This must have been written about our Maverick, as we believe that he is truly a Scottish Terrier exemplifying many of the best aspects of the breed. From his first venture into the show ring at the Great Western Terrier Association's 6-9 month puppy class, where he went on to win Winners Dog to his Best of Breed at the National Specialty in October 2002, this handsome young dog has proven he's his own man. Health Trust Fund News

Sunshine, sunburn, and beautiful Scotties on parade. Such was another memorable Montgomery County weekend in Pennsylvania! The STCA Health Trustees met on Saturday October 5 to review the reports of ongoing research projects, to finalize funding of the newest studies sponsored by your HTF dollars, and to hold elections for officers.

CURRENT STUDIES

1. **The Antonella Visconti di Madrone Scottie Cramp Study** at Michigan State is now in its third year. Dr. Venta reports that he has been working on a separate canine whole genome marker map under separate funding. This project will benefit both his Cramp and CMO projects. He will be testing the candidate genes for SC within the coming year.
2. **CMO Project.** Now in its fourth year. New scientific evidence has led Dr Venta to focus additional effort on the areas of the genome that are linked to Paget's Disease of bone in humans. The new marker map will enhance his search for the CMO gene and ultimately design a DNA carrier test.
3. **The Purdue Bladder Cancer Study.** The researchers report that they have received a very good response rate on the questionnaires returned to them with 79 Cases and 82 Controls already processed. Dr. Glickman and Dr. Knapp will continue to accept new Cases and Controls until December 31, at which time the study will be closed. Results will be forthcoming in 2003 in the form of a published paper, a written report to the STCA, and a presentation next fall. The STCA Board has approved disbursement of the second half of the Purdue TCC Study in the amount of \$15,000 to be sent to the AKC CHF.
4. **Atopic Dermatitis Study** at North Carolina State. This new project began in March of 2002, with approval by the CHF at \$89,500 over a 2 year period, contingent on the support of several breed clubs, including but not limited to Bichon Frise, Boston Terriers, Bull Terriers, Cairn Terriers, Dalmatian, Vizsla, Welsh and Westie. The HTF con-



tributed \$1600 with Board approval from the AKC CHF Donor Advised Fund to support this important research. In the 1995 STCA Health Survey, Atopic Dermatitis (AD) was given a "guesstimated" carrier frequency of 35.8%, the highest ranking of any of the genetic disorders reported. This study will look closely at what actually happens at the molecular level with respect to two kinds of cells (the basophil and the mast cell) which are major players in most itchy, allergic skin conditions. Dr. Hammerberg has been researching allergic dermatitis for a long time, and in this study, he will focus on the genetics of atopic dermatitis in susceptible breeds of dogs with the ultimate goals as follows:

"If successful, this study will ultimately provide a useful diagnostic tool for predicting risk of allergic disease manifestation in later life. This tool will be extremely valuable to breeders in making decision about matching breeding pairs where the desire is to minimize allergic disease problems. The proposed project will in the short-term potentially make it possible to identify very young puppies having a high risk of developing atopic dermatitis later in life. This predictive assay for atopic dermatitis will assist responsible breeders in minimizing the incidence of allergic skin disease in their breed." Dr Bruce Hammerberg

5. **Cerebellar Abiotrophy Study.** Dr. Jerold Bell reports that 20 CA affected Scotties have been identified. They are from 6 different ancestral lines so far, and Dr Bell believes the defective gene for this disorder is a very ancient one. He is waiting for further diagnostic evaluations on 12 more dogs with ataxic symptoms from owners who have contacted him. Dr Bell has been granted HTF funding of \$500 for a second year of CA research (September 2002- August 2003). The work that Dr Bell is doing for the breed and for the owners of ataxic dogs is truly invaluable and all Scottie owners and breeders are

NEW STUDIES

1. The HTF voted to support two new projects with the Morris Animal Foundation. The Trust is convinced of the integrity and quality of the Foundation and the studies which are accepted by them. Like the AKC CHF, the Morris Foundation carefully scrutinizes the proposals sent to them and agrees to fund only those studies which pass the MAF Scientific Advisory Board. The HTF received Board approval to co-sponsor at the \$2500 level for each of the two studies listed below:

A. "Autologous Tumor Cell Vaccination for the Treatment of Canine Lymphoma"
MAF Study DOOCA-25. Principal Investigator- David Vail, DVM, MS, DACVIM, Associate Professor of Oncology at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, WI.
Despite aggressive chemotherapy, most dogs with lymphoma will die of their disease. Lymphoma is one of the most common cancers in our Scotties. A new treatment involves the injection of the patient's own tumor cells in the form of a "vaccine" to induce a potent anticancer immune response. Vaccines containing natural immunostimulants improve this response, yielding exciting results in both humans and animals and prolonging survival time. Dr Vail is in his third year of this \$184,400 study.

B "Control of COX-2 gene Expression in Canine Squamous Cell Carcinoma"
MAF Study DOOCA-47. Principal Investigator- Dr. Monique Dore and Dr. Jean Sirois, University of Montreal, Quebec, Canada.
Squamous cell carcinoma is a very common cancer in dogs, and there are many instances of oral and digital tumors in Scotties. Very little is known about the development of this cancer. The main objective in Dr. Dore's study is to elucidate the regulation of the enzyme cyclooxygenase-2 in squamous cell carcinoma to help design new strategies for cancer therapy and prevention in dogs. Dr Dore is in her third year of this \$143,300 study. The COX-2 inhibitor Piroxicam is a drug that is routinely used in cases of bladder cancer in Scotties, and it is possible that Dr Dore's work will reveal that drugs like piroxicam may be effective in Squamous Cell Carcinomas as well.

In addition to the above new studies, the HTF is currently investigating a process by which DNA samples can be collected and stored for future studies on genetic disorders such as Liver Shunt and Cerebellar Abiotrophy. The HTF strongly believes that if these samples are not collected and processed soon, we will lose due to attrition invaluable scientific material for future studies.

These studies may one day provide a great service for all Scottie breeders. The HTF is negotiating with Dr Venta at Michigan State on how we can provide this DNA collection and storage in complete confidentiality to Scottie owners/breeders, how to maintain HTF ownership of the material, and how to keep full rights of transfer directly from Michigan State to any researcher at an appropriate time.

Hot Spots can be treated by applying Listerine to the affected area three or four times a day for two or three days. Dogs dislike the taste, and will generally leave the area alone. Listerine is mildly analgesic, and also antiseptic. You may wish to run this by your veterinarian, mine saw no problem.

Flannel backed vinyl tablecloths work very well under crates and rompers in a hotel room. The backing keeps them from slipping, and they can be laundered and reused.

Dilute shampoo in a clear "catsup" dispenser type bottle is easy to apply where you need it, and doesn't spill quite as easily when the dog knocks it in the sink!

Cocoa mulch is an attractive product to use in flower beds. TOO attractive. It contains "theobromine" which is lethal to cats and dogs.

A can of chicken or beef broth mixed with a can of water and frozen in ice cube trays is a good hot summer treat. Or just push the crushed ice dispenser lever on the fridge and stand back!!!

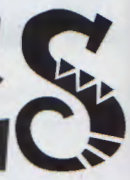
Freezing water in your dogs crate bowls, then adding a little water in the morning will help with two things while on the road. Cooler water longer, and less wet crate bedding.

White vinegar will clean and deodorize almost anything safely. It's your best friend when housetraining. It's good even in the rug shampooer, and doesn't leave that 30" layer of vapor that isn't good for animals or children. Absolutely child and animal safe, cheap too!

Did you know that you can remove bloodstains from fabric, carpet, whatever with peroxide. The stain is simply gone. It will even work fairly well on older dried stains.

LIVING

with an aging Scottish Terrier

Current statistics predict the average lifespan of an American male to be 77 years and the lifespan for an American woman to be 82. Obviously, even a long-lived Scottish Terrier will not live long enough to fulfill our human need for companionship. Therefore, we tend to be distressed if we observe signs of the aging process in our dogs.

The truth is the Scottish Terrier is a moderate purebred dog in many ways. I realize that most Scotties and their owners would not like to be described as moderate. Personality wise, our breed is much stronger than moderate. With an average lifespan of 11 years and 2 months (this number comes from the STCA health survey of 1995), an AKC ranking of 43 out of 150 breeds (based on registration figures of 3958 Scotties in the year 2001) and a health survey that shows that although the Scottish Terrier does have thirty-six genetic defects, it does NOT have the overwhelming health problems of some purebred dogs. The Scottish Terrier is indeed a moderate purebred breed.

As a breed with a moderate number of genetic defects and illnesses, breeders should work to manage and prevent as many health problems as possible. However, there is a limit to how much we can extend the lifespan of the Scottish Terrier. It is unlikely that we will ever see 15 years or even 15 years as the median age of survival.

The most practical approach to Scottie health addresses quality of life issues and maintenance of health in our middle aged and aging dogs. Below is a list of topics for the owners of middle and old age Scottish Terriers to consider.

Laboratory Screening: A Scottie over six years of age is entering into his/her middle age. This is a good time for increased vigilance by owners. A

complete checkup is the best way to start.

My personal veterinarian recommends a complete blood chemistry, thyroid status and urinalysis on my Scotties at approximately two years old. This is a base line measurement of health. At six years of age we start yearly blood work to observe changes.

Often changes in thyroid function, liver values and kidney function will indicate that a Scottie needs further medical evaluation. Early intervention can keep the Scottie from progressing to the crisis stage of an illness.

If a dog is experiencing the unpleasant affects of lethargy, skin problems, allergy symptoms, ear problems and weight gain, don't assume your Scottie is just getting old. Low thyroid may be the problem.

Liver and kidney disease may be helped by a change in diet and medication. Be proactive. Help your dog. Blood work also helps to disclose the presence of diabetes and Cushing's syndrome. These routine tests are valuable tools that we, owners and breeders, should utilize.

Dental Care: This one area of maintenance impacts the quality of life of your dog. Fractured or diseased teeth prevent a dog from eating properly. The change in eating habits can affect the strength and vigor of your dog. More importantly, periodontal disease affects more than the teeth and mouth of a dog. The Academy of Veterinary Dentistry reports that more than eighty percent of dogs over the age of three have periodontal disease. The cause of periodontal disease is not only the visible plaque. It is also the bacteria that invade the gum and bone tissue. Although linked but not proven, it is reported that severe infections related to the heart and liver are the result of untreated periodontal disease. Brush your Scottie's teeth. Easier said than done-maybe. Here are a few tips:

Use only toothpaste made for dogs. Your Scottie will probably love the meat

flavor. Place your dog on a grooming table to work on him. If the dog tends to dislike the process, prop his/her mouth open with a rubber or hard nylabone. Use a finger toothbrush if your dog will allow it. The finger brush allows you to reach the back of the mouth with less effort and discomfort for the dog. It is recommended to brush daily, but brushing a few times weekly definitely helps. If you can use a scraper or tartar-removing tool on your dog, please do. Not every Scottie will cooperate and not every owner feels comfortable removing tartar. Do not use the scraper if it results in the cutting of gums and bleeding. Start with short sessions. Reward the dog for good behavior. Most important, realize that starting this process with a puppy will yield the best result.

Yearly checkups and professional cleaning are necessary. Some repair of teeth, removal of teeth and antibiotic treatment of infections can and should be done by your personal veterinarian. A Diplomate of the American Veterinary Dental College should be sought for specialized procedures like root canal work or gingivectomy.

If this standard of dental care is adopted and your dog still has a foul mouth odor, further investigation is needed. Dogs with serious kidney disease may have a foul mouth odor. Some cancers produce a mouth odor. Blood work recommended earlier in this article can be used to help determine other underlying causes of mouth odor.

Weight Control: An increase in a Scottie's weight during middle age can cause the same problems we see in humans: exercise intolerance, joint problems and lack of flexibility.

The results of a 14-year study using Labrador Retrievers conducted by Dennis Lawler, DVM and Richard Kealy, PhD called the Purina Lifespan study showed that dogs who ate 25 percent fewer calo-

ries than their littermates during their lifetime maintained a lean or ideal body mass resulting in a longer life. On average the lean dogs lived 15 percent longer. That amounted to nearly a two-year increase in lifespan when compared to the dogs fed more food.

Furthermore, dogs served full food portions showed visible signs of aging, including graying muzzles, impaired gaits and reduced activity earlier in life than lean dogs.

Scotties and Labrador Retrievers are not identical, but this study does have some correlation. Labradors were specifically chosen for the study because they are a medium lived breed with a tendency to put on weight in middle and senior years. Labradors typically live between 12 to 14 years. Those characteristics are similar to traits of the Scottish Terrier.

Weight loss can also be a health issue. If your Scottie begins to lose weight without a significant change in lifestyle, a veterinarian should evaluate your Scottie's health. Some cancers and disease have unexplained weight loss as a symptom.

Exercise and Interaction with people: As some dogs age, owners may notice a tendency to exercise less, a tendency to withdraw from daily activities and from family interaction. It is important to address these issues **early** before the behaviors become firmly ingrained in the dog's routine. Most of us also slow down as we age, but there is a difference between slowing down and withdrawing from interaction.

In the middle and senior years maintaining your bond with and interacting with your Scottie becomes an even more important component of the dog's well being. Personalized care helps keep the dog in the here and now. Daily exercise and a play period are excellent activities to promote a continuing quality relationship.

Remember an older Scottie with arthritis or extra weight probably won't find a two-mile walk enjoyable if he/she isn't accustomed to exercise. Start slowly. Don't overdue the exercise and provide plenty of water for the dog.

Those of you who own one or two Scotties probably think that this advice is not particularly profound. Of course, all owners should be constantly paying attention to their dogs. However, some

owners have multi dog households and/or demanding schedules. These owners care as much about the well being of their older Scotties. However, a litter of puppies or a critically ill dog can temporarily distract them from individual attention for each Scottie.

Try keeping records on each dog you own, a personal diary of your care and interaction with each Scottie. The diary or journal will help you remember which dog had a problem or illness a few months ago. I kept this type of journal for my three human children and find the technique useful for my Scotties. Life is hectic. Having a written record can help keep events in perspective.

Loss of Sight and Hearing: The STCA health survey indicates that PRA is known to occur in Scotties. Cataracts and Glaucoma also occur in the breed. But your Scottie is more likely to be affected by slowly diminishing eyesight and less clarity of eyesight. When your dog sits on the deck and a squirrel runs across the back of your property, the Scottie should react. If the Scottie remains unaware of this invasion of his/her territory, poor eyesight is the probable cause of the lack of response to the squirrel. Changes in vision seem to occur slowly. How should you respond?

Try to maintain the same routine of activities and exercise. Make sure the food and water bowls remain in the same place. Start teaching your dog new skills. Sit and Stop are the most important commands your Scottie can learn. Sit will keep your dog safe until you reach his/her side. Stop will prevent him/her from falling down a flight of stairs. If your house has flights of stairs, practice going up and down the stairs using the dog's name and the word stairs over and over. Use baby gates for areas of the house that may be unsafe for the dog. Work on recall with your dog. I know that coming on command is not always a Scottie's strong point, but a dog with diminished senses relies on you to keep him/her out of harm's way. Work with your dog. Practice having a person approach your dog. Have the individual speak softly and approach the dog without touching him/her. They should continue to speak to the dog. The voice sounds allow the dog to know where the person is located. Over a period of time your Scottie will become acclimated to the

concept of greeting a person that he/she cannot see clearly.

Start all of these techniques with your dog when the first signs of eyesight failure are observed. That way you and the dog will be prepared if the dog progresses to complete blindness.

Hearing loss can be problematic in an older dog. Many reports of older dogs biting can be directly attributed to people approaching a resting dog. The dog doesn't hear the person. The dog becomes startled and snaps at the person approaching.

Never approach a dog with diminished hearing without announcing yourself. If the dog is profoundly deaf, stamp your feet on the floor lightly before approaching the dog. The dog will respond to the vibration. Give him or her time to recognize you. If the dog's eyesight is good, hand signals will help you communicate. There are many excellent training books that explain how to use hand signals for deaf dogs. However, older dogs may have sight deficits. Try the stamping technique or using a loud bell or whistle to attract the dog's attention. At night use a light to attract the dog. A flashlight beam can guide your dog in from the yard at night. Practice in a darkened room with plenty of treats. Soon your Scottie will respond to being called by light at night. It takes time to establish the new response from the hearing impaired dog. The effort is certainly worthwhile if it enables you to maintain a positive relationship with your Scottie.

Arthritis: Many older dogs develop arthritis. There are many treatments that can relieve the suffering of these dogs.

Egg crate beds or thickly padded beds provide support necessary for comfortable rest. Don't let your dog sleep on a cold hard floor. Provide your Scottie with a comfortable resting place on the floor. Aging Scotties have a hard time climbing up on the couch and a cozy spot on the floor can ease this change of routine.

Nutraceuticals like glucosamine and chondroitin help to lubricate joints by providing the necessary building blocks needed to restore joints. Nutraceuticals are food additives and not actually drugs. Another food supplement is S-Adenosylmethioine known as SAM-e. also promises relief for arthritis.

NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs) provide excellent pain

Unfortunately, like humans, long-term use of NSAIDs by a dog can cause bleeding in the stomach. Monitor your dog carefully. Check for any signs of bleeding on a regular basis.

Acupuncture is an alternative treatment that can be beneficial to certain dogs. Acupuncture is a non-invasive treatment. It should produce no unpleasant lasting side effects. In other words it can't hurt your Scottie and it may help her by relieving pain. If it is available in your area, inquire whether your Scottie is a candidate for this treatment.

Weight management and mild exercise are important components of a treatment regime for arthritis. Work to keep your Scottie as close to ideal body size as possible. Encourage exercise, but gage the stiffness and lameness of your dog on a day-to-day basis.

A few words of caution concerning Scottie liver function should be noted. Steroid use (prednisone) for arthritis should be reserved for severe conditions when all other alternatives have been exhausted. Steroids are known to adversely affect the liver. Rimadyl, an NSAID was widely advertised when it first came on the market. It has since been linked to a small but significant number of cases of severe liver damage. If your veterinarian suggests the use of steroids or Rimadyl to treat your Scottie's arthritis, have a discussion with him concerning the benefits versus the possible side effects. Actually discussions about benefit versus side effects are worthwhile no matter what treatment is recommended for your Scottie.

Herbal Supplements: Today many holistic remedies are reported to be beneficial to your dog's health. I am not a veterinarian and know that many claims of benefit are anecdotal and not scientifically tested. I will offer you this line of thought. Three years ago one of my Scotties had very high Alkaline Phosphate liver values. Some knowledgeable Scottie and Westie breeders suggested to me that milk thistle could be helpful to my dog. They recommended a dose of 200 mg a day. Quite frankly, I was afraid to give my beloved Lucy a substance and dosage that might not be safe. I approached my veterinarian about milk thistle. She knew very little at the time about its efficacy and sent me to an associate who specialized in alternative

medicine. His pronouncement was "that dosage can't hurt your girl, but I doubt it will help." Her ALKP numbers were 1900 at the time. Three months later they were 1800. Both doctors felt the treatment wasn't beneficial. Six months after starting treatment Lucy's numbers dropped to 1150. Today Lucy's readings are 700 and she still takes milk thistle daily. Did the milk thistle help my Lucy? I don't know, **but I was assured that the dosage level of milk thistle couldn't harm her.**

Lucy is now a healthy 10-year-old Scottie. Currently many veterinarians, including my own, recommend milk thistle for liver related illnesses. The moral here is: do no harm. Consult your own veterinarian and ask for weight appropriate dosages of drugs and herbs. Investigate alternatives but always work with a veterinarian.

Cancer: Nearly half of the dogs that live longer than 10 years will be diagnosed with cancer. Please take note of the cancer warning signs:

- Abnormal swelling that persists or continues to grow.
- Sores that do not heal.
- Weight loss.
- Loss of appetite.
- Bleeding or discharge from any body opening.
- Offensive odor, especially from the mouth. Difficulty swallowing or eating.
- Reluctance to exercise.
- Persistent lameness.
- Difficulty breathing, urinating or defecating.

This list of symptoms comes from the Veterinary Cancer Society.

Lymphoma and bladder cancer are two common cancers that Scottish Terriers develop. The Cornell Veterinary Newsletter suggests that owners check breeds prone to Lymphoma for swollen lymph nodes on a regular basis.

Cornell also recommends urine diagnostic tests and ultrasound for dogs at risk for bladder cancer. Several studies have shown that females are three times as likely as males to develop bladder cancer. Fat storage may be one of the issues involved in the disease. Female dogs have more body fat than male dogs. Carcinogens are stored and concentrated in body fat. This concern repeats the importance of weight management for

the older Scottie.

Canine Cognitive Dysfunction: This topic is listed last because it is easy to confuse with other health conditions. Deaf dogs may appear senile. Dogs with metabolic changes may appear to be unresponsive to their environment. Many diseases have symptoms similar to senility. Cognitive dysfunction is a diagnosis of exclusion. If blood chemistries and urinalysis results are normal, tests for Cushings and diabetes are negative, no unusual loss of hearing or eyesight is detected and cancer cannot be found, your symptomatic Scottish Terrier could have CCD. The criteria for CCD are dogs over seven years old with some of the following symptoms:

- Loss of house training,
- Sleeping more during the day,
- Sleeping less at night.
- Altered appetite and or thirst.
- Withdrawing from human contact.
- Staring at walls or into space.
- Wandering aimlessly.
- Trembling.
- Ignoring commands.
- Getting lost in familiar places.
- Not recognizing his/her name.
- Not recognizing family members.

Treatment that may be helpful includes Anipryl. Anipryl is a drug that normalizes dopamine levels by blocking an enzyme called monamine oxidase. Dopamine can improve brain function and help decrease degenerative changes in the brain. Seventy-five percent of CCD cases treated with Anipryl will have some improvement. The amount of improvement varies and Anipryl cannot be used in conjunction with some other drugs.

Antioxidants, fatty acids, vitamins E and C, vegetables and fruits found in a Hill's senior diet called bd have resulted in improved cognitive performance in some senior dogs fed this prescription diet. Again these are issues to discuss with your veterinarian.

This article has been a factual discussion of topics that may help owners and breeders manage the aging process of their Scottish Terriers. But at the end of the day everything centers around the one on one bond between human and dog. Your beloved Scottie could never live long enough. Do your best and above all value each day of companionship you have with your Scottish Terrier.

Mentoring...

If you were mentored, so should you mentor.

Mentoring... when I first think of the word, I think of *my* Mentors. Martha Merrill (Merrilland Kennels), Lena Kardos (Sodark), Bergit Coady Kabel, Pat & Tony Gruda (Mystigael, FROM whom I purchased my beloved Foundation Bitch, CH Jacglen's Lindsay O'Mystigael), Cindy Cooke and Miriam Stamm (Anstamm) and the many friends and breeders who have shared information with me over the years. Each learning experience, no matter how large or small, was equally important to help get me to where I am today. I still have much to learn, but I do my best to help anyone requesting help from me.

It is surprising to me that there are a few people who consider *me* their Mentor now. In talking to them, and others, one ponders the meaning of the word "Mentor".

A Mentor, according to "Webster": *n. wise and trusted adviser. [G. Mentor, counselor of of the son of Ulysses]*

Of course, in our case a Mentor is a wise and trusted adviser, sharing their knowledge of the Scottish Terrier and all that is involved therein. A true, unselfish Mentor realizes that this is critical to the survival of the breed, as we know it.

My Mentors gave freely of their time when I had questions regarding Scotties; showing, grooming, breeding, what to wear in the show ring, etc. Mentoring is sharing one's knowledge of a subject, and while you may not "know it all" you need to be willing to share your time and what you've learned with others who are newer to the subject- in our case, The Scottish Terrier.

This can range from their ques-

tions about how their Scottie is behaving (especially if they have not had a Scottie before) to grooming and showing their own dog.

To my way of thinking, the more experienced need to help the less experienced in any way their time allows, after all, what good is all we've been taught if we don't share it with others of the same interest? If we keep the information "inside" of

us, what favours are we doing to our Scotties? What compliments are we paying (or not) to those who taught us?

In Mentoring there are two egos involved here. That of the more experienced "Mentor" and the less experienced "Student". In many ways, the relationship between the mentor and "learner" is that of a teacher and student. The "Student" needs to remember that they do not know it all (even when they have learned a lot). In addition, when one chooses a person they wish to have

as a Mentor, they need to remember that that person, while they may not know it all themselves, is willing to teach the Student what they do know. The student needs to be appreciative and respectful of this information and the time the Mentor is willing to give to the Student. Be appreciative of one another, you each have something of value to offer. In the best of all worlds you will become, and stay **friends**.

A Mentor must, in my opinion, be honest with the Student, remembering that they were once the student themselves. The Mentor should be gentle in how they tell the Student what to do, or in correcting what the Student is doing (or not doing). How one tells the Student something could make a huge difference in whether they stay with it or give up and get no further involved with "the breed". We need to get more "caretakers of the breed" interested and involved or the future of our breed (anyone's breed) could be quite dim.

If the Student is not already involved with a local Scottish Terrier Club, and hopefully also an all breed club, the

mentor should suggest they get involved with the regional club, or the national club if a regional club is not available in one's area. If the Mentor feels the student is serious they should be very willing to sponsor the student to that Club(s).

Along with club information, the Mentor should be able to give other resources, such as books available, to the Student so they can read up on anything they can about the breed. The Student needs to read up on the history, health issues, and fun things they can get involved with (i.e.,

Mentors should also be happy to introduce the Student to other people, help give the Student advice on how to dress for the show ring, protocol, ring manners (and how all the classes go), give computer sites of the breed and the AKC (namely www.akc.org).

Being in dogs means all aspects of dogs. Talk to and teach the new people in your breed, share your knowledge. Remember that you, the Mentor, was once the Student also, you owe it to your Mentors to mentor. And if you are a breeder, you are automatically a mentor to your puppy buyers - even if they are only there for questions and advice on the new family's new puppy.

The hardest part of being a Mentor may well be knowing when to "let go". Letting go is a critical part of the process. The day will come when the Student/Friend wishes to breed away from your- in your own eyes-, perfect stud dog. The student may consciously decide to change their grooming "style" from what you have tried to help them learn. These things have to be viewed as natural process of leaving the nest, and if handled properly, your relationship will remain strong and there will be a mutual respect. The best of Mentors will keep the door open, and in the process may actually learn something themselves!!!

We never know everything, we're always learning - so share the knowledge-and realize that knowledge can flow both directions.

We owe it to our breed. Mentor.

MISSOURI RESCUE

In June 2002, Patti Fernandez, Scottie Rescue coordinator in St. Louis, MO, received the call she was dreading. A multi-breed kennel in a neighboring county was releasing a number of dogs to the county animal welfare department after being ordered to reduce their stock from 90 to 50 animals. Most of these dogs would be Scottish Terriers and Cocker Spaniels and Patti was asked to take the 15 Scotties. Like most of our individual rescuers around the country, Patti could not manage a rescue this large and turned to us. We agreed that this was a job for national rescue and assured her that she would have our full support. As a member of Purebred Rescue of St. Louis, Patti was able to call upon other breed rescue personnel to help with

this endeavor and transportation and vets were lined up. We put out the word to the Rescue List and asked that anyone within driving distance take a few of these dogs. There was an immediate response and more than enough places were found for them. Tony and Pat Gruda, Rocky Mountain STC Rescue, had already agreed to take two male Scotties we were boarding in Kansas City after being contacted by a shelter in Columbia, MO, and they also agreed to take two female Scotties from this mill group. Chris Sims, Arkansas Scottie Rescue, and Sue Severtsen, STC of Chicago Rescue, agreed to take some. Dave Shipman, Louisiana Scottie Rescue, would transport the remainder to Texas when he was traveling in that direction the following week. Everything was in place and a convoy of crate-equipped vans traveled to the next county and picked up 16 Scotties from the animal welfare officer - one more than planned. One female was immediately euthanized because of severe health problems; one 10-year-old male was euthanized

because of extreme aggression and one female was adopted by a vet tech in St. Louis who was familiar with these dogs. Two females were transported to Kansas City to await their ride to Colorado; Chris Sims picked up three and took them to Arkansas; five were transported to Illinois and the other three were picked up by Dave Shipman the following week and taken to Dallas. The two females stayed with Margy Tucker, GDSTC Rescue, and Sterling, the dog-aggressive male, came to Camp Branzell. After the five arrived in Illinois, it was discovered there was no room for them so another call went out and Dawn Roffey and Regina Hess, STC Michigan Rescue, agreed to take them. By the Fourth of July, the dogs were scattered over several states and were being altered and vetted.

All of these dogs had health problems and some had temperament problems. This is to be expected when they came from the kind of environment they had lived in. All the males and some of the females were

...sely dog aggressive after a lifetime of "survival of the fittest". Some were deemed unadoptable and were euthanized. One female had a huge bulge on her belly, which was thought to be a mammary tumor but was found to be a hernia that would have killed her had her pregnancy progressed. She was spayed and her hernia repaired successfully. Most of the incoming dogs have been placed in homes and are doing well. Some have been returned for various reasons and are awaiting rehoming. Our own experience with Sterling was probably typical. We had him

for six weeks trying to find the right home, as he could not live peaceably with other animals. In spite of all our efforts and that of a foster with obedience experience, we were unable to change his mind about other dogs. He loves women and enjoys a snuggle given the opportunity. He loves riding in the car, walking on a leash and tolerates any kind of grooming or treatment with ease. Men are not his favorite people; he isn't aggressive towards them but he doesn't trust them and in spite of Marshall's efforts, he never really made friends with Sterling. The right home eventually came along for Sterling and he is living with a single woman who has no small children or other pets. He is the center of attention and is well loved.

This was quite an experience - to say the least. Would we do it again? Of course. Rescue is about all the homeless dogs, the good, the bad and the ugly. It is not just about the well-adjusted housedog that needs a new home because his owner died. It is for all the unfortunate dogs that, for no fault of their own, find themselves in harm's way. We all learned a lot from this rescue situation and now know that the dogs that come out of kennel situations need a lot more work than the average rescue that we find in shelters etc. One of the ironies about these dogs was that so many of them seemed to "know" about a normal life. They walked on a leash, they rode in the car and as soon as they went to their new homes, they found the bed and decided that was where they were going to sleep. We know that with 90 dogs in their kennel, the owners of these dogs did not socialize them. It is sad when dogs are born and spend their entire lives in kennels, but it is

really heartbreaking to think that dogs may have lived as house pets and then ended up in one of these places. We wish to thank all the people who have donated to the STCA Rescue Fund for without the funds we could not have undertaken this rescue.

This will be our last rescue article for the Bagpiper as we retire from the position of STCA Rescue Coordinators this year. We wish whoever follows us well and leave you with a wonderful group of dedicated rescue coordinators around the country who put their heart and soul (and their money) into a task that is sometimes thankless but is nevertheless necessary. We have enjoyed working with such wonderful people and will be forever grateful for all their hard work and support.

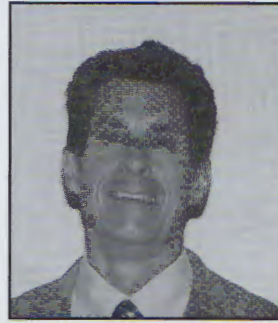

REMARKS FROM NATIONAL SPECIALTY 2002 SWEEPSTAKES JUDGE, JOANNE KINNELLY

I'll never forget seeing so many lovely puppies. One of my friends told me not to just say thank you for the opportunity. She said she's always curious why judges make the decisions they do. So, for my fellow fanciers who did not have the privilege of getting their hands on the puppies, this is what I tried to do.

First, I tried to find puppies with correct proportions, substance, and deep bodies that could move well enough to do their jobs, allowing for the fact that many were still growing.

Then, I looked for the best expression. In a couple of placements, I rewarded exceptional expression over the type I thought most correct. The right balance of skull to muzzle, shape and set of eye, shape and size of ear and length and cleanness of the head are also signs that the Scot can do its job.

The 6 to 9 Division was won by a beautiful puppy bitch. I can't wait to see her grow up. Second was also a bitch with a very pretty head, showing beautifully and in great condition. Third was an outgoing, sound wheaten dog with a beautiful head and ears. Fourth was a beautiful black dog who moved well and had a stunning outline.

The 9 to 12 Division (and Best in Sweepstakes) was won by a compact showy dog in wonderful condition with good expression, just about perfect ears, a deep body, powerful neck and forechest and nice short hocks. A close second in the Division was a sound, beautiful bitch whose proportions I liked very much. She was just slightly less mature in body, muscle and condition. Third was a brindle dog with a striking head, good body and lots of confidence. Fourth place was a lovely bitch, but still more of a baby than the others. The 9-12 Dog class was remarkable in that almost every dog had outstanding characteristics to contribute to the breed.

The 12 to 18 Division first and second place were the bitches. The first three placements in the 12 to 18 month bitch class were all close in quality and difficult to decide between. The third place dog was very sound and enthusiastic, just slightly behind the girls in condition. The fourth place wheaten dog was very striking and sound but bigger than I thought correct.

There were a lot more good dogs than placements. It was pretty easy to find correct proportions, substance and deep bodies. It was harder to find a really good front assembly with smooth shoulders laid on so there was a chest and good reach. While, as a breeder, I am concerned about seeing too many short heads, among this group I saw more prominent eyes and cheeks and broad skulls than heads that were not long enough. There were two or three very bad bites. There were a number of fat puppies – not just a little fat. I thought the quality of the dogs and quality of the bitches was about equal and quite high this year.

So, that's how I saw them. Thank you very much for the opportunity!

2002TCA REGULAR CLASSES CRITIQUE

MERLE TAYLOR

What a thrill! When showing, nothing gets the adrenalin pumping more than turning the corner into Montgomery show grounds in the wee hours of the morning. Judging is no different.

When the numbers came back, I knew I had my work cut out for me—I remember when our own dog, Sunny, after hours in the ring, won the breed in 1983, car headlights were brought to ringside for the group judging. I knew I had to be decisive and get the job done with the degree of thoroughness that I expect as a judge and exhibitors expect from a judge.

As judges' education chair, I'm going to take this opportunity to share with everyone my perspective as a national specialty judge and, perhaps, provide some insight to those who aspire to judge. In other words, putting into practice what I've preached.

Before moving on, I thank Muriel Lee and John Sheehan on their great stewarding job, they're about to get it right. Thanks! And to Dick Hall, I applaud your efficiency and ease with which you kept my ring in order.

In addition to the club's restrictions on judging prior to Montgomery, I added my own limits. I avoided watching the breed at any of the major shows I attended and I avoided all publications—I truly wanted to go into the ring with no preconceived ideas—just something I wanted to do.

The weather was absolutely grand; however, the sun, in all of its glory, provided a bit of a challenge. I tried to keep the dogs comfortable and the confusion to a minimum.

At outdoor shows, I don't spend a lot of time looking at Scotties in the first line-up as the grass length often throws off the look of a balanced dog; I merely get a "feel" for the class.

Before I begin my class critique, I must comment on several of my observations.

I was a bit disappointed to see several less than perfect mouths in the dog classes; I am not obsessed with the perfect mouth, but, at this type of show, I would expect to find more toward perfect than not.

Front assemblies have always been a problem in the breed; there are so many parts which make up the whole front quarter. I did find too many "narrow" fronts and bodies that lacked the proper heart shape.

Expression is important to me, and I found that deep-set, small eyes showing up far too infrequently.

Two characteristics I saw in the ring really bother me. I saw, not cheekiness, but a thick jaw structure making the head appear more triangular in shape than rectangular; I feel that shape of head inappropriate for the breed destroying the overall expression so important to breed type.

I also found, in dogs and bitches, too many rear assemblies that lack muscle tone and that much needed second thigh—I was surprised and disappointed. We've always talked about the tail not being the end of the Scottie, but this problem I wasn't expecting. There were a few dogs and bitches I really thought exceptional until they walked away from me—again, I was disappointed.

Don't get me wrong, I saw some very nice Scotties that would make any breeder proud. One must never forget that a judge is evaluating breeding stock, not selecting one's next stud dog or brood bitch, but selecting the animal who has qualities so needed in the breed. This concept helps me bring the winners to the top of the class.

6-9 Dogs. All of my placements had good type. Fourth place, a nice eyed puppy needed a bit more substance. Third place had a nice expression, nicely put together, harsh coated but not quite in the condition of Second place. First place won on his overall balance, his clean head, small ear, and nice expression—a promising future is in store for him.

9-12 Dogs. My fourth place youngster, a nice youngster quite mature for this age, I like to see some growing room; the puppy in front of him was a pretty puppy, well conditioned, could use a bit more width in the front assembly; it may come with age. A close second and first, first winning out because of his smaller eye.

12-18 Dogs. The first place winner caught my eye early on; I was impressed by his expression and overall outline; second place, I felt for this age group, could have used a bit more body, perhaps yet to come. Third place and fourth place traded minor differences.

BBE Dogs. Third place, a mature dog, but appeared longer than I prefer; the red-ribbon winner had a nice headpiece, but the winner of the class had qualities so needed in the breed—an exciting dog. He was, at this point, a heavy contender for winners.

AmBred Dogs. Third place, a bigger dog, placed behind the second place dog. First place won on his overall balance and appearance.

Open Dogs. Fourth place was an attractive, good-coated dog with a pleasing headpiece. Third place, a good typey dog. Second place didn't do himself justice, a typical Scottie, I liked the class winner, his body had a great feel; with his harsh

coat, he is all Scottie.

Winners: A nice class of hopefuls. Judging decisions are often not easy; however, coming into Winners Dog, the decision had been made barring anything unforeseen. I felt the BBE dog had the qualities I was looking for and felt he was deserving on this day. My reserve, from the 12-18 class, won on his outline and his pleasing head and expression.

6-9 Bitches. My first-place puppy had an obvious fault—too short tail; however, one doesn't throw out the baby with the bath water. Her many attributes far outweighed this fault. Second place was a lovely girl but didn't quite have first places' expression. Third and fourth were nice puppy bitches, fourth not quite having the body of third.

9-12 Bitches. I examined her and when she moved, I saw her number and No 36 was winners bitch unless something better came along. It wasn't to happen. Second was a nice bitch, a tad longer, followed by another pretty brindle with ears a smidgen large. Fourth was a nicely bodied bitch.

12-18 Bitches. First place was a very nice bitch. Second place was put together well but wasn't putting it together very well. Third place was a beautifully presented, typey bitch. Fourth place was another typey bitch.

BBE Bitches. First place was a beautifully conditioned, great bodied bitch with a good expression. Second place was not quite as showy but had a great body. "Third did not have the headpiece of two, but a lovely body. Fourth place was a beautiful type but didn't have the coat texture I cherish.

AmBred Bitches. Anyone who has shown a Scottie knows, like us, they have their days. Scottie bitches in season always put our patience at its end. Fourth place was no exception; she was being a diehard today. Second place won on her type and body with First place presenting beautiful type in a well-conditioned package.

Open Bitches. I liked first place for her great body and attitude. Second place was another lovely bitch. Third also had a great body. Fourth was a lovely brindle show dog who will only get better with age.

Winners and BOW. As previously stated, No 36 stayed in my mind and won hands down. She's what I like to see in a Scottie. Reserve was my open bitch, who one has to put your hands on to appreciate. An aside, when I turned around from the judges' table to look at my line up of class winners, I was very pleased to note that from the side, they all looked similar in appearance—I liked that.

Veteran Dogs. Emotionally, a difficult class for me to judge. Fortunately, no one could see my eyes water as the class moved around the ring. All deserving winners, my first place carried himself well without coarseness.

Veteran Bitches. Again, a bevy of beauties; my winner was a lovely conditioned, pretty bitch. She's typey and "well preserved", if I may, certainly deserving of her Award of Merit.

I found some quality dogs and bitches in the specials class; unfortunately, the field had to be narrowed to a few—it's not always easy. Most were presented with great expertise. Trying to manage the ring and avoid keeping the dogs in the shade added another challenge. I hope no one was overly confused.

My eventual select few all fit the bill—each a bit differently. My BOB winner was everything I like in a Scottie, nothing fancy, but everything where it should be. A full muzzle, nice expression, clean head with small ears, a wonderfully shaped low-to-the-ground body; he carried himself well with true movement—a Scottie as it should be. (Ironically, if someone had told me some twenty plus years ago that I would be judging Montgomery, and this exhibitor's dog would win, I'm not sure I would have agreed. The owner and I competed often in those days, each winning his share—as a judge, one has to go beyond that stage and judge the dogs as one finds them on the assigned day.)

My BOS was a showy black bitch carrying a lovely outline. Beautifully conditioned, her body width and showiness brought her to the front.

My four other contenders could have easily stepped into the limelight.

The black dog I thought I had judged once before (later verified by the owner); I rewarded him then in the classes. I like the dog; he's a bit shorter with a longer neck, but has an absolutely wonderful headpiece and beautifully set, small ears. If judging breeding stock, one can't deny this dog as I think he would offset some of those bitches who get a bit long and stuffy.

The brindle dog represents the breed in beautiful condition. His body and outline are all Scottie. His long, clean headpiece only sets off the picture. He was playing "Scottie Dog" on this day; I think he was protesting the heat a bit too much!

The other black bitch in the trio of finalists was also a typey one shown in beautiful condition—a credit to her owners and handler.

The brindle bitch I have judged once before; she is exactly what I think a Scottie should be; however, today, her heart was elsewhere—I later learned that she had four-month olds at home—maybe her mind was elsewhere.

The day ends and life moves to its next stage—a day I'll never forget and I truly appreciate this wonderful opportunity.

Would I do anything differently, yes; when I began to write my critique, I realized in my notes I had written in negative terms, noting the faults of the class winners—the next time, I would attempt to write the good points, noting the placements on their virtues. This is why, in the above, I found it unnecessary to mention everything I had in my notes.

PS I received this beautifully hand-painted basket filled with a myriad of tidbits along with a container of chocolate—what a wonderful end to a wonderful day. Thank you.

POISON CONTROL HOTLINE

The ASPCA National Animal Poison Control Center is the first animal-oriented poison control hotline in North America. The Center is an allied agency of the University of Illinois College of Veterinary Medicine. Its veterinarians, specially trained veterinary toxicologists, and certified veterinary technicians are on-duty around the clock, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

You can reach the hotline at 1-888-ANI-HELP. There is a \$45.00 consultation services charge for the initial call. You may also visit their web site at: www.napcc.asPCA.org, where a wealth of information is available.

The objective of the Center is to educate pet owners about the importance of poison safety, and in doing so has provided the following tips.

PET POISON PREVENTION TIPS

1. Many common home and garden plants can be fatal if ingested; e.g. azalea, oleander, castor bean, sago palms or yew plants.
2. Keep cleaning agents stored away from pets. These agents have a variety of properties; some may cause mild stomach upset, others can cause severe burns of the tongue, mouth, and stomach.
3. Place bait products (mouse, rat, slug, and, roach traps) in areas that are inaccessible to your pets.
4. Never medicate your pets unless you are directed to do so by a veterinarian. Many medications that are safe for humans can be deadly to animals.
5. Never leave chocolate unattended.
6. Many common household products can be lethal to animals. Mothballs, potpourri oils, coffee grounds, home made play dough, fabric softener sheets, dishwashing detergent, batteries, cigarettes, alcoholic drinks and hand and foot warmers are potentially toxic.
7. Automotive products (gasoline, oil, and antifreeze) should be absolutely inaccessible to pets. As little as one tablespoon can be lethal to a 20-pound dog.
8. Read all of the information on the label before using a product on your pet or in your home. Always follow directions. Be especially careful in the selection of products to use for crates and kennel areas. (Ed. - Play it safe, stick to white vinegar!!)

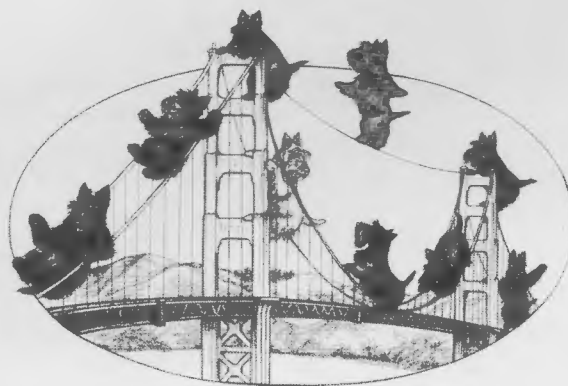
