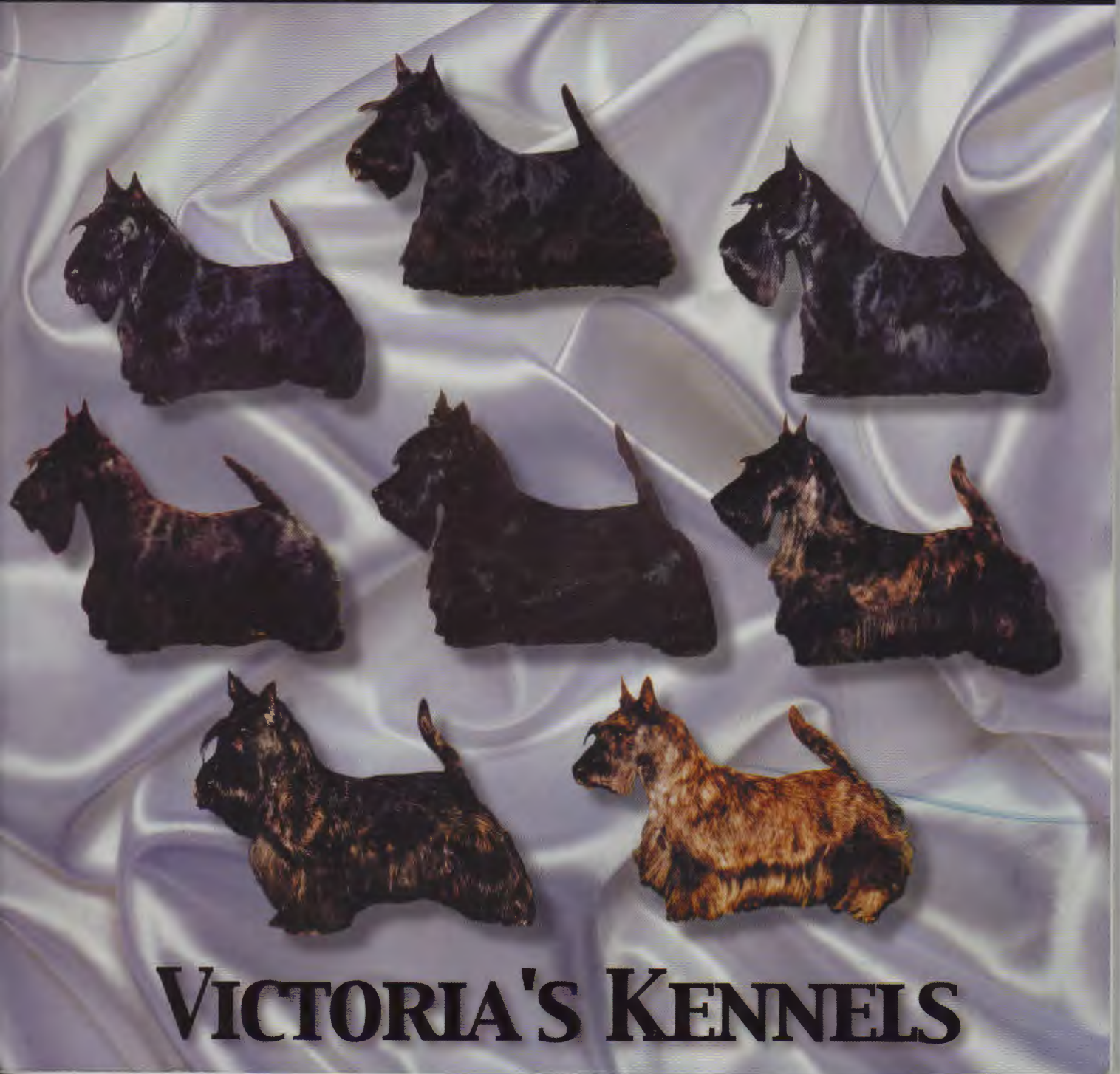

JUDGES' EDUCATION COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Happy New Year everybody. Another year and already we are starting to get up and moving. Don't forget that we have breed seminars in Chicago on February 26, 2000, Kansas City on March 18, 2000, and of course the Rotating in Friendship, Maryland on April 23, 2000. All of the work as of now is in preparation for these upcoming seminars.



Are you thinking of applying to become a judge? Did you know that AKC has recently revised the requirements for first time applicants? In a recent article as published in the December issue of the AKC Judges Newsletter indicates that a major change in policy effects the minimum requirements for new breed applicants. The changes are as follows:

You may apply for no more than 13 breeds on the first application. (It has been suggested to me that most people that apply should look seriously at applying for only their original breed unless they can show a good history of involvement in other breeds that they also wish to apply for. You may want to talk to your local field rep. before you put in a large amount of work in that first application).

You must have a minimum of 12 years in the sport - up from 10 years.

You must have bred at least five (5) litters in one breed - up from four (4).

You must have finished at least four (4) champions in one breed - up from two (2).

You must be able to show that you have completed at least six (6) stewarding assignments - up from five (5).

You must successfully complete an anatomy test.

Applicants who do not meet the litter and champions bred requirements may use ALTERNATE QUALIFYING EXPERIENCES. This system allows applicants with a minimum of 15 years experience in the sport to use their background and experience to accrue 60 points in each breed in order to apply to judge. This is a system where you get points for the years spent in the breed; points for the years you have owned the breed; champions you have finished; and so on.

So for you guys out there that are quick to comment on judging, now is the time for you to jump out there and really let your voices be heard. Spend some time out in the middle of the ring. You have no idea what it's like till you try it!

See you at the Rotating!!!!

DNA TESTING: THE FUTURE IS NOW!

One only has to pick up a newspaper, or to watch TV, to see how DNA testing has affected our lives. Crimes are solved many years after the trail has gone cold; paternity suits in the courts are simplified when the DNA match is made with the father, even criminals have been freed after years in jail because the real culprit is found when the DNA match is made. Modern medicine has made great strides in identifying genetically-inherited diseases such as cancer and heart disease in humans and we applaud them for this progress. Yet, why is it that we dog breeders are still so hesitant to DNA test our breeding stock?

DNA testing is painless and harmless, but its benefits are far-reaching. Over the last few years your Parent Club, the Scottish Terrier Club of America, has undertaken the task of identifying the genes which produce von Willibrand's Disease, a Factor-8 clotting problem, that may cause an affected animal to bleed to death. The result is, that through the generous support of breeders and fanciers, we

now have a test that is definitive AND accurate, and with time and testing, we can eliminate completely this disorder from our Scots. Many of you have had your dogs tested, but many of you have not. Why, then, don't more people avail themselves of this test?

The American Kennel Club has undertaken to require DNA tests for certain types of registrations. For the past several years, the AKC has required that stud dogs used for fresh cooled or frozen semen breedings must have the DNA parentage registry on file before the offspring of the litter produced in that breeding can receive its litter registration. Beginning July 1, 2000, every sire producing seven (7) or more litters in a lifetime or producing three(3) or more litters in a calendar year must be "AKC DNA Certified." These DNA Profiles will be used for genetic identity and for parentage verification, and will relate to issues pertaining to the integrity of the AKC registry.

As a Club, we have spent a lot of time and energy in getting the DNA vWD test

perfected and available to our membership. Barbara DeSaye and members of the Health Trust Fund have made the DNA testing kits readily available (and discounted) by bringing them to every National Specialty Show over the past few years. Before long, we will have other DNA tests.

At its meeting in January, your STCA Board decided to "put our money where our mouth is." If we believe in the welfare of our breed and we encourage our membership to participate in the testing, then we should start by asking our membership to certify that they have tested their breeding stock. To this end, **beginning with Issue #2 of THE BAGPIPER, (April 30, 2000) all advertisers in the magazine must declare that the Scottish Terriers in the advertisement are "DNA Tested for vWD" or "Not DNA Tested for vWD."** To quote Barbara DeSaye, "We must start somewhere if all this research is to work for our breed."

THE ETERNAL NOVICE

Consulting with Experts and Upgrading Skills are Keys to Success

As a breeder of Cairn Terriers in the 1930's and Chow Chows since the early 1960's, with some experience with Cocker Spaniels in the '50's, I have often asked myself these questions: Why are there so few breeders who achieve splendid success? What are the accomplished progenitors of influential bloodlines doing that most others are not?

Before I go any further, a definition of what is meant by breeding success should be offered. First, it involves a person whose breeding has influenced and enhanced the specific breed considerably, one whose show specimens consistently win Best of Breed, Sweepstakes and Specialties and even some Group and Best in Show awards (the last being less essential than the others). Finally, it's someone whose bloodlines have produced champions -- quality champions -- not just vast number of mediocre specimens.

In my profession as a college professor, questions about success also arise. For instance, in my English 101 seminar of 18 writers, one-third of the class receives an A for their final mark. That percentage of excellence by far outdistances the percentage of excellence of dog breeders. Such success in college is due not only to proficient teaching, but also to the students' willingness to grow intellectually, to strive to be the best.

Certainly, we can draw a parallel between excellent academic performance and first-rate dog breeding. The college instructor demonstrates how to write a critical essay by explaining to students the whole process of intellectual analysis, the importance of including certain information and other points necessary for success. In the same way, patterns are in place to teach breeders how to accomplish high goals.

And for us dog people, the basic teacher remains the breed standard -- and everything else written and videotaped on the breed.

To continue the academic comparison even further, when the students receive their essays back, they find many suggestions for upgrading their ideas and writing. The message is clear: "A good start, but you can improve." This communication would apply equally well to both college scholars and students of breeding.

In the dog world, established breeders with years of success can and do give advice when asked. Unfortunately, few breeders ever seek the advice of first-rate authorities, or even an excellent all-rounder. "Nobody ever consults me about breeding Manchester Terriers and Bull Terriers," William Kendrick, a

world connoisseur of those breeds, reported. And even such a respected authority as Derek Rayne is seldom queried. "I'd be willing to pass on whatever I know about any breed," he told this writer. "But I'm never, or seldom ever, invited."

When students need study and advice, they seek out their professor, visit the library or a writing workshop where the fine points of style are addressed. For such refinements in the breeding program, there is a vast array of educational symposia offered by the AKC and by breed clubs, addressing issues of broad concern, such as how one may improve the ear-set or texture of coat in the case of Cairns, or how to breed for more leg and appropriate square balance in the case of Chows.

Indeed, the methodology remains in place for breeding superior, first-rate specimens, just as the know-how is open to students who listen to their professors, seek to upgrade their skills and ask for more assistance.

In academic halls the paradigms are followed, in dogs, mostly not. Why not? An attitude exists among many breeders that "it's better to go it alone." But in this writer's view such a consideration is one of the basic reasons why so many mediocre dogs exist today. The tools of education and scientific knowledge are available.

But if one faces facts, the majority of dog breeders appear to be satisfied with breeding average dogs, dogs that wear drab everyday clothes, that never inspire joy nor dreams. Such mediocrity limits breeders to partial success only, scarcely ever to the highest accolades that could be theirs.

From the tax side of the Scottish Terrier

BY GENE HAINS

Showing dogs is an expensive endeavor. The tax laws being what they are, imply that when you spend money, you should get a tax write off. That's only logical and fair. The only problem with that is that the tax laws are NOT necessarily logical or fair. Let's walk through the process of running a Scottish Terrier business and getting the deductions.

The first hurdle to get past is the hobby loss. Your activity must be "engaged for profit" that is, gross income exceeds deductions. Making a profit in a single year isn't enough. A profit must exist three out of every five years. By the way, not deducting an expense, like entry fees, so that you show a profit for a particular year won't help. A seasoned examiner will compare expenses year to year analyzing why a year was profitable, and will impute the "left off expense" thereby probably creating a loss. When the loss is created, then the operation doesn't meet the "3 out of 5" profit test and the agent starts disallowing prior losses. (Very messy).

When the "3 out of 5" year test can't be met or if the profits are extremely small in relation to the losses, the business will have to meet the "facts and circumstances test." You must prepare for this in advance. The IRS uses a nine factor test to help show whether it's a business or hobby. The nine factors are as follows:

1. Manner in which the taxpayer carries on the activity
2. Expertise of the taxpayer or advisors
3. Time and effort personally spent by the taxpayer in carrying on the activity
4. Expectation that assets used in activity may appreciate in value.
5. Success of the taxpayer in carrying on other similar or dissimilar activities
6. Taxpayer's history of income or loss with respect to the activity
7. Amount of occasional profits, if any
8. Financial status of the taxpayer
9. Elements of personal pleasure or recreation

The Internal Revenue Service can weigh items differently but relies heavily on items 1 and 9. In order to show that you are running a business you should keep thorough and business-like books, use a separate checking account, obtain insurance and licenses, keep a log of time devoted, and document research of similar operations.

Okay, so you get past the first hurdle, you can qualify as a business. What's next? Aggressive agents will try to segment your business. For example, they have challenged a Poodle grooming shop and show operation. The agents wanted to say that these were two operations and that the grooming was profitable but the

showing was a hobby (and non-deductible hobby loss). The taxpayers prevailed in this case, but not until they made it to tax court. (Expensive and time consuming). After the tax court case this method of attack has slowed somewhat. The next battleground can be ethics related. Do you breed every bitch that crosses your threshold? Of course not, some are just not worthy. The business side of the code says that you're passing up income, and a crafty businessperson would not do that, so this must be a hobby.

Why all the fuss about business versus hobby? You have to report all your income anyway – business or hobby. The difference is the expenses. A business can deduct all expenses and offset other income with the loss generated. A hobby is limited to expenses up to income and should be denoted as "Expenses limited by Section 183." There are hobby deductions ordering rules. Consult your tax advisor for your specific deductions.

Finally remember, when you look up dogs in the tax code, if my memory serves me correct, it says "See Hobby Losses" or gives you directions to your closest Internal Revenue Service Examination office.

Got A Pack?

OBEDIENCE AND PERFORMANCE EDITOR

A lot of us, myself included live with more than one dog. I have eight. These include six Scotties, a Smooth Collie and a Borzoi. Because they are a pack they have a hierarchical system of dominance. The dominant dog threatens submissive ones in order to maintain its position. The submissive dogs wouldn't think of threatening the dominant dog. Humans in the household, hopefully, are the alpha leader. When this happens the household runs fairly smoothly. The people dictate when, where and how all the dogs should behave. They accept the people as their leader, no questions asked. Sometimes this isn't always the case. A person or persons in the household may be the object of threats by a dominant dog in the pack. He may be possessive of his toys or food dish or aggressive in defense of his territory. The reaction of most people in this situation is to back off. In doing so the dog is rewarded for his aggression. Dogs are very good at training humans. To physically discipline an adult is difficult and at the least, dangerous. In order to reverse the dominance-submissive behavior, the person needs to use some behavior modification.

The person should avoid all situations that they know evokes aggressive behavior in the dominate dog. If there are other family members, they should completely ignore the dog.

A dog in this situation needs to work for everything. The submissive person should give the dog commands which he has to obey before he can even be petted, fed or let out, etc. They also should take over the complete care of the dominant dog so that he realizes that everything "good" in his life comes from that person.

The training should include basic obedience along with a few fun tricks to make it even more appealing to the dog. The use of food treats and lots of praise for a job well done will make the training easier. This reversal behavior does not happen over night. It takes lot of patience and weeks to even months of work. The more time a person spends with one dog the more confident they feel. As in any training, one does not stop because the goal was achieved. Keep reinforcing what the dog has already learned so he doesn't slip back into his old ways.

What about the other dogs in your household pack? Don't ignore them. It is very easy for dogs to become jealous of one another. Be sure to budget some extra time in your day for the other individual dogs. Do something away from the rest of the pack. Take a walk, play ball, work on a few commands, or even groom. Whatever you decide to do, make it upbeat and special.

It is also a good idea to do something with everyone as a group. I like to play "Simon Sez sit or down" and the first one to respond gets a treats. The dogs love it! After getting their attention I say, "Simon Sez sit or down" and the first one to respond gets a treat. They all have to follow the commands to get a treat. It keeps them on their toes, and it's a lot of fun!

The more one does with their dogs the less behavior problems they will encounter. The pack will be surprisingly congenial, and they will always look up to you as their leader.

Somewhere in Oklahoma

Somewhere in Oklahoma, the Scotties were three to a hutch. I counted 26 Scotties. Their world was three by eight feet small, and three feet off the ground. Ground for these Scotties was a metal grate. Two fall days were important to these Scotties and to 700 dogs of more than 50 breeds. They were being auctioned by a USDA facility whose flyer proclaimed it produces more than 3,000 puppies a year. Would their lives be better, or worse after this weekend in October? Vans, cars and trucks tagged Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Indiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, New Mexico and Iowa held the dogs' futures. The place going out of business in Oklahoma had a certain notoriety. It was where AKC judge and former Sealyham Terrier breeder Ray Bay had saved the Sealyham breed from commercialization in 1994. I'd written the story for *Dog News*, but never dreamed I'd see the facility. A certain sick curiosity drew me to the auction.

Thanks to an STCA member who also breeds Sealyhams, Bay learned in 1994 these breeders had begun to supply pet shops with Sealyhams. Bay convinced the couple that the Sealyham Terrier is not a good breed for commercial production. He bought their entire Sealyham colony, 32 dogs. Because Bay removed these Sealies from the commercial breeding loop, there are still fewer than 100 Sealyhams registered annually by the AKC.

There was no Ray Bay to save our Scotties from commercial production 60 or 70 years ago. I did not attend the auction to save Scotties. Even if I'd bought all the

Scotties, it would not have changed the grand picture, just the lives of 26 Scotties. The Scottie girls I saw were Gazebray, Urcella, Bernadette, Jenny, Honey, Butterscotch, Lassie, Georgia, Sadie, Megan, Tootsie Faye, Angel, Baby, Molly Little Muffin, Mattie, Pixie, Shiloh and Shennanigan. The fellas were Pathfinder, Abdulah, Spook, Congressman, Scott, Dude, Seadog, Wally and Jordan. They were 5 months to eight years old. Three were wheatens. The others were black, with several being black brindle. One was unregistered. Jenny was the bitch I was especially drawn to. She was one of a litter of five born to a Texas family that loves Scotties. Her breeder Rhonda (not an STCA member) has no idea how this USDA facility acquired Jenny. Rhonda sold the eight-week-old puppy to a nice young woman on Christmas Eve, 1996, as a gift for someone else. By early 1998 Jenny was listed in the AKC Stud Book Register as having produced her first litter, and it was for these commercial breeders who were now going out of business. Rhonda didn't know Jenny was being used commercially until I told her I'd seen Jenny's Stud Book listing. Picture taking was banned, and police officers working the auction enforced that order. I have no photos to document the first pens of Terriers I spotted. When I noted no blacks or brindles among them, I decided this USDA breeder simply specialized in wheaten Scotties. The head and body type was Scottie. Imagine my shock when the auction catalog showed those first dogs were AKC-registered West Highland White Terriers.

Packets full of information for potential puppy sellers were available, including purchase orders. I took a packet and learned how one broker expects the puppies it buys to be vaccinated, specifications for their collaring, and the USDA requirements for sale of puppies through a broker.

Especially interesting was the information sheet titled "Required Sire and Dam Information" which explains how this kennel/broker supplies a four-generation pedigree with every AKC-registered puppy it sells. Breeding practices the broker discourages are detailed: namely mother-son or full brother-sister matings. Father-daughter or half brother-sister matings are not desirable, but less worrisome. When puppies come from mother-son or full brother-sister matings, the information sheet states pedigrees must be returned to the breeders "to keep the store and the customer unaware of the dogs' lineage."

Just what does a commercial breeder receive for the puppies he sells through a broker? This broker's price list notes the payout for Scotties is \$130 (less \$20 for down ears). Some other terrier prices are: Cairns, \$145 (less \$20 down ears); Miniature Schnauzers, under 4.5 lbs., groomed, \$135; Miniature Schnauzers, over 4.5 lbs., groomed, \$90; West Highland White Terrier female, \$185 (less \$20 down ears), West Highland White Terrier male, \$135 (less \$20 down ears); Soft Coated Wheaten Terrier female, \$300; male, \$225. I didn't come home with Jenny. Neither did Rhonda. Jenny and the other 25 Scotties moved on to new "factories." America's pet shops are assured a continuing supply of Scottie puppies.

To prevent a fate like Jenny's for one of your dogs, learn more about commercial breeders. Good sources of information are: the annual USDA Animal Welfare: List of Licensed Dealers and the annual Animal Welfare Report, both available free of charge from USDA-APHIS-Animal Care, 4700 River Road, Unit 84, Riverdale, MD 20737-1234; Phone: 301/734-4981; and e-mail: ace@usda.gov. USDA World Wide Web Homepage: www.aphis.usda.gov/ac. Abridged USDA inspection reports are available on the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service Freedom of Information Act Website: <http://foia.aphis.usda.gov>.

Ovarian Cysts and Their Impact on Bitch Fertility

In February of 1997, I wanted to breed my Boxer bitch, Bitwyn's Shadow Fox. She had produced a very nice litter the first time she was bred – including a dog who went on to become a Top Twenty competitor this year. Unfortunately, she had come into heat near the end of January and Westminster week interfered with what I estimated to be the ideal time to breed. After we returned from Westminster, she was still acting very receptive so I had a progesterone test and a vaginal smear done to see if there was any chance that it might not be too late to breed her. I was delighted to be told the results of the progesterone test indicated that she was actually in "late prooestrous." And the following weekend would be the best time to breed according to the test results. The results of the vaginal smear however were more uncertain, but my vet felt we should trust the "progesterone test since it was known to be more accurate than vaginal smears." Based on the progesterone test results I decided to do the breeding even though it was her 18th and 20th days according to my calculations.

Needless to say, the breeding wasn't successful even though my bitch stood for the dog and accepted him. She is a very affectionate and playful bitch, and it was a good first experience for the young dog to whom she was bred. There was nothing in her own behavior that indicated any problem with the results of the progesterone test. And she gave me further hope that it was successful by going into a full blown false pregnancy. When enough time had passed to do an ultrasound, I had one done partly because I had noticed a few spots of blood discharging from her vulva. I was very disappointed to find there were no puppies, although I should not have been surprised because the "timing" of the breedings was way off according to my own calculations.

Shortly after the negative ultrasound, she appeared to be coming in season again. This was very disturbing because she is normally on a seven and half month cycle and barely two months had passed since

she was bred. I had further tests done and was amazed to find that according to the progesterone test, she was still in "late prooestrous" two months later. One of the tests performed by my vet was another obstetrical ultrasound but with the emphasis on the ovaries rather than the uterus. We wanted to see if there was any irregularity that could account for the strange readings we were getting on the blood work, including the latest set of progesterone tests. Nothing significant showed up on the ultrasound but clearly something was wrong.

At this point, I became very concerned and upon the recommendation of my own vet, took her to Dr. Katrin Hinrichs, a Theorologist (reproductive specialist) at Tufts University Veterinary School in North Grafton, Massachusetts. I have loved and lived through the treatment of another Boxer who suffered from cancer, and as any of us would under these circumstances, my first fear was that Vixen had cancer.

After extensive testing at Tufts Veterinary School, we discovered, by the use of their extremely powerful, state-of-the-art ultrasound machine, that Vixen had a very tiny ovarian cyst (about the size of the head of a pin) in one of her ovaries just beneath the surface of the ovary. The cyst was too small to have been detected by my regular vet's ultrasound machine which simply wasn't powerful enough to achieve the resolution needed to find the cyst. Here is the diagnosis from Tufts Veterinary School Hospital on 4/8/97:

"Vulvar bleeding without estrogenic stimulation. Vixen was bred on 2/15/97 and 2/17/97. Ultrasound for pregnancy on 3/29/97 showed she was not pregnant. Intermittent slight bloody discharge was noted starting 3/28/97.

A vaginal smear done today showed a typical non-estrus smear, indicating that Vixen probably doesn't have estrogen stimulation. A blood sample was drawn to measure progesterone levels; if Vixen was in a true heat in February the progesterone should be high.

Ultrasound revealed a small cystic structure within her right ovary although the ovary was of normal size. The left ovary looked normal. No fluid was noted within her uterus and no tumor-like structures were noted.

If Vixen's progesterone level is high, this would indicate that this cyst is insignificant and should not be treated. If her progesterone levels are low however, we should consider treating the cyst with hcG (human chorionic gonadotrophin) which acts like lutenizing hormone (LH) to cause the cyst to mature and eventually disappear.

A vaginonscopy was performed under sedation and no abnormalities were found, such as foreign bodies or masses that could explain the vulvar bleeding. According to test results the progesterone level is low."

Dr. Hinrichs suggested a series of hormone shots to attempt to have the cyst act like an ovum and erupt without having to resort to surgery on my bitch. She also requested that Vixen be tested for Cushing's disease (a thyroid related disorder). The test was done and Vixen was found to be free of Cushings and a thyroid profile was also done on 4/23/97 and her thyroid showed normal.

"Specimen: Serum Results Normal Range

- Total Thyroxine (TT4) 17 (15-50) nmol/L
- Total Triiodothyronine (TT3) 1.8 (1.0-2.5) nmol/L
- Free (Unbound) T4 (FT4) 18 (12-33) pmol/L
- Free (Unbound) T3 (FT3) 00 Quantity insufficient to test
- T4 Autoantibody 00 Quantity insufficient
- T3 Autoantibody 00 Quantity insufficient
- Thyroid Stimulating Hormone 11 (2-30) mU/L."

Dr. Hinrichs believed that because the cyst was so small, it was not stopping her reproductive cycles completely but was interfering with the normal hormone cycle she should have been experiencing. If the hormone shots didn't work, we could go in and remove the affected ovary which

should allow her one remaining ovary to function normally. Naturally, I hoped to avoid this option and its increased risk to Vixen.

To understand what was happening to my bitch, it is important to know exactly how a normal bitch's reproductive cycle works and how the cyst was impacting Vixen's cycle. A bitch's heat cycle (or **estrus**) usually lasts 21 days. The first part of the cycle is called **proestrus**. It is usually characterized by dark bloody discharge and the noticeable swelling of the vulva. Normally proestrus will last between 6 and 9 days, depending upon the individual bitch. The second stage of the heat cycle is called estrus (or standing heat) and is the period when the bitch will accept the male. Usually this is characterized by a softening of the vulva and a change in the color of the discharge from dark red to pinkish. The final stage, called **metestrus** begins when the bitch refuses to stand for the male and continues for a period between 60 and 105 days during which the uterus repairs itself. At the end of metestrus, the **anestrus** period begins (this is the "interheat" period) and, depending upon the individual bitch, will last from 100 to 150 days.

A bitch's reproductive cycle is governed by hormones released by the pituitary gland. The heat starts when the pituitary gland releases **FSH** (follicle stimulating hormone). This hormone causes the immature egg cell follicle in the ovary to begin to mature. As this happens, the follicle releases **estrogen**, which causes the change in the bitch's behavior and the secondary sex symptoms (like the bloody discharge and the swelling of the vulva). Another pituitary hormone called **LH** (lutening hormone) causes the maturing egg cell follicle to rupture and release the egg cells (ova) into the bitch's fallopian tubes. Ova must have another 72 hours in the fallopian tubes in which to complete the maturation process and become fully fertile. During the early part of this process, other hormones like progesterone normally are at lower levels. However, if there is an excess of progesterone present, it will block the production of **FSH** and the heat cycle will be aborted.

As the egg cell matures, it produces less estrogen and gradually increases the production of progesterone. It is the progesterone which causes the vulva to become soft and pliant during late proestrus and allows a fertilized ova to implant in the

uterine lining. Excess estrogen at this point will block the preparation of the uterine lining a shot of estrogen given within 7 days of a mating will prevent the implantation of the fertilized ova (the mis-mate shot). The used egg follicle (after the release of the egg cells) becomes a small cyst like structure called the corpus luteum. Its function is to continue the production of progesterone which is necessary to support the pregnancy. Without adequate progesterone, pregnancy is impossible and an abortion will result. Eventually, the corpus luteum itself dissolves (if there was no mating) and the anestrus period begins. However, if the ovaries become cystic, they will continue to produce estrogen and keep a bitch in season for much longer than is normal. A normal reproductive cycle depends heavily upon the right progression of hormones and the timing of their release if the hormone cycle is "out of order," normal heats and normal fertility will not occur.

During these tests and procedures, Vixen appeared to be in season again. It did not appear to be normal season but I would have liked to breed her if the hormone shots were successful. There is a great deal of reliance on progesterone testing to pinpoint the ideal time to breed bitches. I have been informed on several occasions that these tests are much more reliable than a vaginal smear. In Vixen's situation however, the vaginal smears I had done were a more reliable indicator of her condition than the progesterone tests. Initially, the hormone shots did not appear to work, although my own vet wasn't able to detect the cyst, it still showed up on an ultrasound done on Tufts' more powerful machine.

About a year later, another ultrasound by my own vet again showed no trace of the cyst, but more important to me, she had an apparently normal heat cycle since the original incident and had come into heat again with what appeared to be another normal heat cycle. Because she was now six years old and I hoped to breed her one more time, I arranged a breeding on the second "normal" season which was successful. By breeding her at what I calculated would be the correct time and by relying on the vaginal smears as well as progesterone tests, she became pregnant and delivered a small but healthy litter of two puppies on May 24, 1998. It is my belief that the size of her second litter was probably due to the fact that she still retained

the cyst, first discovered in the Spring of 1997. Her other ovary functioned normally which made it possible for Vixen to become pregnant and whelp healthy puppies when bred at the proper time but she only had two puppies because her cystic ovary still wasn't functioning correctly, in my opinion. Because of this and her age and the high incidence of cancer in Boxers and the fact that she went into uterine inertia with her second litter, it was necessary to have them delivered by cesarean section. I had Vixen spayed at the same time to prevent any further problems from developing.

After the experience I had with the progesterone tests with Vixen in February of 1997, I don't personally have all that much confidence in them. The vaginal smears that I had also had done turned out to have been much more accurate (in Vixen's case) than the progesterone test and if I had based my original decision on the vaginal smear results rather than the progesterone test results, I never would have bred her when the problem first occurred in February of 1997. My point is that progesterone tests are not 100% accurate and can give false readings, so it might be a good idea have your bitch checked by a reproductive specialist (if there is one in your area) before making any decisions on breeding, if you have been experiencing problems in getting a bitch to become pregnant.

The unerupted cyst which may have started its "life" as a regular egg cell that, for some reason, never matured properly and became encapsulated and cystic instead of being shed from her ovary, had a profound effect on Vixen's reproductive cycle. It is also possible, in my opinion, that an incident like this could be the basis for the development of an ovarian tumor. It might be a good procedure for every breeder, who is able to do so, to have a "complete" gynecological work-up done by a reproductive specialist on their bitches over the age of five if they are intended to be used for breeding again. Obviously it also makes sense to spay every bitch who will not be used for breeding again as soon as possible. While this won't diminish the chances of mammary cancer, it will certainly eliminate any chance of ovarian or uterine cancer from developing in our older bitches.

WHAT IS STCA RESCUE?

WE RECENTLY RECEIVED A COMMUNICATION VIA E-MAIL FROM A RESIDENT OF MASSACHUSETTS. IN PART SHE STATED:

"THERE WAS A MESSAGE ON THE SCOTTIE MESSAGE BOARD THAT 26 SCOTTIES WERE AUCTIONED AT A PUPPY MILL AND NONE WERE "REMOVED" BUT ANOTHER BREED RESCUE GROUP WAS THERE TO ACT ON BEHALF OF THEIR BREED. MY HEART SUNK TO FIND OUT THAT SEEMINGLY NO GROUP OF PEOPLE IS MAKING THE EFFORT TO REMOVE SCOTTIES FROM MILLS. WHERE DO WE SEND DONATIONS TO SCOTTIE MILL RESCUE? WE KNOW OF NO GROUP RESCUING MILL SCOTTIES. IT IS VERY DISHEARTENING TO FIND OUT THAT SEEMINGLY SCOTTIES ARE NOT BEING LOOKED OUT FOR ON THE MILL END OF RESCUE WORK. IS THE STCA RESCUE GROUP WILLING TO BE A REPOSITORY OF SCOTTIE MILL RESCUE FUNDS?" DETAILS FOLLOWED EXPLAINING HOW \$20,000 COULD BE RAISED TOWARDS THIS EFFORT. THE FOLLOWING IS MY REPLY.

Thank you for your comments regarding Scottie Rescue. I would like to start my reply by explaining what STCA Rescue is and what it is not. STCA Rescue is a collection of individuals and small groups who operate independently under the umbrella of the STCA. We, my husband Marshall and I, are probably typical of these individuals. We have two Scotties and one Westie and live in a house in a community where the ordinance states we may house four adult animals. When the rescues come in bunches, as they frequently do, we call upon good friends in similar circumstances to foster a dog for us. Currently we have a Westie recovering from heartworm treatment that is being fostered for a month by a friend who has two Scotties. Another Westie is

recovering from a very difficult spay in an ex-pen in our hallway. Two Scotties are with another friend in Austin and should be adopted today. As mentioned, we are typical of the small rescue operations that comprise the STCA Rescue. It is up to each one of us to fund our own programs and we do this for love of the breed. There is no great and glorious "them" who can go out and save the whole breed. Anyone, who enters into rescue work, does so to save one dog at a time. To think on any larger scale is to set oneself up for failure and fast burnout. We all have great compassion for every Scottie who is in harm's way but we realize we cannot save them all. Buying up dogs at auctions is just lining the pockets of the puppy mill operators. It is true that you can save a few of the older ones but you are just condemning another generation of bitches to a life of breeding in a cage. The auction you referred to had 26 Scotties for sale. There is one rescue person in that state and also in each of the surrounding states where puppy mills are prevalent. It is not possible for one person to handle 26 dogs that need extensive medical, physical and psychological treatment for an extended period. You might say that there lots of Scottie lovers who would take in a dog or two and rehabilitate them but are they prepared for dogs that have never had any socialization or proper medical care? You may have heard about the recent incident in Tennessee. The owners abandoned a puppy mill and several hundred dogs were left to die. When the authorities moved in, five Scotties needed to be rescued and one of the STCA members took them in. They were all infested with whipworms and hookworms and one whelped a singleton puppy hours after she arrived. Some of the other dogs from this mill were found to have brucellosis, which is highly contagious, and the Scotties had to be rushed to the vet's to be tested. Luckily for our member, they were not infected and her own Scotties were safe. After the purchase price has been paid for all these Scotties you think should be bought at auction, there is probably that amount again in veterinary bills. And who is going to be the brave person who goes to these auctions to bid on these

dogs? A past president of STCA did this once many years ago and still has nightmares about it. Read about some of the sights to be seen in these places on the www.nopupppymills web site. Have you ever been involved with rescue? Have you ever done breed search, as I have, in an animal control facility where dogs are being dragged into cages to be gassed? You try not to look into the eyes of the ones you cannot save while you look for the one Scottie that you can save. Then you walk away and spend many sleepless nights reminding yourself that you went into rescue to save "one dog at a time" and not the whole world. What happens when you go to one of these auctions and there are 26 Scotties and you only have the funds to buy 20? How do you decide which ones to save and which ones to abandon? There are far too many unanswered questions that you have not thought out. Unless the national and state governments change their policies regarding "dog farming" these places are not going away. The only way the puppy mills are going out of business is if people stop buying puppies from pet shops, brokers, flea markets, etc. Your flyer idea to educate people is an excellent idea and we commend you for that. You may change a few minds. There is an ad currently running in the newspapers in Texas for Scottish Terrier puppies. They are being sold by a rancher in a small town in Central Texas who is selling them for an USDA Broker/Breeder in Okla-homa. The people buying these puppies will think they did the right thing by buying from a "breeder" in the newspaper and not buying from a flea market or pet shop. They will be getting the same puppy mill puppies they would have bought at either of those places. This perhaps shows you the futility of trying to remove all Scotties from these places. I think we can speak for the STCA, when we say we would not wish to be involved in raising funds to purchase dogs from puppy mills, auctions, pet shops, or any other source. If you wish to help with rescue, we suggest you help locally by volunteering with the STC of New England Scottie Rescue.

Every day, several times a day, AOL announces "You've Got Mail." Most messages are not urgent and easy to deal with. Some require immediate attention and some raise the blood pressure. In the 1999 #1 Issue of the *Bagpiper*, the ladies of the Wee Beasties Scottie Rescue related the story of the 19 Scotties they had rescued from a small town in Virginia. At that time the owners of these dogs kept two females and one male (the number they were allowed under the new ordinance) to continue backyard breeding. These Scotties all seemed to be healthy and well cared for at that time. One year later they had fallen on hard times and this is their story.

THE END OF THE TALE VIRGINIA RESCUE

PART TWO

Saturday, August 21st 1999, is a day I will not forget. I received an e-mail message from Daphne informing me of three Scotties in trouble in Virginia. Daphne had given them the information on who to call but Roxanne, Martha and Kelly were on vacation and I was the only one available. I checked my voice mail and there was a message from one of the owners. He said he had been away for a time and the three Scotties had been placed in a desperate situation. He was adamant that we come and get them immediately and my husband Billy and I made arrangements to pick

them up. We had been to this pretty little town in 1998 to pick up 19 Scotties from this family. The owner was very upset about the condition of these dogs. He was in a serious domestic dispute, which resulted in his Scotties being put in a horrible situation. The little wheaten female, after being abandoned in her own backyard, had been taken to a farm. When she killed one of the owner's chickens, she was tied to a tree for the remainder of her stay. There were 16 dogs of all sizes and descriptions running loose on the property and this little girl, who has been named Gwen, was at the mercy of all this madness. An elderly lady offered Gwen a temporary home under her house, which was not a good situation but probably saved her life as she was being fed. She was very thin and very pregnant and looked very sick and miserable when we got her out from under the house. The other two Scotties were living in a field 20 miles away. Not wanting to traumatize Gwen any more, I elected to stay with her while Billy went to find the other two, since named Dorie and Bobby. They were a dreadful sight, dirty, skinny and scared. Bobby hit the floor in fear when approached. They had been living in this field for some time and were being fed popcorn. It was a heart-breaking sight to see these once beautiful Scots now with burnt matted hair and brought down this way. Billy and I were very angry people that day but there was no time to dwell on emotions as we had three Scotties in very bad condition to care for. They were all very frightened and all we could do was promise them a life of love and happiness that would come later. The following day they went to the veterinarian. Gwen was a very sick Scottie, suffering from malnutrition and an advanced pregnancy. Whelping the puppies would probably have been fatal so after she had been bathed and the mats clipped out of her coat, she was spayed and the puppies were aborted. Dorie was also pregnant, although not as advanced as Gwen. She had been

starved, abused, was dirty, matted and had hookworms. She also was cleaned up and then spayed. Bobby had evidence of abuse, was grossly underweight and had heartworms as well as intestinal parasites. On their return from the British Isles, Martha and Roxanne pitched right in – no time for jet lag. Roxanne fostered Dorie and Martha fostered Gwen. Bobby stayed with Billy and I until January 7, 2000 when he was declared healthy and was adopted. He was treated for the heartworms after gaining weight and strength and was then neutered. During the surgery, a lot of scar tissue was found in his stomach, which probably came from heavy blows. This may explain why he would hit the floor when approached and was terrified to come through an open door. Today Bobby has learned to trust and is a happy, healthy, proud Scottie who cowers no more. At four years of age, his bad days are behind him and his happy life has begun. He lives with a new Scottie sister and a family who loves him and thinks he is the smartest dog they have ever met.

THE COMO RESCUE

Maddie has CMO (craniomandibular osteopathy). She was born Dec. 22, 1998, in an USDA-licensed breeding facility. Her breeders are said to produce 50 or more breeds. With 60 to 70 others dogs, Maddie rode south to Alabama in early 1999, to be sold at a swap meet or flea market. Yorkshire Terrier/Pomeranian breeders there noticed Maddie's pain and asked about her. One of them had grown up with a Scottie. The seller said he'd decided to dispose of the puppy because of this jaw infirmity. The concerned breeders took the Scottie, named her Maggie, nursed her through CMO's painful phase, and then looked for a good home.

Enter the AOL Scottie Board. Maggie's need for a home was listed on AOL by Stacey, one of the Yorkie/Pom breeders. Thanks to Charla Hill who is active on AOL, Daphne Branzell got wind of Maggie's need and suggested Stacey con-

tact Dave and Mary Shipman in New Orleans. The Shipmans took over Maggie's case in October, and gave her a new name (Maddie) for her new life. Maddie was 10 months old, "weighs about 11 pounds," and said Dave, "there won't be much left after we clip her."

The Shipmans are two of the wonderful folks listed on the STCA's rescue network. Mary is an STCA member. The couple's Dawn Rescue, Inc., handled nine rescues in 1999: Scotties Clyde, Barclay, Stosh, Crawford and Maddie; a Scottie mix, Sarah; one Westie; and two rat terriers. They also do far-reaching rescue transport. On Christmas Eve, the Shipmans drove a Basset rescue from Birmingham to Dallas, returning to New Orleans with a Boxer rescue from Temple, TX. Maddie stayed with Dave and Mary almost three months while they looked for the right home.

The right new owners were to be Connie and Thom O'Brien, Pearland, TX. Theirs was one of the many applications Daphne and Marshall Branzell forwarded for consideration by the Shipmans. Connie, a groomer, owns Puppy Love Salon in Pearland. Dave and Mary drove Maddie to the O'Briens in Houston in early January. She fit in easily with the O'Brien's similarly small Scottie female Keegan, a Westie and a Yorkie/Poodle mix. "It is hard to imagine our Clan without her," wrote Connie two weeks after adopting Maddie. "It is incredible the bond I have formed

with her in such a short time. Maddie follows me everywhere and even goes to my Salon. She has become the official Puppy Love Salon mascot, and all my clients admire her. Maddie gives an unconditional special love, and I am so glad someone cared enough to save her and nurse her through her CMO." Connie reports that Maddie eats well, plays, has no pain anymore, and weighs about 16 pounds at 13 months old. The only side effect she might attribute to Maddie's CMO is increased salivation.

I became acquainted with Maddie's story because of the CMO angle. As STCA Health Trust Fund project chairman for CMO research, I tracked down an address for Maddie's breeders from the USDA list of Licensed Dealers. In early November I wrote to invite them to help with CMO research by sending DNA from Maddie's relatives. Sadly, almost three months later, they have not contacted me to ask how to obtain the free DNA sample kits. I had found four littermates of Maddie's mother in the AKC Stud Book; any or all of which could carry the CMO gene. The commercial breeders' help would be significant. CMO clearly is a problem for all kinds of Scottie breeders: commercial breeders, backyard breeders, just-one-litter pet breeders, and show breeders.

Thank you to the kind Yorkie and Pomeranian breeders, who salvaged Maddie from destruction, nursed her to health and put her with experienced Scottie Terrier rescue workers like the Shipmans. Thank you to intermediaries like Daphne Branzell and Charla Hill. Thank you also to the O'Briens for adopting Maddie and offering to send DNA for Maddie for the research underway to develop a DNA test for the CMO gene. Maddie will do her part for CMO research!

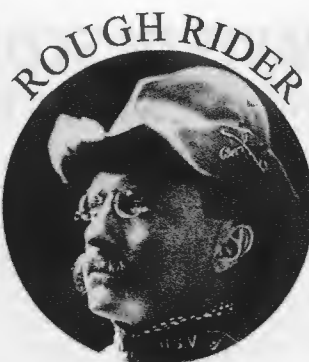

MYASTHENIA GRAVIS IN SCOTTISH TERRIERS

An Old Problem—A New Diagnosis

In October 1997, Mattie, an intact three-year-old Scottish Terrier bitch, began to vomit (or so her owner thought) a white foamy substance. After several trips to the vet Mattie was diagnosed with a throat infection. Antibiotics were administered for one week, then switched to a stronger form when symptoms persisted. By the third week Mattie had lost weight, became dehydrated, and could not keep down food or water. An emergency trip to the vet resulted in a diagnosis of megaesophagus. Her esophagus (the tube that carries food and water to the stomach) had deteriorated from a muscular structure to a flaccid bag. As a result of several weeks of regurgitation, she came down with aspiration pneumonia.

The distinction between vomiting and regurgitation is very important. This is one of the reasons why megaesophagus is often misdiagnosed. Regurgitation occurs almost spontaneously, the dog is usually unaware that it will happen. On the other hand, salivation, heaving, and nausea will precipitate vomiting. Owners often fail to relay the correct information to their vet and in turn, many vets do not question information given by the owner. An improper course of treatment is therefore initiated. At this point, Mattie was finally diagnosed with Myasthenia Gravis (MG). Her immune system had begun producing antibodies against a part of her nervous system called the neuromuscular junction - the place where the brain signals transmit information to muscles to cause contraction. Mattie was treated for the pneumonia and started on medication that helped the MG symptoms. She went into remission after two months, but has had two more serious bouts with this disease. Mattie has an angel on her shoulder, half of all dogs with MG that develop aspiration pneumonia will not survive even a single episode.

Why is it vets don't seem to recognize MG when they see "textbook" signs, much less "newer associated" symptoms such as Mattie's? In a recent inquiry I made to an Internet scottie list, misdiagnosis was commonly cited. Those responding reported 3-12 weeks between onset of illness and correct diagnosis (average time, 4.5). Six died from complications of aspiration pneumonia caused by probable MG.

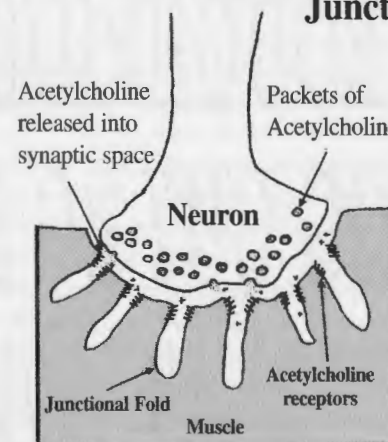
MG affects the striated muscle. In humans, this refers to skeletal and facial muscles. In dogs, the esophagus included as well. Many vets are trained to recognize "traditional" signs of MG, but rarely diagnose it. Why? I called all 58 clinics in my area; only the emergency clinic and two others (specialists) had ever diagnosed dogs with MG. The most likely reason is that "frustrating" cases are referred to the specialists, and undiagnosed MG cases often end up in the emergency clinic. The original referring vets then fail to learn of the final diagnosis because many times they lose the business of the owner after that point.

Pathophysiology of MG In order for the brain to signal muscle movement, the neuron closest to the muscle must release acetylcholine. Acetylcholine is the type of neurotransmitter molecule that muscles recognize as the signal to contract. Acetylcholine then binds to the muscle's receptors at the neuromuscular junction. More acetylcholine is released than necessary, especially since there is the acetylcholinesterase enzyme at the junction to break apart and recycle it. There are also more receptors than needed to produce an adequate response. The level of acetylcholine released or the number of receptors has to reach a fairly low level in order to affect the information transmission to the muscle (see Figure). Think of it as a car's oil level; it can drop significantly with no noticeable affects in performance. It is only when the oil-level warning light goes on that we might be aware of pending problems. At this point, it's likely that engine malfunction already has occurred. Note that the brain does not malfunction in this disorder, just the peripheral nervous system components.

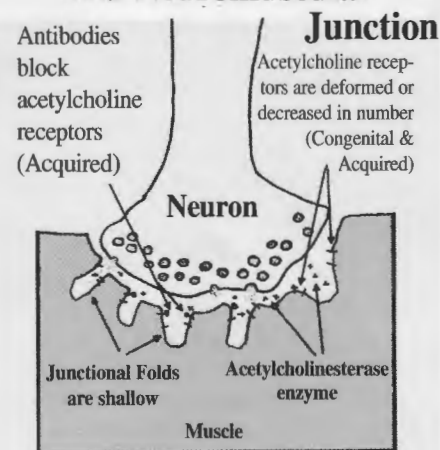
Types & Symptoms There are two types of MG - Congenital and Acquired. *Congenital* MG is usually present from birth, manifesting discernible symptoms between ages of six and nine weeks. The primary symptom is overall weakness, especially the inability to walk or run with increased exertion. Despite treatment, many progress to the point of generalized weakness, the inability to walk, and muscle wasting. Muscles around the eyes can also be affected (droopy or hard to close

completely). There is likely a strong heritable component as seen in cases with multiple littermates affected. Congenital MG has been found to be an autosomal recessive genetic disorder. The 1995 STCA Health Survey listed MG, with a prevalence of 0.06/100, and a "guesstimated" (by Dr. Padgett) gene frequency of 4.7%.

That is the same frequency CMO had at that time. Physiologically, two different causes have been found in congenital MG; 1) a very low level of acetylcholine is produced 2) the receptors produced are deformed and cannot effectively bind acetylcholine.

The more common form, *Acquired* MG, can show up at any time, but dogs are most often diagnosed between the ages of three and four years. The primary symptom is often megaesophagus, but others that are

common (and can be seen in congenital MG as well) are eyes that do not close when sleeping, watery eyes, absence of or higher pitched bark, increased fluid intake, coughing/gagging, regurgitation, and weight loss. Acquired MG is the result of immune system failure. The body, for as-yet-unknown reasons, forms antibodies against its own acetylcholine receptors that damages them directly, blocks them, or causes some of them to be absorbed. When MG is diagnosed and megaesophagus and/or facial symptoms occur in the absence of generalized weakness, it is called *Focal Acquired MG*. Several studies estimate a 26-38% incidence of MG in dogs demonstrating megaesophagus. Scottish Terriers have the third highest relative risk compared to 61 other breeds studied or mixed breeds. In addition, Scotties appear to demonstrate megaesophagus as a primary symptom of Acquired MG more often than many other breeds.

Diagnosis A simplified test for *Congenital MG* does not exist. However, short-acting drugs can be given that increase the amount of acetylcholine to stimulate the muscles; if improved muscle strength is seen, a preliminary diagnosis can be made and longer-acting drugs administered. Since dogs with *Acquired MG* produce antibodies against their own receptors, these can be detected through a blood sample 98% of the time. Dr. Diane Shelton developed this test, which is considered the gold-standard. Information concerning submission of samples, as well as email addresses where your vet can contact Dr. Shelton can be found at: http://medicine.ucsd.edu/vet_neuromuscular/. The canine reference level of antibodies above which a diagnosis of Acquired MG would be made is <0.6 nmol/l.

MG can be confused with poisoning (especially cholinesterase drugs — flea and tick chemicals, and botulism), irritation of the esophagus, throat/tonsil infections, allergies, and tick-borne diseases. Other disorders that often occur along with

MG include hypothyroidism, thymoma (tumor of the thymus gland, a part of the immune system), thymic cysts, and various types of carcinomas, sarcomas, and other autoimmune diseases.

Treatment If megaesophagus is present, food and water should be elevated. Since in the acute phase of an MG attack, many dogs have extreme difficulty drinking water, and most owners soak kibble in large amounts of water to supply the daily requirement. Aspiration pneumonia caused by megaesophagus is treated aggressively with antibiotics. Anti-acetylcholinesterase (inhibitor) drugs are the cornerstone of MG therapy. Pyridostigmine bromide (Mestinon, 0.5-3.0 mg/kg BID-TID adjusted as needed) is recommended, although repeated use over extended time frames has resulted in resistance to the drug. Mestinon is available in syrup, tablet, and timespan forms. If the syrup is used, it should be diluted 1:1 in water as it can cause gastric irritation and vomiting if given straight. In dogs with milder forms of MG, this may be all the therapy required.

Mestinon works by two proposed mechanisms. It helps to increase levels of acetylcholine at the neuromuscular junction by slowing the normal rapid breakdown of acetylcholine. Additionally, it may help to speed up the production of new receptors on the muscle surface. Mestinon is used as a nerve gas prophylaxis pretreatment in military troops in war, so there is ample research as to its safety. Mestinon does not readily pass the blood-brain barrier, unlike other drugs used for this disease, decreasing the changes of side effects. It should be noted that underdosing and overdosing have very similar effects — muscle weakness, gastrointestinal upset. If muscle strength or esophageal motility has not significantly improved with anti-acetylcholinesterase therapy alone, addition of low-dose daily (0.5 mg/kg/day) or alternate-day corticosteroid therapy has shown to be beneficial. Immunosuppressive dosages of corticosteroids can exacerbate

symptoms early in treatment and worsen the clinical signs therefore avoidance of high dosages is encouraged. Dr. Shelton found most dogs that are diagnosed early and are treated aggressively will eventually go into remission. The average time from beginning of treatment remission is 6-8 months with some dogs going into remission faster and others taking over one year.

Monitoring Radiographic evaluation of esophageal dilatation and serial acetylcholine antibody titers should be done every three months in order to monitor the course of MG. The acetylcholine antibody titer will go down into the normal range as the dog goes into clinical remission, and in many cases, the megaesophagus will drastically improve. It is important not to take the animal off medication too soon as clinical signs will return. If the acetylcholine antibody titer remains elevated for over a year, then a search for neoplasm (cancer) should be initiated. A screen for any concurrent medical problems such as hypothyroidism should also be initiated and treated if identified.

Safety—Pregnancy and Breeding There is little evidence on the safety of Mestinon or other acetylcholinesterase treatments in dogs during pregnancy. However, in humans, there is no evidence of risk in the developing baby in the first six months (2/3) of pregnancy. Treatment near the time of delivery can lead to temporary muscle weakness in the baby. Discuss this with your vet. This drug may also interact with some anaesthetic agents. Since *Congenital MG* is a recessive inheritable disorder, all dogs with this diagnosis should never be bred. Human studies show *Acquired MG* as an inherited genetic defect; a recent study by Dr. Shelton reported that Newfoundland dogs demonstrate this tendency as well. This is a life-threatening disorder; until there is a definitive study *disproving* a link between *Acquired MG* and heritability, all affected dogs should be removed from the breeding program.

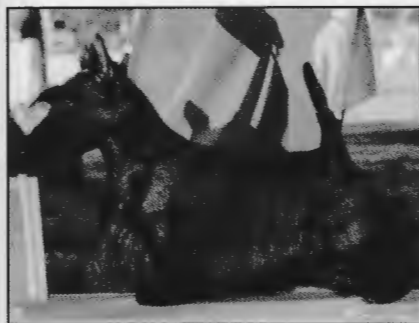
