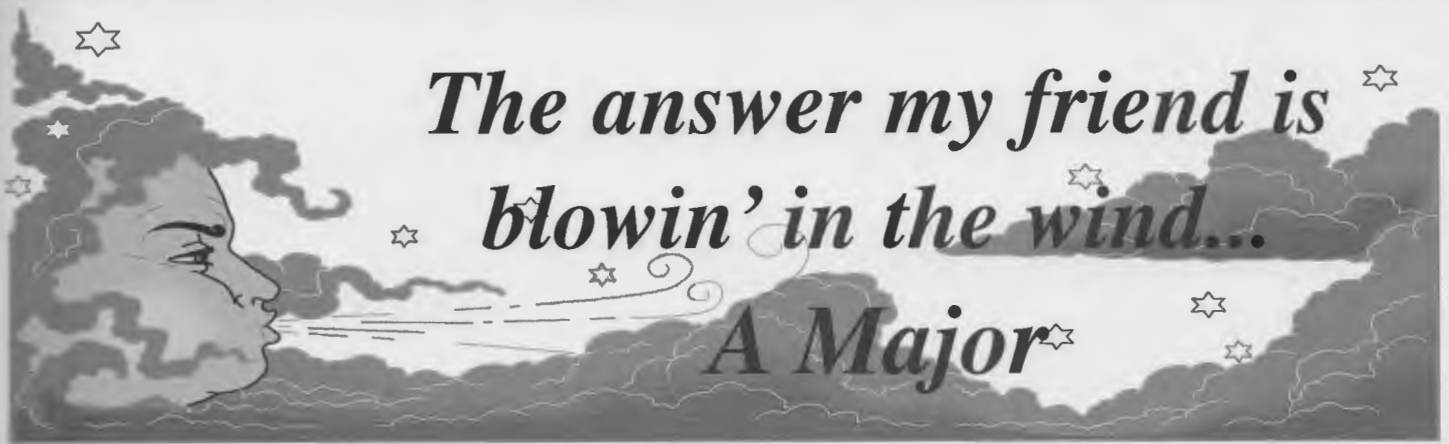

MONTGOMERY COUNTY SWEEPSTAKES

Judge: *Cindy Cooke*

As I drove to Lulu Temple to begin judging the 1998 STCA Fall Sweepstakes, I realized that it had been exactly twenty years since I showed my first puppy in the Montgomery Sweeps to Betty Cooper. Ten years later, I won Best of Breed at Montgomery from the classes with Heat Wave, still the best day of my life. Now I was looking forward to the honor of judging some of the best youngsters in our breed. I've learned many important lessons in those twenty years, and I can honestly say that I've learned something from every fancier I met along the way—a grooming tip here, a handling tip there, good sportsmanship from good sports and poor ones. (Once you've seen someone behave badly at a dog show, you never want to look like that!) In any event, before I discuss the dogs, I would like to share the most important lessons I have learned in the past twenty years.

A breeder's job is to preserve breed type and breed type is defined by the standard. A breeder does not improve upon the standard. You can improve your individual dogs and your line but the standard sets the type.

There is only one correct type of Scottish Terrier and that is defined by the standard. Dogs may vary to a lesser or greater degree from the standard and still be recognizable as Scotties but to the degree that they vary from the standard, they are incorrect. I was in England some years ago watching a show when I expressed admiration for what I now know was a very fox-terrierish type of Scottie. Susan Gaskell, one of England's most successful breeders, turned to me and said, "It's a very smart little terrier but it's not a Scottie!" I never forgot those words and I never again allowed myself to be distracted by a flashy dog that lacked breed type.

To really comprehend the standard, you must study it and read everything written

on the subject. The very best books on the subject are out of print and expensive to buy, if you can even find them, but they are worth every penny you spend. I particularly recommend you read the complete works of William McCandlish, Dorothy Casperz, and Fayette Ewing. You can disregard the outdated theories on veterinary care and genetics but their words on the standard should be read and carefully considered by every Scottie lover.

To be a successful breeder you must be able to see where your dogs, and your competitors' dogs, depart from the standard and where they are in compliance with the standard. You cannot improve unless you know where you need improvement and unless you know where to go to find better dogs to add to your line.

In the early days of the dog fancy, most show dogs were owned by wealthy owners who kept big kennels—a hundred dogs was not unusual. The kennel manager's livelihood depended on his ability to pick winners so he had to be totally objective in deciding which dogs to show and breed. Today, however, breeders keep small numbers of dogs. These dogs live in the house and are members of the family. Being objective under these circumstances is like asking a mother to see faults in her children. My Mom was astonished when a steely-eyed gym teacher told her I was bowlegged. "Her legs are just fine—they're just like mine," she retorted angrily. No matter how much you love your dogs, however, you will never breed better dogs until you can evaluate them objectively despite your affection for them.

If you're a small breeder, you will often find yourself in the position of keeping a dog to show because you don't have anything else. That's fine but don't inflate the dog's quality in your mind just because it's all you have. Show it, finish it, but don't keep it unless it's an improvement over your last generation.

It was truly an honor to have so many of you bring your puppies to me. Overall, we have much to be proud of. Fronts are significantly improved—I had only one really bad front. Layback was generally good, briskets were deep, and most puppies had forechest. One consistent problem, however, continues to be the short upper arm. The upper arm should be almost equal in length to the scapula, otherwise, the front legs will not be set back under the body. Toplines and tailsets were excellent, as were coats. Eyes were very good—I had no light eyes, very few large eyes. I had more round eyes than I would like to see but they were at least small, and dark.

Two serious problems, however, were very apparent: heads and rears. I saw a number of short, broad heads and short muzzles. These "cat" faces are extremely untypical and should not be tolerated. A Scottie must have a long head, long

enough to balance the moderately wide skull, and a long, powerful muzzle, big enough to hold a mouthful of big teeth. Anything else is a serious fault—remember the head alone is 25% of the points in the standard.

The second serious problem was in the hindquarters. Many otherwise lovely puppies went unplaced under me because of faulty hindquarters and poor rear movement. Marg Moran McQuinn recently wrote an excellent article on Scottie movement for this magazine. During her research for the article, she found a number of breeders who expressed the belief that the Scottie roll is in the rear! This is absolutely incorrect. Read Brown, Gilbert, and Elliott on canine locomotion. Then get the A.K.C. video on the Scottish Terrier and view the first black dog whose rear movement is used as an illustration. That is PERFECT rear movement. It comes from well-angulated stifles, short hocks, powerful thigh muscles and plenty of quarters behind the tail. (The second dog should never have been used to illustrate good movement in the rear—his hocks are too long and that swishy rear is the result!) Everyone should watch his/her dog in action from every point of view, but we must all particularly concentrate on improving Scottie rears.

Now to the placements:

6-9 Puppy Dogs

The decision between my first and second place dogs was a close one. They were very similar in body type—compact, with good toplines and tailsets, and deep bodies. The first place dog was not as refined in the head as second place dog but was a little more on his toes on the day. My third place dog was somewhat different in style, with a longer head and a somewhat longer body. His ears and eyes were not quite as good as the first two dogs. Fourth place went to another typey Scottie with good eyes and ears, good coat, and a high tail set. He was acting up a little for his owner on the day.

6-9 Puppy Bitches

My first place bitch was slung low between her legs with a deep front, good rib spring, and a very high tailset. My second place bitch pushed her hard with a hard coat in good condition; small, well-shaped ears; and attitude to spare. This bitch was slightly taller than I like in proportion to her length of body. My third place puppy kept improving as the class went on. She will be a standout when she's in better coat and has a little experience under her belt. My fourth place bitch had an exquisitely feminine head, a super hard coat, a high tailset, and a strong topline. I would prefer her to be slightly more substantial and stronger in the rear.

9-12 Puppy Dogs

This class provided some of the drama of the day. Kim Lindsay's Wild Wind Son

of the Sea decided to stop walking when it really mattered. He pulled himself together on Sunday and went Reserve Winners Dog. He has a superb rear and a lovely masculine head, cobby body, high tailset, beautiful expression. The class was eventually won by Mary Ann Cole's dog, very similar in type. He is a big, masculine boy with a deep body and good forechest. In good condition, he used himself throughout. Second place went to somewhat different style of dog. He had a long, very clean head, although he could use a bit more stop. His ears were set up high and he never stopped using them. He was very heavy in bone with an excellent coat. First place dog had somewhat more rib spring, depth of chest, and breadth front and rear. My third place dog excelled in body type—deep chest, low slung body, and a good topline. He was on his toes every minute. His head could use some refinement in the cheeks. My fourth place dog excelled in his headpiece & coat, but could be stronger in the rear.

9-12 Puppy Bitches

My first place bitch was a littermate to the dog that gave away the 9-12 dog class. This bitch is a feminine version of her brother—elegant headpiece, substantial body, deep chest, rib spring, well-ribbed up. She used herself very well. She was pushed hard by my second place girl, a hard-coated black bitch with small, high-set ears, and lovely dark eyes. This bitch showed non-stop. The first place bitch eventually won on the strength of her long, clean headpiece. I regret that the portion of tape dealing with my third and fourth place bitches in this class was inaudible.

12-18 Dogs

My first place dog excelled in coat, which was harsh and straight. He had a deep body, with substance in a small package. His topline was hard and level and his tail set on high. My second place dog was somewhat longer bodied but with a splendid headpiece: long, clean, with almond-shaped eyes and good planes. I would prefer a slightly smaller ear. My third place dog was in excellent coat, good topline, high tailset and attitude to spare. My fourth place dog had a cobby body, small well-shaped ears, and showed to his best advantage. Both third and fourth place dogs would have placed higher with longer heads.

12-18 Bitches

My first place bitch was also Best in Sweeps. To me, she exudes breed type. First of all, she had a lovely long head with clean cheeks, parallel planes, and balance between skull and muzzle. Her body was deep with plenty of forechest and hindquarters. Her ribs were well sprung and her body was exceptionally well ribbed up. She moved freely and was a pleasure to watch from any aspect, show-

ing plenty of fire when required. Second place went to a lovely brindle bitch, not as broad in body as the first place bitch but with a lovely long head and hard expression. Third place went to a wheaten bitch with excellent bone and substance, a harsh coat, and excellent hindquarters. Her expression was somewhat softer than the first and second place bitches and her head not quite as feminine. I liked my fourth place bitch very much and could have placed her higher but she was not quite on her toes on the day. When she was sparring, her quality shone out-lovely head; strong topline and tailset; deep, broad body, good front and hindquarters. Whether or not this girl decides to turn it on in the ring, she should produce very well for her owners.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY REGULAR CLASSES

Judge: *Sandra Goose Allen*

It was particularly heartwarming to share in the Scottish Terrier Club of America's 155th Specialty in such a splendid manner. Being chosen to judge the breed I have made a member of my family for the past 15 years was indeed an honor.

I was confident the day would go smoothly because of my four (yes, FOUR) capable ring stewards. Jerry Roszman, Muriel Lee, John Sheehan and Dick Hall were fabulous! I expected every moment and every dog to be special, thereby creating a magical experience. I was not disappointed. Certainly, if one were to try balancing the scales over the past years, our breed has enjoyed gains which far outweigh the losses. Through the efforts of conscientious breeders, improvement in type as dictated by the standard is very much in evidence.

Overall quality was excellent throughout, though I did find more depth in the bitch classes.

Winners Dog and BW (from the Bred by Exhibitor Class): Dragoon Spectator

Sporting a handsome masculine head on a beautiful deep body, he moved with great reach and drive and showed with rousing Scottie enthusiasm. On this day he carried himself with pride and moved with purpose as he competed with the other superb class winners.

Reserve Winners Dog (from the 9-12 Puppy Class): Wild Wind Son of The Sea

Another handsome dog who pressed hard for the win. He was masculine in head and body but did not show with great gusto.

Winners Bitch (from the Open Bitch Class): Anstamm Cosmopolitan

The essence of femininity, lovely head, eyes, top line and tail set. Sister to my Winners Dog, she exuded attitude and soundness. She was excellent both com-

ing and going and looked oh so lovely from the side.

Reserve Winners Bitch (from the 12 to 18 Class): Anstamm Mistyglenn Show No Mercy

This young lady, with lovely head and expression, showed well and moved with an easy effortless gait.

Veterans Dog and Best of Opposite Sex CH Sparwyn Low N Behold

One could never refer to this dog as a "senior Citizen". The years have touched him with a feather! Some of our younger Specials might take heed and look with envy at his excellent condition, balance and movement.

Best of Breed

Ch ScotSmith Rhapsody in Blue

I really lost my heart to this beautiful bitch. Many of her qualities exemplify the breed standard. She was structurally correct with excellent planes, top line, tail set and head. She moved superbly from every angle and was presented flawlessly!

I felt like a kid (a rather wet kid!) in a candy store as my Winners Classes came into the ring. What an incredible sight. Deep with quality, they were filled with sound, happy Scotties presented skillfully by their breeders, owners and handlers and with a keen sense of sportsmanship.

Still, with all this quality, there are a few areas which call for the attention of our dedicated breeders. Some rears were wobbly; too close or lacking drive. There were eyes too light in color or too round in shape and fronts with no breadth and some lacking forechest.

I always strive to judge the whole dog...soundness, condition, balance, and temperament all contribute to the overall breed type for which we aim and are prerequisites to any good show dog. Additionally, in Scotties, size plays an important role in my decisions. I look for a low-to-the-ground balanced dog. I urge you to keep the best interest of the Scottish Terrier paramount in your minds while striving for breed type. Remember, the Standard is your Bible.

I want to express my thanks to incoming President Maxine Stickler who did not forget a thing. Her graciousness, warmth and sense of humor make her a favorite in this household! My hostess, Nancy Beaver, inattentive when I said, "I really can't eat chocolate", delivered a huge basket which was, of course, devoured! I am so proud to be a member of this grand organization.

best eyes (color and shape) of the day.

2) Taking a walk in the park?? Naughty! You must show your dog with enthusiasm!
